A highlight of the Assembly's activities was the dedication of the new World Headquarters Building. A large crowd was present for the ceremonies which were conducted just outside the building's front entrance; then many moved inside where the dedicatory prayers ascended from each office within the building at the same time.

Pre-Assembly events included: The Ninth Annual Tomlinson College Scholarship Fund Banquet; the Annual Presbytery Meeting and Dinner, hosted by the General Overseer and his wife, and the Fields of the Wood Program.

We appreciate the good coverage provided by the news media, as well as the welcome extended by officials of Cleveland and Bradley County. The Assembly was addressed by two United States Senators, and President of the United States Jimmy Carter, expressed by telegram to the Assembly his greetings and good wishes.

Commendation is due to all who labored faithfully to make the Assembly possible. To God be the glory for all the good that was accomplished.

The 74th Annual General Assembly will be held, God willing, September 11-17, 1979.

7:40 "You Are Come"—message by E. H. Griffith, Field Secretary. Excerpts: Hebrews 12:18-23. We note in Colossians 1:15 that Christ is the firstborn of every creature. Christ is the firstborn, and this is the Church of the firstborn, and this is the General Assembly of the firstborn. Exodus 19:12. This was the administration of the law under Moses in the wilderness. It was a dark dispensation, and Christ state or Church state was covered with shackles and ties. The Jews could not bear the terror of this dispensation. Exodus 19:3, 4, 12. God had Moses to draw a boundary line and warn the people of

the danger of disobeying Him. Hebrews 12:23, 25-29. We think of the children of Israel dwelling in darkness, woe and misery, but we are in the dispensation of grace. We are in a heavenly place—not an earthly place. We do not come here for a vacation nor to play church. We are here to worship God in spirit and in truth. The Holy Ghost is here to convey the message, to soften your heart and your mind. Moses said, "I exceedingly fear and quake." We feel the fear of God, but we feel the presence of the Holy Ghost.

You can't separate the Holy Ghost from Theocratic Government. That is the only way it can operate. The Spirit directs God's government. This General Assembly is divine, not carnal, nor fleshly. His voice shook the earth. I want His Spirit to shake you. I feel we are on the verge of that shaking. When He shakes the heavens, that means something is going to take place on earth. I trust that God will come to us in a greater measure than He came to Moses and the children of Israel on the mount. The Scripture says if the trumpet gives an uncertain sound, who shall prepare himself for the battle? The trumpet is mentioned several times in the Old and New Testaments. The trumpet seems to have some significance in God's plan. When the children of Israel had fully obeyed the Lord, the command was given, "blow the trumpet, break the pitchers that were in their hands." The first man Adam was tried, and he failed. As a member, you are being tried, the local churches are being tried, the ministers are being tried. Jesus was tried to the breaking point, but He succeeded. He said, "Not my will, but thine be done." In the midst of this trial, the angel came down from heaven and strengthened him. We may need a visitation from the angels. The Assembly is being tested. I don't know anything but the Church of God. I don't know defeat.

Those who are subject to be governed must submit to those who rule. The Bible says that you are not your own, but you are bought with a price. Theocratic Government is God's government, or the government of the Church of God. God controls the Church of God. Sometimes we are caught up because we either don't see it working or we are not sure what makes it work. God's government is not in trouble. Government is no good unless it is obeyed. The Bible says that the heavens declare the glory of God.

Genesis 1:14, 15. The elements were subject to the Word of God. Colossians 1:16, 17. There is government in God's universe and in His creation.

When God said to Abraham to get out, He meant to get out. The Church must do it God's way. When God said to Noah to make thee an ark, that was theocracy. It works, but it starts with you. If any man come to God, he must believe, obey and submit. Luke 6:47-49. The record indicates that this happened in an age where men built dynasties, but they were not built of God's theocracy. We are grateful for our houseparents in Cleveland, Tennessee, Brother and Sister Ronald Higgins, and Sister Cosy Adams, who is serving as relief houseparent. Also, Brother and Sister Robert Llana who served as houseparents through June of this year.

Due to your faithful support with these special projects along with the regular convention and Assembly offerings, we have been able to make the following improvements:

INDIA—Repaired van; Dug well; Built thatch house for caretaker; Built storage tank on farm.

INDONESIA—Purchased new van; Purchased two tracts of land; Repaired farmhouse.

KOREA—Sent money to purchase washer, dryer, books, and TV; Rebuilt the facilities (four buildings) which were ordered removed by the Korean Highway Department. Instead of building this many different buildings,

we built one long building with a full length entrance hall on one side, which gives an out-of-the-weather entrance to each room.

Last year we reported the property that had been donated in Keeline, Wyoming by Anna Jensen for a home for children. I visited with Sister Jensen and the state committee and after the Assembly Brother Tomlinson went out with me, and we met with the Overseer and one of the committee and Sister Jensen. It was decided that it would be best to return the control of the property back to Sister Jensen. Arrangements were made and the property was redeeded.

During the past few years, there have been new laws passed by the state of Tennessee and by Federal agencies in regard to the care of children. The institutions for group care seem to have become a special target and both state and federal laws are geared to foster-type care.

Working to conform to these new laws which are in direct contrast to the institutional type operation which the Tomlinson Home for Children is incorporated to carry out, has been most difficult.

I preached in one district rally in Georgia; was guest speaker at Idaho Couples Retreat, one district convention and local church in Nebraska; preached at 18 local churches and was invited to preach 2 nights for a group outside the Church. I conducted one week revival, and 5 weekend meetings. I attended state and national conventions in Northern New England, Nebraska and South Mexico. I have attended 3 workshops for directors of children's homes, visited the Homes in the other nations—Korea twice, visited the Home in Mexico with a contractor and plans were approved by the Board for a second building in Mexico.

Due to the unusual number of unexpected events and problems that arose this year, I have spent many hours counseling with representatives of different state and federal agencies, houseparents, lawyers and members of the Board. I have also spent many hours in prayer and can report that God has truly been faithful in giving us (the Board and I) divine guidance as needed.

The Homes outside the U.S.A. are growing and doing well. The number of children has been increased, or is being increased in India and Indonesia.

We are still encouraging each Home to grow as much fruit and food as possible, and we feel the programs of development in these fields will prove

invaluable in the future. With the unsettled economic situation in the world, I think the Tomlinson Home for Children Board has planned well and we are headed in the right direction.

4:35 "I Pledge Allegiance to Our Church Flag"—message by Douglas King. Excerpts: When I was in school, we pledged allegiance to the flag of the United States. It was instilled in me that I should be proud of my country and for what it stands. Today in America, I find that allegiance to our flag is not given as readily as it once was. I pledge allegiance, which means that I am vowing to stand and, if need be, die for the principles that flag represents. I was born an American, and I had nothing to decide about my citizenship. Members of the Church of God came into a holy nation, and we came in by choice. We of many nations took a covenant by choice, and we said, "I promise to all the things that nation stands for."

Not long ago, there was much controversy in the United States and the world. There was a war, but one had not been declared. Many died in that war. These people had been taught allegiance to their government, and some fled their duties. Whether I agreed, it was still my country. God is calling us to align ourselves and pledge allegiance to Him. Everytime I pledge allegiance to the flag, I am vowing anew to God that I am going to stand for the truth that it is displaying. We are thankful to God for peace and prosperity, but have we forgotten the price that was paid to get us thus far? Paul warned the Church that there are two classes of people—those who creep in unawares and those that are of your own selves. I have heard some of our ministers talk about our financial system needing to be changed, and a committee was appointed to look into the possibility. They came back with the report that it did not seem feasible to do so. I finally came to the conclusion that God is quite able to let us know when it is time to change. I hear people talking about our Advice to Members and say it is just a recommendation. If all it is is a recommendation, why do I spend my money to come to the Assembly and go back as a Church of God minister and say, "Don't take any account, it was just a recommendation." It is time we realize that when God moves on the Assembly it is our duty to have our allegiance to Him and do what He said we should.

Our biggest problem today is our loyalty concerning theocratic government. God didn't tell me if you feel good, do it. God told me when I came into this nation and took up citizenship that you are a citizen with rules and regulations. If you want to live forever in eternity with Me, you must abide by My government. He said, "I change not. I am the same yesterday today and forever." I may not understand some things. God didn't say I would. The simple thing is that by faith and knowledge and inspiration, I know that this is His Church no matter what happens. If I stay true to His Word

and I am a member of His Church and have allegiance to His flag, I am all right.

Where does your loyalty lie? What you think sometimes gets into your heart and actions. I pledge allegiance to our Church Flag; what I am saying is that I pledge my loyalty to God and to His program, not how someone else wants it, but how God wants it. I believe every one of us is going to have to check our loyalty and how we became what we are today and how we must become what God said His people will be.

One thing stands out in heaven; there is praise and worship of God, and the God who is worthy of praise in heaven is deserving of praise in earth. This will include praising Him through holy living. Jesus, during His stay on earth, set the example. He was tempted in all points like as we are, but He did not succumb to temptation. Earlier Christ had met this temptor who offered Him the kingdoms of this world. Jesus triumphed, and now the prince of the world is returning for another battle. He had been able to claim, "Thy will be done." Now we are praying that Thy will be done in earth.

For this goal to be attained within the Church of God, there must be no area of our lives where God does not rule; no weaknesses within the Church of God which Satan can exploit. We are not our own—we are God's purchased possession. Jesus admonished the Early Church in James 5:16. James the first General Overseer advocated this kind of openness with one another. The Church of God is the greatest fellowship in this earth. It is only necessary that we walk in the light we have with openness toward God to accept any additional light that He might shine upon our path. We have to do right because we love God. Only in Jesus Christ is our victory over Satan complete. Lucifer dwelled in heaven, and he became exalted desiring to have preeminence. Lucifer was quick to establish his kingdom on earth where he remains the prince of this world, but in the last days Jesus came and set up a government on planet earth. He organized His Church. I hope nobody is guilty of wanting to build you a kingdom. That is a spirit of Satan. We don't need our little kingdoms. (Brother Murray gave altar call.)

Here the focal point turns from the national and family inheritance to that provided through the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ.

If you have been born again, you have an inheritance which is incorruptible. Some people are selling their inheritance as did Esau, for an insignificant price. Adam and Eve got excited about knowledge, and they sold out. People get a good experience with God and somebody comes along with a greater

light than the Bible rightly divided. Regardless of who he is, when he crosses this Book, tell him I am not for sale. Sampson, chosen specifically by God, felt the sweet wooings of Delilah; and he went crazy. He was in his forties, and that is when Church of God preachers go crazy. More homes are destroyed in the forties than any other age group. He fights the devil, the lust and comes home to a woman who says, "I've got him because he can't have but one." He decided he can have more than one, and the Church is wrong. He wanders off and marries someone half his age. He has sold his inheritance. Not only are the men having their problems, so are the women. The devil is a liar, and life has not passed us by; we are still alive, and God loves us. I challenge you to look at the devil and say, "My marriage nor my virtue is for sale."

Judas had the greatest opportunities in the world, but he sold his inheritance for popularity of the religious leaders. They gave him thirty pieces of silver, but he had the church money all the time. He needed the approval of the religious community. America is in the greatest upsurge of religion it has ever known, and the greatest decline in morality. How can fifty million people claim to be born again and not upset the lives of the community? The religious community will not accept old-time holiness. The religious world will offer you freedom, deliverance from bondage, but you will be in more bondage than you ever heard of. Sometimes we get so carried away with position and politics.

Ananias and Sapphira were church members. They did everything they were supposed to do if it didn't involve money. A lot of folks are selling their inheritance because of money. They had to lie about it. If God has provided for us, let us be willing to give some of it back for the glory of God. Had it not been for being seen of men, they wouldn't have given anything. They came dashing in and laid it at the apostles' feet. They didn't know that God was looking. Church of God, God is looking. Some in this Book refused to sell their inheritance, and people here tonight refuse to sell. Joseph's brothers sold him into slavery. God arranged for Joseph to go to Potiphar's house, but the devil lived there, too. There comes a time when we need to run. God knows your weaknesses, because Jesus Christ has gone through all of them. A lot of people have sold their inheritance for glory. Some of you are bound by stubbornness and you are going to have it your way if it destroys everything. Jesus will heal your marriage; your bodies. When Zion travailed, something happened. Our prayer life must not be for sale. (Shouting and altar call. Altar song by Roberta Matthews.)

Many inside and outside the Church are observing how we handle our affairs. We are the body of Christ and members in particular, and we are to have the same care one to another. God is requiring much of His Church, and He is going to judge the Church. Even though we are the Church, we will account to God individually. The Church judgment begins at the House of God; during the Millennium there will be judging of the nations as stated in Matthew 24:32, 33. When the Queen of Sheba visited Solomon, it was how the internal affairs were carried out that impressed her. She came to prove Solomon. We need to be prepared for those who will be inquiring their way to Zion. The Lord loved Israel through the good times and through the bad. Israel was the Old Testament Zion; the Church is the New Testament Zion. When A. J. Tomlinson came down from Prayer Mountain, there was a meeting in progress. He asked questions, and he was given Bible answers. He told them they were the Church of God of the Bible and with this understanding he presented himself for membership.

The next thing that impressed the Queen of Sheba was the house Solomon built. The next thing that impressed her was the meat on the king's table. The next thing which impressed her was the sitting of his servants and the attendant of his ministry. Another thing is their apparel. I believe God's people need to dress as becometh holiness. Solomon had great authority, and the Queen observed his ascent into the house of God. I believe the joy of the Lord is our strength; what she saw caused her to bless Solomon's God. The internal affairs of the House of God under Solomon caused the Queen of Sheba to bless the Lord. Isn't that what we are after—to cause someone to bless the Lord God that we serve? All internal affairs of the Church are to be settled by the same rule—the New Testament as our rule of faith and practice, government and discipline.

I want to give some advice concerning dealing with problems in the Church. The highest rank of ministry in the Church is the Elder—bishops and deacons. The world will measure the Church of God by my life; they will condemn the Church if I fail to be a proper example. The elders that rule well shall bestow upon Him double honor. God puts us on the honor system. We need to have enough of the love of God that we will tell people the truth in love. It is recommended that the pastor and band leader in a very prayerful state talk and pray with the offender. We are going to have to do it God's way. We need to take the rule of faith and practice that God has given the Church and operate our internal affairs, and I believe He

will take care of our personal business. He has entrusted us to take care of the business of the Church of God.

INTRODUCTION

It has been seventy-five years since The Church arose out of darkness in Fields of the Wood, and never since that time has the future looked brighter for The Church of God. In no one year has The Church previously enjoyed such growth as has been experienced this year, and there is a feeling being shared by almost everyone—a feeling of expectancy of mighty things at hand.

As representatives from Headquarters returned from the conventions this year, there was a general agreement that something special was happening. The spirit of the conventions was unusual, and from all accounts, God especially honored His people in these great feasts. This has caused all of us to look forward with great anticipation to the General Assembly. Everyone has felt that wonderful things are in store for us in this Assembly.

As we are gathered here today I feel that first of all we need to lift our hearts in praise to God for the richness of His presence with which we have been blessed. To Him belongs all glory and honor. We exalt His Name together, for it is only by His power that any good thing is done. Not only do we thank Him for the blessings we have received this past year: we thank Him for the greatness of His power which we are experiencing in this Assembly, and which we confidently expect to enjoy upon our labors henceforth.

Our God is great and He is worthy of all praise. We can have no higher purpose in this Assembly than to praise and honor our wonderful Lord. We may receive a lesson from an account of Judah's being invaded by her enemies and the manner in which God's people at that time secured their victory.

"Then there came some that told Jehoshaphat, saying, There cometh a great multitude against thee from beyond the sea on this side Syria. . . .

"And Jehoshaphat feared, and set himself to seek the Lord, and proclaimed

a fast throughout all Judah.

“And Judah gathered themselves together, to ask help of the Lord: even out of all the cities of Judah they came to seek the Lord.

“And Jehoshaphat stood in the congregation of Judah and Jerusalem, in the house of the Lord, before the new court,

“And said, O Lord God of our fathers, art not thou God in heaven? and rulest not thou over all the kingdoms of the heathen? and in thine hand is there not power and might, so that none is able to withstand thee?

“Art not thou our God, who didst drive out the inhabitants of this land before thy people Israel, and gavest it to the seed of Abraham thy friend for ever?

“O our God, wilt thou not judge them? for we have no might against this great company that cometh against us; neither know we what to do: but our eyes are upon thee.

“And all Judah stood before the Lord, with their little ones, their wives, and their children.

“Then upon Jahaziel . . . a Levite . . . came the Spirit of the Lord in the midst of the congregation;

“And he said, Hearken ye, all Judah, and ye inhabitants of Jerusalem, and thou king Jehoshaphat, Thus saith the Lord unto you, Be not afraid nor dismayed by reason of this great multitude; for the battle is not yours, but God's.

“Ye shall not need to fight in this battle: set yourselves, stand ye still, and see the salvation of the Lord with you, O Judah and Jerusalem: fear not, nor be dismayed; to morrow go out against them: for the Lord will be with you.

“And Jehoshaphat bowed his head with his face to the ground: and all Judah and the inhabitants of Jerusalem fell before the Lord, worshipping the Lord.

“And the Levites . . . stood up to praise the Lord God of Israel with a loud voice on high.

“And they rose early in the morning . . . and as they went forth, Jehoshaphat stood and said, Hear me, O Judah, and ye inhabitants of Jerusalem; Believe in the Lord your God, so shall ye be established; believe his prophets, so shall ye prosper.

“And when he had consulted with the people, he appointed singers unto the Lord, and that should praise the beauty of holiness, as they went out before the army, and to say, Praise the Lord; for his mercy endureth for ever.

“And when they began to sing and to praise, the Lord set ambushments against the children of Ammon, Moab, and mount Seir, which were come against Judah; and they were smitten.

“For the children of Ammon and Moab stood up against the inhabitants of mount Seir, utterly to slay and destroy them: and when they had made an end of the inhabitants of Seir, every one helped to destroy another.

“And when Judah came toward the watch tower in the wilderness, they looked unto the multitude, and, behold, they were dead bodies fallen to the

earth, and none escaped.

"Then they returned, every man of Judah and Jerusalem, and Jehoshaphat in the forefront of them, to go again to Jerusalem with joy; for the Lord had made them to rejoice over their enemies.

"And they came to Jerusalem with psalteries and harps and trumpets unto the house of the Lord.

"And the fear of God was on all the kingdoms of those countries, when they had heard that the Lord fought against the enemies of Israel.

"So the realm of Jehoshaphat was quiet: for his God gave him rest round about." 2 Chronicles 20:2-7, 12-15, 17-24, 27-30.

This king of Judah realized that God's people's strength was not in swords or spears but in praise to God. It must have appeared strange to see an army advancing against an enemy with singers out front praising the beauty of holiness, and saying, "Praise the Lord; for his mercy endureth for ever." In fact, these defenseless singers might have seemed like targets for consuming enemy ammunition. But it was when they began to sing and to praise, that God set ambushments against the enemy. While we do not know exactly what this consisted of, we do know it caused the enemies of God's people to turn upon one another until they had utterly destroyed themselves. So, without an arrow being shot or a spear being hurled by Judah, the battle was won. Their victory had come through giving praise to God.

Is there not a lesson in this story for The Church today? We need not be distracted by conditions as they now exist within the world. Let go, our minds would tell us, the task to which we are assigned is virtually impossible. And it is if we depend upon our own abilities. But we must lift our minds heavenward, to the greatness and glory of Almighty God. Even as in Judah's day, the battle is the Lord's and when He is given the pre-eminence of our praise and exaltation, He will manifest His mighty power in our behalf. Let us praise Him! Let us worship Him! For He alone is worthy. Oh praise His mighty Name!

FIT FOR A KING

"But ye are a chosen generation, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, a peculiar people; that ye should shew forth the praises of him who hath called you out of darkness into his marvelous light." 1 Peter 2:9

The apostle Peter points out the special honors conferred upon us as a chosen generation, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, a peculiar people. We are a chosen generation, not as the one descending naturally through Abraham, Isaac and Jacob; but we are the generation chosen in Him before the foundation of the world. We become a part of this generation by the exercise of faith in Him who regenerates within each believer new spiritual life. And a royal priesthood? Oh yes, because we are priests who serve in the courts of a king—the King of kings!

In this world it is possible to serve in a king's household without being of royalty oneself; but in the household of our great King, we are one with Him, sharing His royalty. Remember this is so, only that we might show forth His praises, or His excellencies.

The Psalmist wrote, "Out of Zion, the perfection of beauty, God hath shined." Psalm 50:2 Now we know that God, through the ages, has wrought special works through people whom He has chosen. His greatest work, His perfect work, His masterpiece of all time, is that work which He will cause to shine forth out of Zion, the Church of God.

Even in the Old Testament manifestations of Himself, and in the programs foreshadowing The Church Jesus would build, there were demonstrations of God's glory. Paul wrote to the church at Corinth:

"But if the ministration of death, written and engraven in stones, was glorious, so that the children of Israel could not stedfastly behold the face of Moses for the glory of his countenance; which glory was to be done away:

"How shall not the ministration of the spirit be rather glorious?

"For if the ministration of condemnation be glory, much more doth the ministration of righteousness exceed in glory.

"For even that which was made glorious had no glory in this respect, by reason of the glory that excelleth.

"For if that which is done away was glorious, much more that which remaineth is glorious." 2 Corinthians 3:7-11

God's dealing with Israel in the Old Testament reached its highest point with the construction of the temple during the reign of Solomon. This was Israel's most illustrious moment in history. It is thrilling to read the account of the temple's dedication:

"Now when Solomon had made an end of praying, the fire came down from heaven, and consumed the burnt offering and the sacrifices; and the glory of the Lord filled the house.

"And the priests could not enter into the house of the Lord, because the glory of the Lord had filled the Lord's house.

"And when all the children of Israel saw how the fire came down, and the glory of the Lord upon the house, they bowed themselves with their faces to the ground upon the pavement, and worshipped, and praised the Lord, saying, For he is good; for his mercy endureth for ever." 2 Chronicles 7:1-3

It was after this time of God's glory filling the house of the Lord that the Queen of Sheba came to Jerusalem to visit Solomon and to inquire of him. The wisdom God had given him enabled Solomon to answer all her questions. His wisdom and the splendor of the house he had built was most impressive to the Queen. The happiness with which his staff served was striking to this monarch who had traveled a long way to learn of what God was doing. Notice her comments: "Happy are thy men, and happy are these thy servants, which stand continually before thee, and hear thy wisdom." 2 Chronicles 9:7

Now Solomon's temple was only a type of that spiritual house which the One greater than Solomon would build. And this spiritual house is the one out of which the perfection of beauty God will shine. As Solomon's servants were happy as they stood continually before him and heard his wisdom, even so today we serve with gladness in the house of our King. How thrilling it is to hear His wisdom and to learn of Him.

We might suppose that great care was taken in selecting those who would

serve in the courts of King Solomon. When the selections were made the servants no doubt took great pleasure in having been chosen. Even their descendants seem to have felt themselves sufficiently distinguished and dignified when they were called the children of Solomon's servants. This is the distinction given them by both Ezra and Nehemiah when they were listing the families returning from captivity.

What a joy it is to realize we today have been chosen to serve in the greatest of temples, God's crowning achievement on this earth! To serve in the courts of the King who is far greater and wiser than Solomon, is an honor, higher far, than Solomon's servants could possibly have known. He is the King of kings! We have been selected and chosen by Jesus Himself to reign with Him.

To serve with Him requires that we be fit for a king. The Psalmist asked, "Lord, who shall abide in thy tabernacle? who shall dwell in thy holy hill?" The answer was, "He that walketh uprightly, and worketh righteousness, and speaketh the truth in his heart." Psalm 15:1, 2 Our joy in having been chosen prompts us to discipline ourselves diligently. We dare not display any behavior that would reflect poorly upon our King.

We are chosen to shew forth the praises of Him who has called us. The Church was purchased and built for this purpose, and this is the reason for its existence. We will shew forth His praises, or His excellencies, by allowing Him to reveal through us His virtues, His very nature, to all men.

It is our business to glorify God in everything we do. He is deserving of all glory. If it makes God appear to be selfish in His desiring glory, this is simply from lack of understanding on our part. We may rationalize that it is improper for anyone to seek his own glory, since he that seeketh his own glory honors himself. But rightly understood, we realize that God is love. In love there is no selfishness. Rather, there is the impulse and need to impart of one's self to others. This then is God's motivation in desiring to be exalted among men. It is to reveal Himself in His being of love. He delights to give of Himself to His creatures, which He so perfectly did at Calvary.

To glorify God is to glorify love. To show forth His praises, or as has been translated, His excellencies, is to exalt love in our lives. Then we can show to everyone the more excellent way of living. This is it then: to increase in love more and more. As true love grows, our lives reflect His excellence by becoming less and less self-centered. We find ourselves following Christ's lifestyle of selfless living. It is then that Isaiah's prophecy can be fulfilled: ". . . and his glory shall be seen upon thee." Isaiah 60:2

How excellent it is to pour your life and love, which you have received from Him, into empty lives all around you. It is through this means that God is glorified. It is in this manner that we may show forth His praises. Lives that have been emptied of self and filled with the love of God, lives which are pouring forth this love into the empty lives by which they are surrounded—these are the lives of those who are fit for a King.

KEEP YOUR EXPERIENCE BRIGHT AND SHINING

Called out of darkness into His marvelous light—what an experience!

Dwelling in the darkness of sin, doomed for endless separation from God in a place prepared for the devil and his angels, then gloriously delivered by the power of God—the joy of this experience can be known only by those to whom it has happened. Peter described it as joy unspeakable and full of glory. At the time of this deliverance of a soul from death, unto life in Christ, the saints who are witnesses to it are joined by a rejoicing host in heaven. While this heavenly host cannot know the joy of the redeemed, they rejoice in knowing God's will is being accomplished in the life of another of His creatures. As God is thus glorified, they join us in rejoicing.

The one who is most thrilled is the newborn creature. His birth into the family of God opens a new life to him, a life of fellowship with Jesus Christ. He is called from a life of sin to a life of holiness with God. The contrast is as distinct as night and day, as darkness and light. All of us who are saved can recall the peace and joy this experience brought to us. Life at that point had a new beginning. The things we once loved we found ourselves hating, and the things we previously hated we henceforth loved.

Now, in our natural lives it is normal to grow from childhood into maturity, and then the process of aging leads to a decline in one's physical powers. In the spiritual life, growth can continue without reaching a point of declining power and strength. It is up to each individual to pursue a course wherein he can keep his experience fresh and glowing with God's presence. Aging for a Christian should only enhance his spiritual stature. The apostle Peter wrote:

"According as his divine power hath given unto us all things that pertain unto life and godliness, through the knowledge of him that hath called us to glory and virtue:

"Whereby are given unto us exceeding great and precious promises: that by these ye might be partakers of the divine nature, having escaped the corruption that is in the world through lust.

"And beside this, giving all diligence, add to your faith virtue; and to virtue knowledge;

"And to knowledge temperance; and to temperance patience; and to patience godliness;

"And to godliness brotherly kindness; and to brotherly kindness charity.

"For if these things be in you, and abound, they make you that ye shall neither be barren nor unfruitful in the knowledge of our Lord Jesus Christ.

"But he that lacketh these things is blind, and cannot see afar off, and hath forgotten that he was purged from his old sins.

"Wherefore the rather, brethren, give diligence to make your calling and election sure: for if ye do these things, ye shall never fall." 2 Peter 1:3-10

We cannot afford to become careless concerning our calling and election. We have been called out of darkness into His marvelous light. Paul reminded the Ephesians, "For ye were sometimes darkness, but now are ye light in the Lord." Ephesians 5:8 In this marvelous light we recognized that we have been called unto holiness, and we are admonished to walk worthy of the vocation wherewith we are called. There must be no carelessness displayed with regard to the holy lives we are to maintain.

And as God's elect we may know we have been carefully chosen. He had the sovereign right to choose others; but of the thousands He had called out of sin, saving them, sanctifying them, and baptizing them with the Holy Ghost, He chose to reveal The Church of God to us. Now we are cautioned here by Peter to give diligence to make our calling and election sure. Of course, we know that we do not have any kind of exclusive rights to being a part of God's elect. Others of His children who obey His voice will eventually be brought into this number. Right now, we have a distinct responsibility to give diligent attention to being the Body of Christ, to being faithful in our assigned role as God's elect.

In writing to the Romans concerning Israel, the elect of God under the old covenant, Paul stated, "Well; because of unbelief they were broken off, and thou standest by faith. Be not highminded, but fear: for if God spared not the natural branches, take heed lest he also spare not thee." Romans 11:20, 21

Faithfulness to God is best assured when we retain the freshness of our spiritual experience and revelation. It is thrilling to a new convert to experience the joy of knowing his sins are gone and to sense the presence and peace of God. And when the divine revelation of the Body of Christ breaks in upon the spiritual mind, this is something that is equally thrilling. Time should not be allowed to diminish one's excitement about being a Christian or about being a member of The Church of God. Growth brings freshness, and there is no point in the spiritual life where this growth which is always bringing newness and thrills must stop. While aging leads to a decline in one's physical powers, it is not so in the spiritual.

I have noticed that when some people purchase a new automobile, they are very careful for the first few weeks to maintain its showroom condition. It is kept bright and shining, but time has a way of causing less care: and eventually through neglect it begins to lose its shine. After awhile its appearance no longer excites them, and they begin looking forward to the time when it will be traded for a new one. It is sad that some members of The Church seem to treat their spiritual experience and revelation the same way. This generally leads to dissatisfaction and desire for something different.

While automobiles are made to be replaced, it is not so with the experiences of this great salvation and the divine revelation of the Church of God. Being eternal in nature they retain newness and freshness. It is only necessary that we cultivate their newness and freshness in our hearts by advancing with the light of His Word.

Are you still thrilled and excited about being a child of God? Are you thrilled today with your revelation of The Church? We are talking about something that is divine and eternal—something which does not dim with the passing of time. I am so happy today to be a child of God, to know that my sins are covered by the blood of Jesus. I am so happy with my revelation of The Church He purchased with His own precious blood. Sweeter as the days go by is not just the title of a song; it expresses the feeling of everyone who keeps his heart turned toward heaven from whence the light of God's own Son continues to light his path. It is a song to be sung by those who

keep their experience and revelation bright and shining.

A BALANCED MESSAGE

“And he gave some, apostles; and some, prophets; and some, evangelists; and some, pastors and teachers;

“For the perfecting of the saints, for the work of the ministry, for the edifying of the body of Christ:

“Till we all come in the unity of the faith, and of the knowledge of the Son of God, unto a perfect man, unto the measure of the stature of the fulness of Christ.” Ephesians 4:11-13

Paul was surely speaking of a high degree of maturity when he wrote, “Till we all come in the unity of the faith, and of the knowledge of the Son of God, unto a perfect man, unto the measure of the stature of the fulness of Christ.” It is doubtful that we fully comprehend at this time all that this means. But there is the certain indication that we must do some growing to reach the stature of the fulness of Christ; and to get to that point, it is imperative that we know Christ, or as Paul said it, we must arrive at the knowledge of the Son of God.

In another letter, this apostle to the Gentiles wrote, “For God, who commanded the light to shine out of darkness, hath shined in our hearts, to give the light of the knowledge of the glory of God in the face of Jesus Christ.” There was a measure of Himself which God desired to reveal to man, and He chose to do this through Jesus.

To reach this knowledge of the Son of God and the measure of the stature of Christ's fulness, it is necessary that the ministry of The Church teach and preach Jesus Christ in His fulness or completeness. While the name of Jesus is wonderful and it is a name to be exalted above every name, it is essential that we preach more than just a name. We must preach the Christ of the Scriptures.

We need to present Jesus as a Saviour, for indeed this is the meaning of the name; but we must not stop at that point. There is a tendency of long standing to become overbalanced in preaching some particular aspect of the message of Christ. When this occurs, it generally creates problems. Now every principle and every doctrine of Jesus Christ is worthy of zealous promotion, but we cannot afford to go overboard on any one of His teachings, to the exclusion of proper regard for all else He taught. We certainly cannot ignore His teachings and just concentrate upon the beauty of the name Jesus, as though the mere repetition of that name would solve all problems. We must carry His message in a balanced manner.

Divine healing is a New Testament doctrine, and it needs to be taught and practiced, but some ministers have made shipwreck of their ministries by devoting their total attention and energies to this one doctrine, without giving due regard to other Scriptures. Some ministers seem to become obsessed with preaching against the sin of adultery. The danger here seems to have been that when this thought occupies so much of their minds, too often they become involved in adultery themselves.

Jesus Christ possessed perfect balance, and it is important that the message

we preach of Him be a balanced message. Some feel we need to preach the Church more than we do, while others say we do not need so much preaching on the Church—to just preach Jesus. It is possible that some have gone a bit overboard on preaching The Church; but to say, “Just preach Jesus,” sounds a little vague.

To preach Jesus is to preach His message. It is to exalt His principles and the doctrines He introduced. For example; one cannot fully preach Jesus and not preach genuine repentance. Repentance involves abandoning the paths of sin. There are those who would prefer not to be told they must cease from sinful practices and from living contrary to God’s laws. These are the ones who would cry, “Why preach so much about doctrine? Just preach Jesus.” Following this same line of thought, we could say, “Why preach on the new birth? Just preach Jesus. Why preach on sanctification? Just preach Jesus. Why preach on the Holy Ghost and speaking with other tongues? Just preach Jesus. Why preach on the one fold? Just preach Jesus.” It is obvious that to preach Jesus is to preach His message.

Never has it been more important than now to preach His message with proper balance. We must make certain that what we preach is, indeed, His message. The new people who are coming into The Church and who will be continually coming in increasing numbers will not always be ready to accept everything we say at face value. As children of God, they have a responsibility to exercise caution in their search for truth. The Church has a special obligation to be faithful to the message of its Founder and its Head, Jesus Christ.

Having been designated as the pillar and ground of the truth, we have a standard to uphold. We dare not cloud this beautiful standard by adding to the message of truth our personal views we may have received by unscriptural traditions picked up along the way. We must keep the standard pure, as pure as God’s Word, which after all is The Church’s standard.

We would not appreciate these new people attempting to impose their traditions upon The Church. They will likewise recognize and resent our theories and traditions which cannot be substantiated in the New Testament. We must not allow our personal views to become a stumblingblock to the unity of God’s children. Remember, the message we have to declare is the message of Jesus Christ. We must keep on declaring it faithfully, “Till we all come in the unity of the faith, and of the knowledge of the son of God, unto a perfect man, unto the measure of the stature of the fulness of Christ.”

We cannot be too careful about confining our message to that contained in the blessed old Book, which long ago we agreed to take as our only law book. The covenant to which we subscribed in becoming members of The Church of God was that we would take the Bible as the Word of God, that we would believe and practice its teachings rightly divided—the New Testament as our rule of faith and practice, government and discipline, and that we would walk in the light to the best of our knowledge and ability. The authority for rightly dividing the teachings of the Bible is the General Assembly. We feel God has guided the Assembly in its task of setting forth the teachings as we have them.

In preaching the doctrines of Christ, which are the doctrines of The Church, we want to be careful that we do not go beyond what the Assembly intended in interpreting the Scriptures. I am sure it would be possible to do this without really meaning to. For example, I have been giving thought recently to the teaching, "Full Restoration of the Gifts to The Church." I have no doubt that this teaching is Scripturally sound. The same spiritual gifts which operated in The Early Church which went into the Dark Ages are operating within The Last Days Church by the same Spirit who was present in that era of The Church's history.

We believe this is the same Church in which the apostles ministered, and the same Holy Ghost who was present with them is working within The Church today moving upon individuals for the manifestation of the spiritual gifts.

In our zeal for the Church we have, at times, given the impression that the gifts of the Spirit could operate only within The Church. If this were true, then it would not be possible for someone outside The Church to give out a message in tongues or to interpret a message which had been given in tongues. Divers kinds of tongues and interpretation of tongues are gifts of the Spirit. I feel it is good to emphasize the positive aspect of the Holy Ghost's ministry within The Church. We want to stay yielded to the Holy Ghost, living close to God so that He may use any one of us at any time, for the manifestation of the gifts of the Spirit as He sees the need. At the same time we would not attempt to limit Him in the work He might see fit to do among other Spirit-filled people.

Now it is true that God has set these gifts in the Church, and these same gifts were restored to The Church when it made its appearance in our day. God has also given to The Church pastors, evangelists, and teachers. But this does not mean that there are not God-called pastors, evangelists, and teachers outside The Church. Does the teaching "Full Restoration of the Gifts to the Church" mean that spiritual gifts may operate only within The Church?

We must concern ourselves with the proper operation of the Spirit's manifestations within The Church; so let all of us stay close to God and allow the Holy Ghost the freedom He desires within the Body of Christ.

I refer to this teaching only as an example of a case where we might have gone a little beyond what the Assembly intended. We must make sure the message we carry is consistent with the teachings of the New Testament. In this way we can be sure it will be well balanced.

OUR EVANGELISTIC EFFORTS

Evangelism is nothing new to The Church of God. From the time of its organization by Christ on Mount Hattin, the stated purpose for The Church's being set in order was that He might send them forth to preach.

"Then he called his twelve disciples together, and gave them power and authority over all devils, and to cure diseases.

"And he sent them to preach the kingdom of God, and to heal the sick." Luke 9:1, 2

The Kingdom of God as He introduced it and which He sent them forth

to spread everywhere was righteousness, and peace, and joy in the Holy Ghost. Man, who was unrighteous could, through God's provision in Christ, become righteous. The wicked who, like the troubled sea, cannot rest, in Christ's Kingdom can find the peace that passeth understanding. Souls burdened with the guilt of sin can experience that joy unspeakable and full of glory.

We are thankful for the evangelistic fervor being manifested among many of our churches right now, and we desire to fan the zeal for reaching the lost to new heights. We rejoice over the thousands we have reached this year, delivering them from the sure judgments of God and eternal damnation, unto eternal life with the Lord. Some of these are with us in this Assembly, rejoicing in their new-found experience of righteousness, and peace, and joy in the Holy Ghost.

At the same time millions remain enslaved by Satan, separated from fellowship with God for the present, and doomed to be lost eternally unless someone can reach them with the good news of salvation. This prompts me to promote a more vigorous evangelistic effort.

According to our records, some of our churches have not had a person saved in their services this entire year. Although a comparatively small number of churches have this kind of record, I feel most of our churches are not as effective as they should be in this matter of rescuing souls from sin. We want the spirit of reaching the lost to take hold of our people. We cannot afford to be lax in such an important matter as saving souls from the destruction of an endless hell. If only one soul was scheduled for hell this year, the terror of that tragedy would be sufficient to bring this entire Assembly to its knees in behalf of that pitiful creature. The sad truth is that he is going to be joined by a vast multitude, departing life unprepared for eternity. Oh, God, stir us somehow!

Satan seeks to distract our minds from the terrible plight of lost humanity. He would not want us to face the reality of souls burning in hell, nor the responsibility we bear in their behalf. God is moving, awakening, stirring compassion within our hearts to go forth with the message of hope to the multitudes who are lost. Can you say with me, "Oh Holy Ghost, stir us today, and oh Holy Ghost, stir me today!"

We may attempt to justify our failure to reach the lost by various arguments, but are we justified in the eyes of God? Some may contend that our task is to gather the sheep which other people have converted. It is true that The Church is the fold into which the children of God must be brought for protection from false doctrines, and we do have the responsibility of providing for the perfection of the saints. Can we be effective in perfecting saints without employing them in soul winning?

Saints must possess and be activated by the spirit which Christ possessed, the spirit by which He was filled with compassion toward people's needs. While their physical needs became objects of His compassion, their greatest needs, viewed in His sight, were spiritual. It was these needs which led to the complete sacrifice of His own personal comforts and desires, and eventually of Himself at Calvary. Being possessed by His spirit will not allow us to be indifferent to the needs of people—the greatest of which is the salvation of

their souls. Genuine compassion will manifest itself in action.

In advocating a more vigorous evangelistic endeavor, I am not suggesting that we simply have more revival meetings. This alone will not fill the need. There must first be a revival of concern for the lost. I wonder if our pastors are spending enough time in preparation for evangelistic messages. These messages should not only grip the hearts of the unsaved who may be present, but keep before the church a vision of the lost, a vision which will arouse real compassion among the saints. This compassion will be reflected in efforts to reach souls beyond the sanctuary.

It is generally accepted that the Sunday morning worship service is a time for the pastor to preach to the church of a doctrinal nature to feed and strengthen the saints. It seems that most of our pastors take this responsibility seriously and devote a good bit of time in preparation. It may be that the other services are not as well prepared for and are approached in a more haphazard manner. I do not believe we can justify ourselves in this approach. We must somehow rekindle the fires of evangelism where they have gone out. In places where they are only smoldering, we must fan them into a blazing flame. It should not be expected that souls would be converted only in revivals. Each week should find us reaching out to bring lost souls to the Lord.

Let us make our Sunday evening services really evangelistic, as well as services conducted through the week. There is no point in going through a form at any time we come together. While this evangelistic fervor will manifest itself outside our places of worship, as members become involved in personal evangelism, it seems that it must be first fostered in our church services. Pastors, it is up to you to take the lead in a new thrust of evangelism in your local church. We cannot afford to fail.

TOMLINSON HOMES FOR CHILDREN

Tomlinson Home for Children, formerly known as the Sunday School Orphanage, has been operating in Bradley County for a little more than thirty-two years. During this time, according to our records, we have provided a home for 296 children here.

In recent years, because of generous governmental welfare assistance to those who will care for children in their homes, there has been a decline in the applications received in Cleveland. For the past few years we have accommodated a very small number of children each year, and now we only have six children in our Cleveland home.

At the same time, the Tennessee Department of Human Services has been increasingly restrictive in their regulations. There is a growing trend in this country to place children in foster homes rather than in institutions such as we have maintained. Of course, this is not true in many countries, and the homes we are now operating in Mexico, South Korea, India and Indonesia are faced with growing demands for their services.

It is the feeling of the Tomlinson Homes for Children Board of Directors

that it would be wise to discontinue operating our home in Cleveland but that we should maintain this work in other nations where the needs are great. At the present time we have around three hundred children in the four homes we are operating in those nations.

Since the remaining homes for children are being operated in mission nations, it might be helpful to discontinue our reference to them as Tomlinson Homes for Children, and refer to them as Mission Homes for Children instead.

It would take a little while to make satisfactory arrangements to take care of the six children remaining in the Cleveland home. If this Assembly should feel this is a wise course to pursue, the Tomlinson Homes for Children Board of Directors could proceed in this direction. The property, which joins the Tomlinson College property, could be utilized by the college to a great advantage.

The Questions and Subjects Committee may give consideration to these matters and bring their recommendations to the Assembly.

It might be good for this Assembly to give consideration to the funds being raised by our Sunday schools for the support of our children's homes. To provide a systematic means of support for Tomlinson College, we could consider a plan for dividing the funds raised by our Sunday schools between the Children's Homes abroad and Tomlinson College. Channeling some of these funds into the support of Tomlinson College would be beneficial to more of our Church children in this country than could possibly be provided through the continued operation of a home for children in Cleveland. I am asking the Ways and Means Committee to consider this matter and to bring before this Assembly some proposal they may deem wise.

TOMLINSON COLLEGE

This has been a good year for our college in which God has blessed us with substantial growth. In fact, we were unable to accommodate many students who applied for admission last year, and this year all the available on-campus housing was filled before the end of May. Therefore, it was necessary again to refuse entry to many students. Almost one hundred applicants were turned down because we did not have room.

We are thankful that our people are supporting our college, and that so many of our young people desire to attend. I wish we were able to accept all of them; however, due to limited facilities this is not possible at the present.

A plan has been drawn up to expand the college's facilities over the next seven years to accommodate six hundred on-campus students. This master construction plan is desired to advance in essential building areas as growth dictates.

The plan basically allows for three additional dormitories, an assembly building which would house the chapel, drama and music departments, a library, classroom buildings, expansion of student center and cafeteria, and the expansion of married students apartments. Most urgent at the present time seems to be the need for an additional dormitory and a library.

Many parents have expressed the desire that their sons and daughters

live on campus and will not give their consent for them to reside off campus. Of course, it is our desire also that the unmarried students be able to live on campus. We feel that six hundred on-campus students is a realistic goal for Tomlinson College toward which we would progressively work.

At the last Assembly I introduced to you the need for a library building. The college implemented various fund-raising programs and has raised \$35,000. This is not a sufficient amount, as the construction cost of this building is now estimated at \$175,000. The fund-raising efforts should continue; however, since the library needs to be built without further delay, it has been included in the master construction plan.

The suggested timetable for building according to the plan which has been drawn up is: a dormitory, a library building, a chapel, music and drama building in 1979; a classroom building in 1980; a dormitory in 1981; a student center and cafeteria expansion in 1982; library expansion in 1983; married students apartments expansion in 1984; a dormitory and classroom building in 1985.

While the revenue from the dormitories and apartments would be applied on the mortgage payments on those buildings, it should be understood that the major part of this expansion program would have to be supported by the General Church. The College Board of Trustees and the General Properties Committee would carefully examine the requirements and make the decisions as to if and when buildings would actually be constructed as indicated on the master plan.

I am asking the Questions and Subjects Committee, along with the Ways and Means Committee to give consideration to this long-range plan. It seems it would be best for a project of this magnitude to have the backing of the General Assembly. If approved by the Assembly, this would greatly assist the college in meeting the spiritual and educational needs of many of our young people.

THE WHITE WING MESSENGER

I am sure that no one doubts the value of *The White Wing Messenger* to The Church. This official publication of The Church reaches into thousands of homes each week with timely messages and reports which keep all abreast of The Church's progress throughout the world.

It has been five years since the Assembly has given financial consideration concerning the production of our Church paper. These five years have been years of accelerated costs in all phases of the printing and mailing of this publication. It seems necessary that some attention be given during the Assembly to these increased costs.

Paper, as well as some other graphic supplies, have nearly doubled in cost during this time. As recently as this past July, postage increases of approximately 45 per cent went into effect, in addition to other postage increases during these five years. All this causes an ever increasing deficit to be borne by The Church's General Fund.

To alleviate this increasing deficit, we seem to have two options: first—a substantial increase in the subscription rates. Second—making *The White*

Wing Messenger a bi-weekly publication with a smaller increase in the subscription rate. A bi-weekly edition could contain more pages than the present sixteen-page issue; yet, there would be some postage savings because of postal rate schedules in effect.

Several years ago when we reverted back to a weekly publication from a bi-weekly, a major reason seems to have been that we would be able to include more local news than a bi-weekly issue would allow. With the growth of The Church in the meantime, in order to follow a policy of being impartial to all our local churches, it has become necessary to limit the local news mainly to that of an unusual nature or rare happenings such as groundbreakings, dedication of new buildings, etc. We have been suggesting that most local news be submitted to the state or national papers.

Some have expressed the feeling that a little larger bi-weekly *White Wing Messenger* might be more attractive and have wider reader appeal than the present weekly edition. I am confident we can reach a decision in this Assembly that all can feel good about.

I am asking the Questions and Subjects and Ways and Means Committees to prayerfully consider this and bring a recommendation.

BIBLE TRAINING INSTITUTE REPRESENTATIVE

For many years the states and nations have been appointing state and national Bible Training Institute Boosters, as well as local church boosters. These boosters have proven a tremendous blessing in promoting and boosting Bible Training Institute.

There is a constant demand to reach new areas with Bible Training Institute. A total of thirty proposed schools are scheduled for this coming Assembly year. Bible Training Institute is scheduled to conduct a school in Indonesia and Brazil for the first time. Jamaica had an all-time high enrollment of 592 students to complete Bible Training Institute this year. We thank the Lord for our people desiring to know more about the Lord and His Church.

Commendation to the state, national and local boosters for promoting this important work. Since the General Assembly has never officially endorsed Bible Training Institute Boosters, perhaps it would be in order for the Assembly to consider that each state, nation, as well as each local church appoint a Bible Training Institute Representative for the purpose of promoting Bible Training Institute. These appointments could be made at the same time of the other appointments.

Perhaps the Questions and Subjects Committee would like to bring a recommendation to the Assembly regarding this matter.

The breastplate, also known as a harness, was a coat of mail, which protected the breast, the shoulders and the back. We also have offensive armor as referred to by the apostle. It consisted of the sword, the spear, the dart, the mace, the javelin, the sling, the bow and the arrow. It is our duty to fear God and keep His commandments. We have talked about the mystery of Christ and the Church, but He said we are going to have to be strong in the Lord, and everything will work out all right. I believe God is trying to get us to heaven, to believe in His Son and to work for Jesus to reach this lost world. Even when we receive Christ, the tempter comes to deceive us. We need to always depend on our Lord and the power of His might. We must stand in the strength of the Lord. The battles, persecution, temptation and trials will come, but we can be strong in the Lord and stand against the wiles of the devil.

Isaiah the 14th chapter is a perfect description concerning Lucifer, the devil. If we have on the whole armor of God, we will be shielded and He will guide us. Truth is correctness, established or verified fact. That sounds like Church of God doctrine to me; like the whole Bible rightly divided; like the armor of God. He speaks about righteousness. We need God's righteousness acting in a just upright manner, virtuous, morally and spiritually right or justifiable. He talks about our feet being shod with the preparation of the gospel. Gospel means good news. I am thankful that Bible Training Institute is having a great part in this. Continue to pray for Bible Training Institute Department that we might go forth and teach people concerning the whole armor of God.

Assembly Expense Committee Report

1. We wish to commend the ministry, members and friends of the Church for their faithfulness and cooperation in helping to raise funds for the expense of the Assembly this year.

2. We recommend that churches having less than 50 in Sunday school contribute annually \$2.00 to assembly expense; churches with Sunday school attendance between 50 and 100 contribute \$3.00 annually; and churches averaging over 100 in Sunday school contribute \$5.00 annually.

3. We recommend that each Victory Leaders Band contribute \$2.00 annually; we recommend that each Women's Missionary Band contribute \$2.00 annually; and each minister, including deacons and lay ministers, contribute \$1.00 annually.

4. We recommend that the pastors be responsible for collecting the Assembly Expense dollars for the auxiliaries and forward same to the State Overseer, and the State Overseer be responsible to collect the dollars from the ministers in his state. These funds should be mailed to the General Treasurer as soon as collected. Funds received toward end of year may be included with state convention auxiliary report to the General Treasurer.

It was in the Scripture that He would build His Church, but He couldn't become a builder until He built the Church. Christ knew what God required of Him, and He was very careful to do those things that pleased God. God's knowledge is to be recognized by the Church as divine, inspired, infallible truth and received with understanding and conviction and a willingness to accept future knowledge as revealed through the highest tribunal authority, the General Assembly in session. God has a Son at the head to bless His Church, but it is going to take obeying. There should be no schism in the body. Colossians 2:19. The body is joined together in joints and bands, but a joint is a connection between two members. (Congregation glorified God.)

5:24 Solo by Ken Baker. Undershepherds—demonstration by James Stone. John 21:15-17. Peter denied the Lord three times; confirmed his love three times and was commissioned to "Feed my sheep," three times. John 18:27; Ephesians 4:8. If the General Church is to be successful, it will be because of the local churches' success. Authority flows from top to bottom, but success flows from bottom to top. The office of ABM leaders has not fulfilled its role completely. If we don't get it in operation, we are going to be in trouble. The Church won't grow bigger than the pastor's ability. By the band leader, the pastor has an extended arm out to the congregation. The ABM was not created just to bring back members who are backslidden, but to keep them from backsliding.

EVENING

5:50 Song by Joyce Cowan. And the Churches Had Rest—message by Eugene Weakley. Excerpts: Acts 9:26-31. Though the early Church was young, it encountered turbulent times. Soon after being empowered for service with the Holy Ghost, we see the imprisonment of the apostles. One of the great tools of Satan upon the Church is to divert us from our goal and cause problems among us. Spending all of our time and energy to combat problems will not give time to explore the deeper things of the Holy Ghost. The early Church had rest and walked in the fear and comfort of the Holy Ghost and God.

God can keep us and the Old Ship of Zion stable in the midst of a storm, as He did Paul. We talk much about reproach, but what worries me is our reaction to it. 2 Corinthians 4:8; Mark 9:50. Salt is a seasoning. As we have this salt and be at peace among ourselves, we can effectively affect this world. Instead of a church fighting for survival, we can launch an offense. If we are distracted with minor things, we cannot get into the deeper things.

God worked to cause the external opposition to cease when the Emperor tried to place an image of himself in the temple. This diverted the outward opposition from persecuting the Church. The internal problem of Paul joining himself to the disciples was solved by God's help. John 7:24. The challenge is before us to get the formula that there will be such unity among us that God will touch their hearts. Until we can have this, "... endeavoring to keep the unity of the spirit in the bond of peace," those sheep will stay outside. Joshua did not act until he had the facts. Paul, with the facts of fornication did not have the Corinthian Church to act only to remove the reproach, but to save the person. There is no reproach big enough to destroy the Church of God. We can spend all of our time looking inwardly until we have no outward vision. When lambs are born in the Church of God, it reduces inward confusion. We cannot say we are internally pure without producing an increase. The ABM is an internal program. When you have the same sin inside which you see outside and remain silent, there can be no God-given increase.

More people backslide from not ministering to the unclean than they do by worldly attractions. There is a command to go as well as there is an inward work in the Church of God. It is false piety when there is no trembling before the holiness of God. When Thomas saw the risen Lord, he cried, "My Lord and my God." When Isaiah saw the holiness of God, he cried, "Woe is me." We are to submit to God's authority, bringing our understanding and submission to His will. The Christian world is promoting His promises without His requirements, but the Church must do both. Can we not be challenged to seek the deep things of God and not be distracted by other things? Everything is on our side but time. God is looking for His Church to have such unity of spirit among us that when the world looks on, they will see God in our midst. Band leaders, pastors, and all of us working and communicating with one another and endeavoring to keep the unity of the

spirit in the bonds of peace can bring this about.

If we will get in the Spirit, casting aside every buildup of self, God will draw men unto Him. Let God melt our hearts together and give us spiritual unity.

It is the same Word that appeared unto Moses in the burning bush; it is the same yesterday, today and forever. When He created the first human beings, He gave them an ordinance and told them to multiply. Jacob wrestled with the angel throughout the night and would not let him go until he was blessed. The angel said that no more shall ye be named Jacob, but Israel, a prince of God. Jesus established the Church of God. God is working in a special way in the Church of God. We must consecrate our lives in searching for God to be firm in His house. The Church of God

is not any ordinary thing—it is a holy nation. Nothing imperfect will be able to remain in the Church. I think of the Church as a flow of water. When the flow of water is rapid, nothing that does not belong can remain within it. The Church of God is in a blooming state. 9:50 Merchandise Department Presentations—Louis Sullivan. Have printed seven new books this year; presented to the General Overseer first copy of his book entitled *Let The Church Counsel Together*. C. T. Davidson and his wife testified briefly.

10:00 Sunday School Literature Editor, Richard E. Davis commented: Our departmental objectives are: to constantly evaluate the Bible curriculum in order to produce the best literature possible; trying to meet the challenge of the immediate future. We are being pushed into the forefront, and we must present the Gospel of Jesus Christ with power and authority and inspiration of the Holy Ghost. We have begun a new three-year adult curriculum in addition to our present five-year cycle. I ask myself what will the Church need in 1989? This year, we developed an adult curriculum for 1979; established a three-year youth curriculum; established a curriculum for these new languages: Zulu, Korean, Indonesian, Portuguese, Arabic, French, Malayalam, and Telugu. This has been possible through your response to the World Language outreach offerings. The doors of opportunity are opening. Let us continue to give and let God bless us in our work. We have produced a large-print quarterly; are studying the feasibility of a nursery curriculum. We are doing our best to meet the literature needs of the Church of God with God's help.

10:40 Comments by Mike Rovak who is a Hebrew. He played on violin, "Amazing Grace."

10:45 Give Ye Them to Eat—message by Felix R. Garcia, World Language Secretary. Excerpts: Mark 6:35-42. This is relevant to us today. This was a desert place and nothing around where they could buy. They wanted the Lord to send them away, but the Lord looked at them and said, "You give them to eat." They said that there was nothing around to give them to eat. They found that there were five loaves and two fishes. It wasn't meant to be that way. They were dumbfounded at the challenge Jesus issued to them. Jesus blessed the food and worked a miracle before their very eyes. The Lord did not permit Peter, James, John nor any other to multiply the bread and the fishes, because the only one who can give the necessary food for hungry souls is Jesus Christ. I get a lot of mail from organizations involved in printing and in spreading literature throughout the world. They have many beneficial programs, but that is not the bread these people will ultimately have to have in these last days. The real bread will have to come from the Body of Christ. When it comes time for God to feed the multitudes, He is not going to look at any denomination, individual nor use personality; He is going to use the glorious Church of God in the world today. We wonder how this is going to happen. There is so much to do and it will take so much money as there are so many languages. It isn't just a few men who are going to multiply the fishes, it is the whole Body of Christ.

You cannot work as an isolated member, because when you do, you begin to die. You cannot live without the strength and the nourishment that comes through the Body of Christ.

The Lord blessed the Church here in a marvelous way, and He supplied the needs for this year. We are now preparing Sunday school literature in nine languages which costs approximately \$3,000 a quarter for each language.

Last year the General Overseer said to the Ways and Means Committee to pick up the ark and get ready to move. We are about to cross the river! Find a way to supply money for the World Literature outreach, because we need to get the gospel to everyone in their languages. They came up with a recommendation that has truly proved a blessing to the Church. Church of God, get ready to march. I'm not talking about trying to swim across—we are going to walk across in the name of the Lord. We are marching throughout the world. Raise your hands. This is the body of Christ. (General Overseer prayed and people brought offerings.)

Interpretation of message in tongues—"Ye wait upon Me my people, obey Me and walk in My way. You are Mine, obey Me; listen to Me. I love thee, walk in My way. Obey Me and ye are Mine." (Prayer of thanksgiving and dedication for the offering by the Church Publishing Committee and Overseers; adjournment followed.)

12:45 Victory Leaders Program directed by Terry L. Mahan. Theme: My Faith Still Holds. Victory Leaders grand entry into tabernacle. Congregation prayed. Prayer by Darel Talbott. Gene Plank led congregation in singing.

1:05 When All Else Fails—Faith It—message by Terry L. Mahan. Excerpts: I said, "faith it—not fake it." I wonder if God is, in His register of heroes, still adding people who are faithing it. Could it be that God has His pen ready to add more verses to that chapter by some things that you young people are going to do for Him? Some of those verses may go like this—Faithing it; Michael Panzardi goes to the streets of New York City and works with gangs of tough people; Phil and Diana Pruitt leave the luxuries of the United States to give two years of their lives in the World Mission Corps; Bob and Sue leave the comforts of their local church, their fine job and risk going to Northern New England to work for God; Tom raises his hands and says, "Father, where you want me to go, I'll go." God may ask you to hit the streets with your ministry to some tough children. Faithing it is the daring of the soul to go farther than you can see; laying hold on the future in the midst of the present; continuing on while others say that we will never make it; reaching out when you don't see anything to reach for.

Promise after promise, and we say, "Well, I don't know if my youth group will grow; I don't know if my children will be saved; I don't know if God will ever move like He used to. There are God's promises all the time, and all we need to do is to faith it. The Lord showed me the direction. He would have my ministry to the young people to get as many as I can

excited about Christ and the Church.

We have had our programs inside the walls of our church for the preservation of the redeemed, but it is time we start reaching up for the evangelization of the lost; far too long we have been discriminatory in who we feel good about witnessing to. If we are on the solid rock, we have got to get them on something they can hold. My faith is committed to lost souls and to a Church that is reaching out for the lost. Have you been scared to go out of the walls of your church? Jesus told us that we are sheep and the world is filled with ravening wolves. The Old and New Testaments tell of the great force of history, the great future of history, and it can surely be said the glory of God doth lighten it and the Lamb of God is the light thereof. We can sit in our churches, and we can pray and cry until the Lord Jesus comes back, but He is expecting us to get out and go.

1:44 Exclusive Interview with Jonah, portrayed by Carson Malone and Galen Bell. Bill Hutton directed IYC Choir. Cheryl Bennett told of going with a youth mission team.

2:05 Steve Farmer testified of Shrinkless Faith: About two years ago, I was appointed pastor of a little church in Missouri. There was one family who had never attended church. One night I received a call to go quickly, that Alfred was dying. I had to go about one hundred miles to the hospital where I consoled the family a little and we had prayer and went home. They called me back again on Tuesday and I did the same thing again; called me back again Thursday, and I did the same thing; Saturday they called me again. While on the way, something hit me. You have had three chances to win this man and you have failed. I said, "Oh my Lord, I have spent three days traveling and never said a word to him about Jesus." I walked into that room, and he was dying; I didn't pay any attention to who was in that room except the man on that bed. I grabbed his hand and asked him if he knew Jesus, and he said he didn't. I told him the story of Jesus. I prayed and he repeated after me. He didn't know how to pray. There was a roomful of people, and I got eight members out of that room. They called me at the motel room, and said, "Mom wants you this time." Alfred was unconscious, but his mother got me in the waiting room with all the family, and told that during the night when just she and Alfred were in the room, he told her Someone else was sitting in the chair, and she told him that no one was there except her. He told her Jesus

was sitting there, and Alfred talked to Jesus the rest of the night. Young people now is the time for action.

2:20 Ron Craig told of these heroes of faith: Moses, Saul, Polycarp, and A. J. Tomlinson. Will we arise and be as heroic as these great men?

2:45 Prayer. Naomi Gandia told of Faith in Action: The Commission to the Church is go. I was sharing with someone the things I do, and this person stated he did not feel this is part of the program of the Church—prison ministry, reaching drug addicts and the prostitutes in the streets. One day God spoke to me and told me that I was born to serve the Lord and you are to go out there and do what I want you to.

Once I heard that things were taking place in a particular hill. They called me to go. I picked up the guy who was supposed to be holding the gun. They had broken into businesses and were getting desperate. I got the guy in my car for a ride, and I said, "Give me the gun." He wouldn't and I told him I would pray that the Lord would put a curse upon that gun and the next guy who uses it, until every policeman in this community would be after him until he was caught. That evening, he tried and was caught, his friend got the gun, and he got caught, and it happened the third time. A cable came out of Los Angeles county jail to get rid of the gun. The boys in that area know there is a living God and many have come to the Lord. They are out to win souls. We need more conservatives to conserve the faith that God has given us; more liberals who will let the Holy Ghost have His way; more people who are militant to fight against the wiles of the enemy. It got to me so I could neither eat nor sleep if the Lord didn't give me souls. We rejoice with everybody abroad, and that is great; they are a part of the Body, but what about this side of the Body? If the person who wins souls is wise, what about one that doesn't win souls?

3:15 Presentations for speech contest. Winners: Kathy Barrett, Nancy Tidwell, Michael Black. Congregation joined in thanking God for what He has done.

3:18 Public Relations Director, Bill White, introduced first Assistant General Overseer, Kenneth Massingale, of the Church of God of the Mountain Assembly. He greeted the Assembly.

3:30 Tomlinson College Program, directed by President Emerson Hall. Brass ensemble played as TC Staff and former and present students marched in. TC Chorale sang, directed by Larry Duncan. Dean of Students James Stone, gave information of the college in review, and he had an illustrated chart showing growth of college from 1966 to 1978.

3:43 Student Chaplain, Leroy Greenaway, commented: I am proud of TC because it is giving me an education which I can never receive elsewhere. We cater to the whole man, spiritual as well as physical. We are given a

well-balanced program which produces men and women who are able to cope with life. Some become so educated they cease to worship God, but I am glad to report that TC encourages its young people to worship God in spirit and in truth, and our faculty worships God in the spirit. We have to be so careful with our young people today that they are taught the right things. I have learned that with all my education, I must put it into effect for God and His Church. He has brought me where I am. I have met many friends from various parts of the world, and I have learned from them.

3:49 Jerry Adams spoke on Academics and Financial Services—The past three years we have seen some growth in the area of financial aid, and doors have been opened that our students could receive federal aid. Aid can come from grants, work and loans. Grants are based on income levels. Those who desire to be students should check into this. We have college work study on campus. Most states grant loans. Money is borrowed from a bank, and the federal government pays the interest while students are in school.

Academics are important. Throughout the Bible, God used trained people. Moses and Paul had the finest training the world could offer, and we could go on down the list. I am not saying you have to be educated to be used of God; it is the condition of your heart. Education can be dangerous, but other things are dangerous too—a sharp knife, electricity, automobiles, but we wouldn't think of taking them completely out of our lives just because they are dangerous. Scholarship with Spirit is our motto, and it means that we want to interweave the knowledge gained through education and the Spirit of God so the Church will move forward. We need church people who can meet people in their fields and take them the message of Jesus Christ and the Church.

4:02 Albert Ferguson told of TC Experience: TC trains ministers, but produces more than just ministers; has educators who are more than just educators; has student activities which are more than just activities; grants degrees which are more than just degrees; seeks more than just students; gives them experience which combines a unique blend of scholarships with a generous portion of spirit. As we move into another phase of its dynamic growth, your support is needed which can come in many ways. TC would like to be the college you choose for your children, family and friends. Please trust us to help you in that all-important task of molding the lives and the future of your loved ones and friends.

4:06 The Internationals sang, directed by Tim Coalter with Shirlene Stone, organist; Duke Stone, pianist.

4:20 Foster Bell told of Spiritual Life at TC—Though we are an educational institution, unlike most schools, TC has a definite priority of spiritual things. It is the spiritual life on campus that makes TC exciting. In a sense, we have a church. We have chapel services twice a week. The real teacher on our campus is the Holy Ghost. Twice a year we have Spiritual Emphasis

Week. We believe TC will send out some leadership. A wise old man told me that education will only make you more of what you already are.

4:30 Melvin Hyatt and Jerry Moates told of TC Alumni Association. Alumni present were recognized. God is blessing our graduates and students and using them within the Church.

4:40 Alumni faculty member Gary Fuller spoke: I believe in TC and what it stands for. We are in the greatest business that any company of the world could be in. We have the great responsibility of taking the whole message to the whole world. Some have to be trained. I ask you to support the college by personal scholarships. Support TC, it is worth it.

4:42 Alumni student Tom Reininger spoke: I came to TC as a new-born babe in Christ, and TC formed my life on how to serve Jesus Christ. The instructors are our friends. We are taught that Jesus Christ is the greatest psychologist in the world. TC has much to offer you, and I would like to plant this thought—do not follow where the path may lead, but go instead and leave a trail. I believe TC is leaving a trail for the Church.

4:44 Instrumental by TC Music Department.

4:49 President Emerson Hall spoke: We have raised approximately \$35,000 on a new library. The students did a great part of this. Brother Hall expressed appreciation for all who have contributed. (Offerings listed elsewhere). If one contributes for the library in memory of a loved one, a plaque will be placed in the library.

God has blessed us with an over abundance of fine students. I thank God for our growing pains. Many private colleges are struggling to survive, but not so in God's program. The Church is marching on to victory, and the college is an intricate function marching on to victory along with the Church. Had we the facilities and could have processed all the applications, I believe we could have enrolled 400 students this year. We have 275. We were unable to build, except minor construction and modifications, without your approval. The General Assembly needs to know what is going on at the college, and it needs to be involved in its operation. We must plan carefully for expanded enrollment. God expects this of us, as it is His program. We have submitted a plan to the General Assembly, and I am sure there may be some adjustments in the timetable. There is a great amount of work to be done—not only at the college but throughout the entire Church. Praise God for the Church for we have demonstrated over and over that whatsoever our hands findeth to do, we do it mightily. (Board of Trustees stood behind Brother Hall as A. J. Coalter led concert prayer in behalf of the future of TC.)

5:00 Public Relations Director, Bill J. White, introduced State Representative Ben Longley, who spoke briefly.

5:10 Overseer, Prince J. Blackson gave news from Ghana: In these last days, God is governing His people and bringing them into the Church of God of Prophecy. I would like for you to travel with me to Ghana, West Coast of Africa, to see what God has done. I was born into a Catholic family about forty-two years ago. I loved the Catholic Church and planned to study to become a priest. My mother didn't want me to go, so I became disappointed and took my rosary to go to the Catholic Church to pray to St. Mary to change my mother's feelings. While on my way, I saw a man giving out Christian literature, which we were not allowed to read. I planned to get some of that literature to burn, and I went to a nearby shop to get some matches. Something said burn, and something said read. In that valley of decision, one of those tracts fell on the ground, and I read: "For God so loved the world that He gave his only begotten son that whosoever believeth on him shall not perish but have everlasting life." Immediately I was convicted and knelt down and asked God to have mercy on me and please come in to stay and to cleanse. Jesus came into my heart. I raced home to tell mother that the real Jesus had come into my heart and you are a sinner. She said, "What do you mean, I brought you into this world and you tell me I am a sinner." I told her that I wanted to challenge her to accept my Jesus into her heart. Without any delay, my mother accepted Jesus. If you are saved, you can't keep it quiet, so I told my two sisters they were sinners, and they accepted Jesus. This happened the same day, and the mission had just begun. I challenged my friends to accept Jesus, and in about a year 1,000 people were meeting in front of our home. I

realize the hand of the Lord was on me, and when one accepted Jesus, I challenged him to tell another. The Bible says, "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel." This "go ye" is not just for the minister, but it is for everybody. Each one telling another about Jesus; and to date, I would like to report 60,000 members have taken the covenant. Ezekiel 3:17, 18.

Soul winning should be our priority. Members of the Church of God must know that our duty is to present the whole message to the whole world. If we don't warn people and point the Church to them, they are going to be lost. Everybody winning somebody, made a chain reaction. In my country when you are born again, you are born to reproduce. We have physical reproduction, and we must have spiritual reproduction. Jesus is going to come and take the Church that is spotless, without blemish, the glorious Church. If we don't tell the glorious gospel to somebody, some people are going to tell it the wrong way. Recently we had a baptism service with more than 1,000 people baptized. Everybody is getting involved. Let us do the soul-winning business before it is too late. It took me sixteen years to find this glorious Church of God. Jesus is coming for the Church—the Bride. I have come here to see with my eyes that the Church of God of the Bible is here and the gates of hell shall not prevail against it. At long last I have found the Church way back in Africa. When you have found the Church, you know something is settled; you become satisfied, you can sleep soundly; everything is so beautiful. I have found the Church and nobody can change my mind. I am not going to quit, because I searched for it sixteen years. When I go, I am going to do a little better.

6:45 World Mission Program directed by Adrian L. Varlack. Theme: "... in every nation he that feareth him, and worketh righteousness, is accepted ..." Acts 10:35. Janice Varlack read Acts 11:1-18.

7:10 Progress Reports from Around the World by Representatives: Asia and Australia—Bobby R. Snow: In the Asia, Australia, Middle East and Pacific Ocean area, we have 338 churches with 29,715 members in ten nations. These are some of the uttermost parts of the earth that the Church must evangelize. The more people in the world to be reached, the greater the challenge for you and I to be involved in the mission program to reach these people with the message of the Church of God of the last days. The potential for growth in the areas where the Church is established varies, but some are on the threshold of rapid growth. Were it not for the vision of the Church of God, the work would be overwhelming; but with God and man there is a

majority. Would you join me in prayer that the time the Lord allots us to get the work done that He opens the doors He wants opened. Samoa is open for the Church message. Would you join me in prayer for this group and all the other islands of the sea that are waiting for the law of God! Victory Leaders, this is a challenge to you. The more people there are, the more does the grace of God abound toward them. Join me in prayer that the Lord of harvest would send forth laborers into the fields.

Caribbean Islands—Alvin S. Moss: To God be the glory, great things He has done. I am very joyful to report that the Church has been organized in a new Caribbean nation—Grand Cayman Islands, through the untiring efforts of Mervin Curry our missionary. I preached 153 sermons, conducted 291 prayer meetings, assisted in administering communion services and ordaining bishops and deacons; wrote monthly letters to National and Territorial Overseers of Jamaica and the Caribbean area; dedicated three church buildings; assisted in dedication and groundbreaking services in Bahamas and Puerto Rico. I gratefully acknowledge the valuable assistance, concern and cooperation of our General Overseer and the World Mission Secretary. The work is increasing rapidly in the Caribbean in every aspect—spiritually, physically and numerically. Our people are stirred with the Word of God, and the increase is considerable.

7:33 Margie and Janice Lawrence sang, "The Harvest Is Plentiful but the Laborers Are Few."

7:40 Progress Report of Europe and Africa by Representative Roy D. Mixon: Isaiah 23:1, 26:2. It seems that this is the greatest year the Church has had. Gates of other nations have been opened this year so that the righteous nation, which keeps the truth, could enter. It was my privilege to go to Ghana on the West Coast of Africa and meet Prince J. Blackson in October, 1977, and establish the Church in that nation.

In June, 1978, the Lord blessed me to establish the Church in Abijan, Ivory Coast. The gates of another nation in Africa were opened for the righteous nation to enter. I visited Christians in Copenhagen, Denmark, and an American church on Dag Hammarskjolds Boulevard; Helsinki and Jyvaskyla, Finland, where there are prospective members. I fellowshipped with three groups of Christians in Stockholm, Sweden; met some people in Rome, Italy, who have received the baptism of the Holy Ghost.

In February, I was in Rhodesia, Botswana, Malawi and South Africa. The Lord has blessed the Church with a wonderful growth in all these nations. Rhodesia and Malawi are having a nice growth even while their war continues. Our work is growing in Swaziland, Egypt, Sierra Leone, Nigeria, Zambia and Germany. Many servicemen have found the Lord while in Germany and a number of Germans are attending the services. Our work in Greece, Cyprus, Egypt, Sierra Leone, Portugal, and England is moving forward. We need more teaching and training of workers in each nation. The Lord has blessed me to make contacts and place literature to people of: Denmark, Sweden, Finland, France, Poland, Austria, Bulgaria, Hungary, Russia, Czechoslovakia,

Ireland, Scotland, Wales, Italy, Tanzania, Kenya, Zaire, Mozambique, Liberia and Spain. Some are potential prospects.

8:00 Stella Torres spoke about the youth mission team which went to Brazil where she served as sponsor. She introduced team members Debbie Gibbons and Cheryl Bennett.

8:05 Progress in Mexico, Central and South America by Representative Raul Torres: This Assembly year has swiftly slipped by, and many wonderful things have taken place for the edification of the Body of Christ. Our work in Bolivia is experiencing great growth. Property is becoming an urgent need in many of the Latin American countries. The Lord is moving in a special way in Central America. In these six countries, the Lord has blessed the Church with 1,152 new members, 18 new churches, 4,484 saved and many miraculous healings. Our evangelistic endeavors are more effective and there is greater love and loyalty to Christ and His Church.

Our people are grasping the Church message and are now comprehending the Church's role on this earth. Our people are eager for Bible truths; many are receiving a divine revelation of the Church of God that is unshakeable. It is no wonder that Jesus proclaimed, "Upon this Rock, I will build my Church and the gates of hell shall not prevail against it." In Guatemala, El Salvador, Honduras and Costa Rica, the Lord has blessed and properties have been purchased in the capital cities on which to build national tabernacles and offices. These and more wonderful things are being accomplished by the Church of God because we have been obedient to Christ's command of, "Go ye and teach them to observe all things." Joshua 1:8.

Our work in Mexico has had its difficulties, but it has continued. It is a great joy to visit these areas and see the radiant love of Jesus flowing from their faces. The Church of God is bringing the Word, which many have received and have found that there is hope. Latin America is experiencing revival—not only the Church of God. The Holy Ghost is doing with the other sheep what Jesus said He would do, "Guide into all truth." The Helping Hands Ministry has provided many needs for Latin America.

Larry Duncan led in singing "Tis a Glorious Church" and "When the Church of God Arises." Repeated Church Flag pledge. The Spirit of the Lord came down.

9:19 “. . . That your fruit should remain . . .”—message by Adrian L. Varlack. Excerpts: John 15:16. This is a very moving discourse which our Lord had with His disciples shortly before His crucifixion. Without absolute dependence on Christ for power to perform His work and obey His commands, we are nothing and can do nothing. The test of good government is whether it can adequately meet the needs of its citizens without interfering with essential freedoms. The Spirit of the New Testament Church government is one of unselfish service based on love. We must constantly strive to use persuasion instead of power; entreaty instead of harsh rebuke; love instead of force; meekness instead of arrogance. The teachings of our Lord with respect to government emphasizes service instead of Lordship; patience instead of anger; stewardship instead of ownership.

In the Early Church, certain accommodations had to be made to ascertain that their fruit endured. Tender plants must be watered, cultivated and carefully nurtured in order for them to survive. Much more care must be given to the young delicate buds which will grow into flowers, subsequently producing the fruit which assures the character, life and continuity of the tree.

We must so order our affairs that when the fruit is harvested there is room in the barn for all the grain. If we are hesitant to allow newcomers full participation in the privileges and responsibilities of the Church, our fruit will not remain. Christians have been discriminated against, oppressed, ignored, and exploited. The Church is their city of refuge to which they may come and find peace and safety. We cannot teach the gospel with an air of superiority. Many who have come in the past are no longer with us because our attitudes have driven them away—not the truth, the message nor the Church, but our superior attitude. God does not consider it a trivial matter for leaders to oppress His people, to exact of them compliance with non essentials nor to place upon them undue burdens. His Word condemns the exercise of Lordship and ownership over His heritage. We did not choose Him; He chose us; He empowers us; He saves us; He will perfect us through His Word and by the Spirit. This is His Church, and He reigns supreme. John 15:6-8.

11:20 In the Telling—message by Elva Howard, preceded with prayer by Frank Howard. Excerpts: In the Book is God's plan for the ages. His plan is from eternity to eternity. Malachi 3:6. God created man for fellowship. Through redemption, God retained that fellowship. God's purpose was declared to Abraham in Genesis 12:3. He renewed that covenant with Isaac and again with Jacob. "In the fulness of time," Galatians tells us that the blessings would flow from the heart of God through Jesus Christ as was prophesied by Zecharias. Here is the light to lighten the Gentiles. The angels announced to the shepherds that He would bring good tidings of great joy unto all people. God, in the beginning, said "I will bless." Christ was to have dominion. Psalm 2:8. Zechariah said, "Speak peace to the nations." I am convinced that we have let the magnitude of the job diminish our zeal. We look at the world map and say, "My, God, how shall we reach the world?" We will only reach it as we give our bodies to God and He reaches it through us. The Bible says it will be reached. If we stand on divine healing because of Isaiah 53:5, then we can stand on missions where it says, "Ask of me, and I will give you the heathen." Ultimately all parts of the earth shall be reached by the gospel. We believe it because it has been preached to us, but we can't figure out how it is to be done. God's plan is not our plan. God's desire is toward all the people of the world.

We need the approval of God. Jesus declared the field is the world, and the whole creation will be touched by this message because He said, "All

people." He loves to embrace the world. That is why He said, "For God so loved the world." It is easy to shout about Brother Blackson in Ghana and Brother Pardede's work in Indonesia, and I am thrilled; but in the American cities, somebody could repeat this scene every year. All men will hear the gospel, but only those who accept Christ personally as their Saviour will be saved. Some say they don't know enough about the Church to explain it to others. That is not what a witness is for. Let the preacher teach about the Church. A witness is to tell what he has experienced. If doubt has a place in our lives, we cannot be effective witnesses. Only believers can be witnesses. A herald is a mouth of the message; a witness is a mouth of experience.

A public crier may announce or proclaim for hire. He shouts up and down the street what he has to sell or tell. A witness can speak only of what he knows and can testify only of what he has seen, heard and felt. One could be full of wisdom and love, but his witness would be useless unless he had experienced the transforming grace of God. God can't use angels to proclaim the message of salvation, because they never tasted it. An angel appeared to Cornelius, but Peter, directed by the Spirit, gave the message. It is a privilege to be a witness. God's plan embraces the whole Church actively engaged to reach the whole world. We cannot carry this message in our own strength; it must be through the power of the Holy Ghost. The Holy Ghost can do great things through us. Daniel said to the king that my God is able to deliver me. If the power of the Holy Ghost is inside you, He will go with you and see you through the fire, the flood and the test. We must have the Spirit of the Lord. The apostles were afraid to witness boldly until desperate situations sent them to their knees. Acts tells that when they had prayed the place was shaken. Tell it, tell everyone, tell the nations.

1:43 People Now—message by Fred S. Fisher, Sr. Excerpts: Sunday school is one of the most important schools in the world. People need our witness; there is no other way to fulfill the great commission. Acts 1:11. I heard a bank commercial, "We keep people hours." Formerly banking hours were from nine to one o'clock. The banks have set up a schedule for the people who keep them in business. They are willing to do whatever it takes to meet the needs of the people. The fast food service is a prime example of how changes are taking place. Not only have the physical needs of man been studied, but those things which appeal to man psychologically. I would like to leave these three things with you: going, giving and gaining.

Going where people are. Acts 1:8, 11. It is wonderful to have an upward look, and we should always be looking for the coming of the Lord, but just merely looking for Him in an awesome wonder, and failing to do His work is not what our Lord intended. He said in essence to go where the people are. The New Testament shows by the address of certain books of the Bible that the ministers' pulpits of the Church were the large metropolitan cities of that day—cities of: Corinth, Philippi, Ephesus, Athens and Rome. The commission is for us today to go where the people are. A hundred years ago, 15 per cent of the population in the United States was in urban areas. In 1970, 73.5 per cent of our population lived in urban areas. Over 140,000,000 people live on 2 per cent of the land population of the United States. There is a great need of inner-city evangelism all over the world. Not only in the urban areas are there needs, but in the inner-city.

The next is giving people the Word of God. A lonely abandoned society needs to know that Jesus loves them. The Church has the guarantee of the Word of God. It is the foremost objective of our responsibility. John 12:32. Above our money-raising and organizing programs and everything else that we do, we must remember: "If I be lifted up, I will draw all men unto me." Mark 16:15. People are personal and there are differences. What might touch me might not touch you. We must be wise in our approach to people. Our

General Overseer has mentioned about the Church suffering with growing pains, and what wonderful pains they are. I am sure when the move was made to the World Headquarters Office Complex that there were memories and sadness, but we had to move. We must stay open-minded and ready to advance so it will enable us to reach people. A church must always be people minded. We will have to guard against tradition and methods. Some of our churches are the same size they were when they were organized. Let's grow.

The third item is gaining the people to Christ. Let's give the gospel to them and win them to Christ and work them into His Church. They need to know that Jesus loves them and the Word of God sent to them. We must be willing to give to whatever method God allows us to use. I like padded pews, Hammond organs, carpeted aisles, but they don't have these in a reform school, in the penitentiary, psychiatric ward, drug gangs and on skidrow; but they need to know Jesus and the Church of God loves them. We must use some of the same weaponry that the world uses. Wherever sinful men and women are, that is where we need to be. In America, where I have been the past few years, very few sinners are attending church in the U.S. Lookout, United States of America! Are we growing with those who are growing? Is it possible we have learned how to raise the money and they have learned how to save the souls? A. J. Tomlinson said that you can't stand and guard the faith all the time. You have to get on offense and run with the message. Go, give and gain.

3:00 Have You Heard?—message by General Secretary. Excerpts: Throughout the Bible, we find the teacher has a strategic position in the program of God. As the revelation of divine truth was given, the importance of this ministry increased. Moses commanded the people to gather together to hear the words of God so they might teach them to their children, making it a continuous process. During Moses' review of the Law, God's command was affirmed that they were to teach the Law. He emphasized that it should be diligently and regularly taught. Deuteronomy 6:7. The teaching ministry

continued in the New Testament. Jesus taught and He commissioned His Church to a teaching ministry: Jesus called unto Him whom He would and began to teach them as He organized His Church. Christ gave the Church a teaching commission. God describes the teaching ministry as being the main link between the Church and the people. The function of the Sunday school is to teach. You are to teach all nations, and you are going to have some conversions and you need to do some baptizing. Go, teach, have converts, baptize those converts, teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you. The Scriptures tell us that daily in every house they taught; they ceased not to preach and teach Jesus Christ. Paul and Barnabas taught in Antioch and left teachers; Paul taught in Ephesus and Corinth. When he started writing, they had forgotten some of the things he taught.

Some of us are not building on a strong enough foundation because we are not doing those things we are being taught. Every great revival and spiritual awakening has come when individuals had a hunger for the Word of God and to hear what God had to say. Evangelism must emphasize the Word. Faith cometh by hearing, but what are you going to hear? The Bible gives us principles for living. Times have changed, and we are changing, but God is just the same today. The Bible is not a book of the month or of the year, but it is the Book of ages. Church of God, He is talking to us, and we have to listen. We are wanting the world to recognize who we are, and we are not even finding out what the promises of the Book are to us. If we are going to go, we had better go with the Word of God. Mark 16:20. They went everywhere, and the Lord was with them and confirmed the Word with signs following. The Lord is going to confirm His Word, but we are going to have to be found going everywhere teaching His Word, and we will see Him working with us with signs following.

6:30 Public Relations Outreach—master of ceremonies, Bill J. White, Director. Theme: Community Awareness.

6:40 Public Relations and Pastor—A. W. West. Comments: I live in a small town in the mountains of California. Our church was small and unable to build a new church building. I received a call from a minister of a neighboring church inviting me to participate in chapel service for our convalescent hospital. We met a woman with a beautiful spirit taking care of those precious people, and she was vibrant with the love of God. She said, "Pastors, these people are not numbers nor statistics, but they are human beings who have something to contribute to our community." I asked the brethren if they had a local ministerial association. They said

that it had been dormant for years. The other ministers with me were in favor, and seven pastors met to discuss forming an association. I told them that we didn't have to come with any beliefs nor church doctrinal points, but we need to reach this community. I was voted president. In our meeting was a man from the American Legion, and he asked us for the full chaplain service. We gained back the baccalaureate service from the school; had an Easter service each year. There is a great unity and love among the ministers. I told them once that I didn't come to the community just to pastor my church, but I came to pastor the community. There is a wonderful work in our communities. I appreciate what God has done for us in Cloverdale.

6:50 Sandra Cook told of Public Relations and the local church: Eggville Satellite Center is the community center for students and senior citizens which meets in the local church building at Union Grove, Mississippi. This program is administered through the state welfare department, and the Lee County Board of Supervisors is our sponsor. Jimmy Lee Lawson, a member of our church, is supervisor. They quilt, make macrame items, flowers and play games. They also make trips to places of interest. Our pastor, T. A. Cook, serves on the county advisory committee for senior citizens and participates in special programs at the center. City officials have attended special programs in the sanctuary of our local church. We receive free publicity and have an automatic outreach through the extension department of the Sunday school. We receive about \$3,000 yearly for rent and utilities for use of the hall. This gives us a chance to witness to these people about the Lord and the Church of God. We are most interested in their souls.

6:56 Public Relations and the Member: Ina Mae Tomlinson told of her duties as Red Cross Hospital Volunteer as our Public Relations Director interviewed her: I became dissatisfied and felt like I wasn't doing anything worthwhile. I didn't want to live to myself, but I wanted to give of myself. We had volunteers in the Church. Sylvia Hardin was one, and she really let her light shine and was an inspiration to me. I enjoy it very much and hope that I have been a blessing to someone. Sometimes the work is very hard. Our hospital is quite large, and we go over it often, but I feel like I am doing something to be a blessing to people and letting my light shine. I get calls asking me to pray for them, and I feel they must have a little confidence in me. Once in awhile, I speak to someone about the Lord. They tell us what we can and can't do, but I try to get a word in for the Lord. I would like to encourage our ladies to get involved in the community somehow, because this is the only way they are going to find out about the Church and the things of God.

7:05 Jewel White sang. Proclaim Ye This Among the Gentiles—message by Bill J. White. Excerpts: Joel 3:9-14. The second chapter of this book causes me to believe that this Scripture was not only written for Joel's time, but

for the time in which we live. We need to proclaim the gospel like we have never proclaimed it before; with an understanding and a measure of faith that we have never experienced before, because God is getting ready to exercise His judgment upon the world. We see in this more than just God moving on people and filling them with the Holy Ghost. He said He would pour out upon them. We are facing a challenge to reach out to people who think and have attitudes like no other generation of Christians have faced. I would like for you to think about the generation that is in control today.

Baby boom group—this is the post-war group that came in a few short years after World War II. Men and women came to the realization because of the Atomic bomb that men had technological knowledge that they could destroy human beings off the face of the earth. Out of this era came the group known as the hippies who moved into college ranks and caused much rioting and rebellion. We cannot preach Jesus without preaching the Church; we cannot preach the Church without preaching Jesus. We are not talking about proclaiming to the world what is right and what is wrong in the sense of is it wrong to kill someone or to steal or do this or that. I am talking about a challenge far greater than that. Most people will tell you it is wrong to steal or kill someone, but the challenge we face is to prove to the world that there is a God. It is so easy to push this off and say that it is a fairy tale. We need to grow up in the Lord and reach out to the Lord and with the challenge we are faced with. We individually are doomed—not the Church. The Church will succeed, but you and I are challenged to proclaim the message of Jesus Christ in a practical, workable, understandable, even though miraculous, a realistic approach to the Word of God. As Paul said, "Let love be without dissimulation." We must move on to those things as the Scripture encourages us to move on to perfection. I challenge you to proclaim this gospel of Jesus Christ by your practical, workable, everyday living. Pastors, I challenge you to reach out in your communities; to find avenues to work in. Members, I challenge you to find ways of reaching into your communities and let people see your workable, practical, understandable salvation. I challenge every local church to get behind your pastor collectively and make your public relations efforts work.

7:32 Servicemen's Program, directed by Bobby R. Snow, Representative. Twenty-eight servicemen/women marched in and sat in reserved area. Offering received. Appreciation expressed by Representative.

7:58 E. E. Van Deventer sang. Introduction of servicemen. Chaplains Raymond Brown and Doug Stevenson prayed, followed by congregational prayer. Songs by the Ron Gardner Family.

8:20 "The Pillar and the Ground of the Truth"—message by Bobby R. Snow. Excerpts: Many people are standing today for many things. Aren't you glad that you can stand on the rock Jesus? I believe we could accept

the fact that Truth in a fleshly body dwelt among men. The words He spoke and the life that He lived in the flesh were truth. When Jesus came into the world, He laid a foundation—the Body of Christ; the Church of God was truth. The apostles and prophets were a part of that truth. The Church is not promoting the various sciences of the world; but in many of these areas of learning, there is much truth. It is the duty and responsibility of every member of the Church to support the truth. We pledge ourselves in a covenant that we will take the whole Bible rightly divided and that we will support total and complete truth. When those leave the Church, they have left the pillar and ground; the foundation upon which supports the truth. When you leave this ground upon which the truth of God's Word is supported, you can believe anything you want to and do anything you want to. As long as you are standing on the rock in the Church of the living God, there are certain things you are going to have to do. The Advice to Members tells us how far we can or can't go; but if you are upholding the truth, you are not going to wonder how close you can get to the edge. You will be in the middle supporting the divine revelation and truth of the Church of God that God has revealed. Anywhere in the world where you see this sceptre, star and crown with the red, white, blue and purple, that represents truth. John 12:32. We need to lift the truth to the masses. If you preach one thing, and I preach another, people are going to realize that somebody is not on the same foundation. If we will stand on this pillar and ground of the truth, we all will speak the same thing and generate a degree of unity that we have heretofore not known. 1 Corinthians 3:11. We may not all see eye to eye, but if we stay on this foundation, we will see eye to eye. In taking the whole Bible rightly divided, we are saying that we take all the truth of God's Word. You are entitled to ideas and opinions, but there are no ideas and opinions of God's Word.

Many times we speak so boldly because we have grasped a piece of wisdom; but along with this wisdom, should have come a measure of meekness of God.

Every evil work could work its way into our fellowship and cause confusion and all of the ultimate results. The wisdom from above is pure, clean and innocent from anything contrary to God. When you have something precious, you take care of it. When Jesus came to the world, He said, "My peace I give." The devil came to introduce anguish and pain. If we will study and pray about it, we will be able to apply the peace that will calm the storm. Jesus did not send peace to combat the storm; He sent peace to calm the storm. When Satan introduces something, it is second to the power of God. Wisdom from God is gentle, and He applies the blood to our sin, to our error, to our weakness. He doesn't argue with the devil, He applies redemption. The wisdom of God is easily entreated. If we will have the wisdom of God, we will have the virtues of God with which to apply it. The wisdom is there, but we are the applicators. The wisdom of God is full of mercy. If you go to somebody in trouble with a lot of forgiveness and mercy, they will know that you are not there to condemn, but to help free them from the bonds of hate. There cannot be any ulterior motives for helping, no glory for yourself, you are only a servant of the Lord. You are taking what God has placed in your life when He endued you with wisdom, and you are letting that flow from your life. The Bible teaches tolerance. You are giving it to God and letting Him know you will go until He works a work that will free that person. I am not saying we tolerate forever, but we tolerate so that this wisdom that is pure, gentle and easily entreated can work. There is space in our lives for great improvement in this area. We are doing better with the faith than we are the unity. We cannot skip unity. It is said that unity is just personality and character.

It was Robert Browning who said, "Grow old along with me; the best it yet to be . . . the last of life for which the first was made."

It has been a most rewarding experience this year to supervise the activities in the Ministerial Aid and Church Benefit Department. I thank the Lord for an able staff of workers and they are really due much credit for the way they have carried me and assisted me this year. I would like to thank each of them for their splendid work and cooperation.

I visited the Bahamas Ministers' Convention and conducted a seminar at the Puerto Rico National Convention to explain various programs offered through the Department. I attended the funerals of three ministers who passed away this Assembly year. I initiated the Golden Wings of Prayer Prayer Chain which now has approximately 490 members in most of the 50 states of America, in addition to the nations of Anguilla, Bahamas, Botswana, Canada, Cyprus, Dominican Republic, England, Guatemala, Guyana, Haiti, India, Jamaica, Mexico, Montserrat, Nevis, Panama, Peru, Philippines, Puerto Rico, Turks Islands, and Virgin Islands.

I organized and hosted the Christmas party for our senior ministers and members in the Cleveland area, and hosted a Pre-Assembly reception for the Senior Ministers Association and Prayer Group in Cleveland. I have written and submitted articles and other materials along with my staff for two special issues of *The White Wing Messenger*.

I have entertained conferences and special meetings with outside agencies to study programs that may be beneficial to the insurance needs of our people throughout the year. I have answered all correspondence of business coming to my attention, and supervised all phases of work in my Department. I have looked after the Minister's Retreat Home and brought into the Department a Social Worker to administer to the personal need of some of our recipients.

Ministerial Aid Committee Report

August 1, 1977 through July 31, 1978

The Ministerial Aid Committee has held 12 meetings and approved 17 applications for retirement, 12 for modified retirement, and 35 for disability retirement. Five former recipients were reinstated, 19 recipients have passed away, and allotments for six were cancelled.

Applications for five widows of former recipients of Ministerial Aid benefits were approved to receive 50 per cent of their deceased husband's allotment. Seven applications were approved for widows of deceased full-time ministers to receive assistance. That made a total of 81 new applicants, an increase of 19 from last year.

We have 96 ministers receiving retirement benefits; 87 receiving modified retirement benefits; 186 receiving disability retirement benefits; 62 widows of deceased recipients; 41 widows of deceased ministers; and 10 lay-employees receiving assistance, making a total of 482 recipients in the United States and other nations.

This year 47 of our ministers passed away and there were two additional deaths reported for a prior year. The Ministerial Aid Committee approved 45 Proofs of Death, with a total of \$33,000.00 paid from the Ministerial Aid Fund to the beneficiaries.

The Committee provided 16 Church Flags to be presented by the officiating ministers to the next of kin, as a Memorial Tribute on behalf of the deceased minister, and a Church Flag Memorial Certificate was sent to each recipient of a Church Flag.

The Retirement Plan that went into effect on January 1, 1977, now has 206 participants. The plan is known as a Tax-Sheltered Annuity Plan. The total contributed to the plan by the ministers and employees since its beginning is \$104,588.00. The Church makes a matching contribution under a Deferred Compensation Program. The amount placed in the account for the past year was \$39,633.00.

The Ministerial Aid Committee is most thankful to God for His great generosity in providing funds for the worthy cause of helping the Church fulfill its obligation to the ministry. The Committee is constantly seeking ways and means to help our worthy ministers who have given so much of themselves for the upbuilding of the Church and the glory of God, at a tremendous sacrifice of themselves and their families, not expecting a reward, as their reward is the satisfaction in knowing they were doing the will of God.

The Committee is aware of the ever pressing need to expand the benefits of the Ministerial Aid and give consideration to more of our ministers, especially those working in secular fields while pastoring small churches and state secretaries who, with present policies set down in the Purposes and General Policies Booklet, find it difficult to make the criteria for approved retirement. The Committee therefore requests the permission to upgrade and make changes in the General Policies as the need arises.

APPENDIX A TO MINISTERIAL AID REPORT

The Tidewater District Pastors Association of P.O. Box 214, Carrollton, Virginia 23314, has some questions regarding our Tax-Sheltered Annuity Program. A meeting was held during the Assembly between those brethren and the Ministerial Aid Committee and all their questions were resolved satisfactorily.

The Old Pension Plan that was approved in 1968, has been successfully terminated and every participant's assets will be distributed in just a few days. Each participant will get a nice profit on their investment.

From the Public Relations office we have sent out over 35,000 tracts, leaflets and booklets; one large Church Flag and accompanying literature for a Flag Museum in Alabama; 12 copies of **The Church of God of Prophecy History and Polity** to college students for religious research; 2 sets of **Upon This Rock** for college libraries; 8 copies of **Basic Bible Beliefs** for some of the more serious inquiries and 6 copies of **These Stones Speak** for Community Awareness guest speaker presentations.

I visited 23 radio stations and 4 television stations doing public relations work. I was interviewed on 2 radio programs and participated in the dedication of one radio station. I prepared and taught lessons on "Public Relations and Broadcasting" in a seminar in Puerto Rico. I also appeared on two television programs giving a church progress report on one and preaching on the other.

I produced and recorded the 5-minute "Religious News International" broadcast which is aired free of charge over 25 radio stations.

In civic service I served as the liaison agent between the Church and the YMCA in sponsoring the Anita Bryant Concert held in the Assembly Tabernacle in December and working with the producers of the Andrae Crouch Concert also held in the Tabernacle. I am presently serving on the Board of Directors of the Cleveland Family YMCA, and the Tourism and Governmental Committees of the Chamber of Commerce.

We have this year prepared Sunday school literature in these languages:

Arabic, Indonesian, Korean, Telegu (India), Malayalam (India), Hindi (India), French, Portuguese, Zulu (South Africa), Spanish.

We are preparing a book written by our General Overseer—"The Glorious Church of God" and "The All Nations Flag" book in the languages where

the Church is operating today.

We have selected twenty tracts for preparation in all the languages necessary at present.

We have purchased for the World Language Department a Word Processing System that enables us to produce translated manuscript at very high speed and with precision accuracy. This computerized electronic system has potential capability of doing work in approximately twenty languages.

We now have translators available to the Church in twenty-six languages.

In this Assembly, for the first time, the Church has provided simultaneous interpretation of the Assembly in the French language. The sign language interpreters have worked faithfully.

Personal Report

It has been my great privilege to serve the Church this year as Managing Editor of the Spanish White Wing and to serve on: Tomlinson Homes for Children Board of Directors, Church Publishing Committee, Communications Committee, and as a member and secretary of the World Mission Committee.

I have visited these states: Tennessee, West Virginia, Illinois, North Carolina (P.T.L.), West Texas, Arizona, Mississippi, California (Spanish), Michigan, Georgia, New York; and these nations: Argentina, Brazil, Chile, Canada, Egypt, Germany, Greece, Haiti, India, Indonesia, Korea, Mexico (Central), Peru, Puerto Rico, Thailand, Virgin Islands, Japan.

I represented General Headquarters in 5 State and National Conventions, attended 2 ministers conventions; Youth Retreat in Georgia; Ministers Retreat in Mississippi; I taught in Bible Training Institute in Cleveland; I attended 2 special rallies and was privileged to take part in the World Mission Overseer's Seminar.

With thanksgiving to the Lord for His bountiful blessings, both spiritual and physical throughout the past year, I make my report:

The Voice of Salvation has been blessed with added radio coverage in the United States and several other nations including Panama, Dominican Republic, Puerto Rico and Barbados. We have continued broadcasting the program in four languages, on a weekly basis throughout the year.

Financial and promotional support for the Voice of Salvation by State and National Overseers, state communications directors and other church workers has been very good, for which we are thankful.

Other financial support for the broadcast has come from Broadcast Distributors, Broadcast Record Club, Majestic Recording Studio and an appropriation from the General Fund.

The Voice of Salvation studio in San Juan, Puerto Rico has been very productive in recording the Spanish Voice of Salvation broadcast as well as handling custom recording work on a commercial basis.

I have traveled in several states, Dominican Republic and Puerto Rico in promoting the work. I taught in Communications Seminars in Puerto Rico

and Cleveland, Tennessee, attended one district convention, two state conventions, Audio Engineering Society Convention and National Religious Broadcasters Convention and assisted in a number of rallies and promotional services on behalf of the Communications work. The Spanish Voice of Salvation is broadcast in Mexico, Central America, South America, the Caribbean Islands, and some of the states in the U.S.A. The Spanish program is broadcast over 71 radio stations. It is produced in

our modern studio facilities in San Juan, Puerto Rico.

Our office facilities handle all the correspondence. We have received 3,591 letters and many of these give testimonies of God delivering them from sickness and oppression. The free correspondence course—the Body of Christ—offered through the program, has proven a blessing to the listeners. Courses distributed were 1,466 units and 107 certificates were issued. The General Bible Knowledge in Spanish has also been a blessing to our audience. We have distributed 122 units of this course.

I was blessed while attending the National Religious Broadcasters Convention in Washington, D.C., along with other brethren from the Communications Department.

It was a blessing for me to organize a Communication Seminar in San Juan, Puerto Rico. Bill White and Olfa Reyes taught a Public Relations class. Thomas Duncan and José Reyes taught a class relating to recording studios and basic electronics. Many Church members and others were benefitted, as well as giving the Church good promotion among the Christians on the island.

It has been a wonderful year of work in reaching others with the message of Christ and His Church. I thank the Lord for His marvelous help.

We commend all of you who have been using these materials published by the Voice of Salvation Music Company. The music office has also provided material, handbooks, songs and arrangements for B.T.I., conventions and meetings wherever music is needed. Several band arrangements have been written and made available to the growing number of instrumentalists.

I served on the Music Committee and represented the Department in my tour of states this year; taught in the Cleveland and West Coast Bible Training Institutes; taught in the National Overseers Seminar; taught in two music camps; and represented the Music Department in several Ministers and State Conventions this year. I attended the Mid-America Sunday School Convention, several national music conferences and International Youth Camp.

Our HORNS FOR MISSIONS project continues to grow because of your sincere efforts in providing us the needed musical instruments for other nations. Our goal is for each local church in the United States to provide at least one musical instrument each year for this missionary music program. We praise God for this privilege to supply more than \$15,000 worth of musical instruments to missions since this program began. You have made this possible through your liberal giving.

We have changed the name of Gospel Music Camp to Gospel Music School to be more in keeping with our plans to upgrade our music training studies to help meet the needs of the local church music program.

World Mission Committee Report August 1, 1977 through July 31, 1978

"I will lift up mine eyes unto the hills, from whence cometh my help. My help cometh from the Lord, which made heaven and earth." (Psalm 121:1, 2)

Our efforts in Africa and the Caribbean have resulted in the organization of the Church in Ghana, Ivory Coast and the Cayman Islands. We wish to commend the Mission Representatives, Roy D. Mixon, and Alvin S. Moss for their work and dedicated service to The Church of God. Brothers Prince Blackson, Charles K. Aka and Mervin S. Curry of Ghana, Ivory Coast and the Cayman Islands respectively, who so faithfully laid the ground work that made these advances possible, are to be congratulated for their labors of love.

The financial condition of the Church throughout the world continues to show steady progress despite runaway inflation in most areas and the weakening of the U.S. Dollar on world currency markets. The increases in Convention, Mission Offerings and World Mission Drives, (Convention Offerings are up 10% from \$297,095.00 to \$326,232.00 and Mission Drives 19.7% from \$273,165.00 to \$351,048.00), continue to be indispensable to the work, and we

owe a great debt to all Overseers, pastors, and members who consistently support our Mission work.

Most of the countries have reported substantial numerical growth as well as the acquisition and/or expansion of church building and other facilities. The cost of housing and office facilities owned or partly financed by Missions in the various areas now total over \$900,000.00 with current market values in excess of \$1,250,000.00. While we are pleased that adequate accommodations have been provided in some areas, we are keenly aware of the many pressing necessities still confronting us.

Contributions to our World Harvest Fund remained constant, and are a vital source of help and encouragement to our workers abroad. They are reminded that someone thinks of them and appreciates their work. All funds for special purposes should be mailed directly to the World Harvest Fund, specifying to whom or for what purpose or project the offering is sent.

Seven Overseers and their families had to be moved to their appointed areas of responsibility this year and the entire cost was financed by Missions.

The Committee agreed that an Overseer should have an expense paid trip to the General Assembly every third year.

All disbursements have been reported in U.S. Dollars, but in several of the nations, the amounts shown were paid from funds raised in the nations and deposited in the Church's International Accounts.

I have been responsible for the general administration and management of the World Mission Department, preparation and supervision of the budget and the implementation and execution of all the policies and decisions of the World Mission Committee.

I made 24 visits to 15 nations and 6 states on behalf of the work, during which I preached and taught 64 times, witnessed and recorded 44 experiences. Immediately after the 72nd General Assembly, I coordinated an Orientation and Training Seminar for National and Territorial Overseers, and assisted in organizing and coordinating the 1978 Youth Mission Teams.

It was my privilege to serve the Church on the Youth Mission Board and these committees: World Missions, Bible Training Institute, Tomlinson Homes for Children, Ministerial Aid.

I am grateful for the work, dedication, patience and cooperation of the Mission Representatives, Overseers and my office staff. The General Overseer, other Headquarters Appointees and the employees of the various departments have shown great kindness and much consideration to me and my family.

mately 214,951 air miles and several hundred miles by other means of transportation.

Report of Caribbean Mission Representative

August 31, 1977 through July 31, 1978

It is with much pleasure and delight, yet not without deep humility, I report:

Thank God He in mercy has enabled me to make 50 departures and arrivals in the course of activities. I have travelled 58,370 miles by air and 3,000 miles plus by land. Between Assemblies I visited Jamaica 25 times and other countries visited are: Grand Cayman, Trinidad and Tobago, Curacao, St. Marten, St. Vincent, Barbados, Haiti, Dominican Republic, Puerto Rico, St. Thomas, Turks and Caicos Islands, and Bermuda.

I have preached 153 sermons, conducted 291 prayer meetings, assisted in administering communion services and ordination services, written monthly letters to National, Territorial and Parish Overseers in Jamaica and area, visited 98 homes. I kept up with my office work in the Caribbean office in Nassau, Bahamas. I have also dedicated three church buildings in Bahamas and Puerto Rico.

In the Caribbean we have: 663 churches, a membership of 32,474. Revivals conducted this year—995; Sermons preached by the ministry—57,055; Souls saved—7,700; Sanctified—5,174; Baptized with the Holy Ghost—3,560; Baptized in Water—4,168; Added to the Church—4,506.

We have held 5 BTI Schools in the area this year with 954 students attending. We've conducted 6 Youth Camps with 525 attending, 360 experiences.

I express gratitude and appreciation to our General Overseer and World Mission Secretary for their confidence and invaluable assistance, concern and cooperation to the glory and honour of God.

My work this year has been very rewarding. I have been able to combine the work of these two offices in many instances where our military personnel are stationed and we have mission interest thereby giving attention to both areas of responsibility.

I would like to express my appreciation for having been able to serve the Church in these capacities; to all laborers responsible for raising mission funds to support our mission program; all National and State Overseers and members with whom I have worked this year, I appreciate you and esteem you very highly for the work's sake.

My work required travel across both the Pacific and Atlantic Oceans and one complete trip around the world. I visited 16 nations, 12 states and the District of Columbia. In these visits, I attended 7 National Conventions, 1 homecoming, 1 ministers convention, 1 district convention and taught in B.T.I. in the Philippines.

Assisted National Overseers finding suitable housing, visas to attend the General Assembly and legal paper work to sell property. Visited new field in American Samoa where the door presently remains open to the Church. Visited family in Hong Kong—our prayers are that God will move in this city of 4.5 million souls, where presently the Church has no representation.

Miles traveled approximately 125,000 by commercial airlines with over 260 hours flying time.

As Servicemen's Representative I visited with our military personnel in the United States and several other nations. I attended five retreats and two banquets and spoke in each of these. I visited and was in worship services with servicemen in Germany, Hawaii, Alaska, Colorado, North Carolina, Washington, Korea, and Greece.

Servicemen's News mailing list numbers approximately 750; 630 of these

are individual recipients, the remaining 120 mailed in bundles to pastors and overseers by request for distribution. Served as Editor of Servicemen's News. My association, fellowship and work with the military families and individuals has been enjoyable and rewarding. I trust that I have been a blessing to them.

REPORT OF SERVICEMEN'S DEPARTMENT

Our Chaplaincy program presently consists of the following: CAPT. Douglas Stephenson and CAPT. Guy Lindsey on active duty in the Army. LT. Daniel Kurbis on active duty in the Navy. CAPT. Raymond Brown on active duty with the Air Force and CAPT. James E. Brisson on active duty with the Civil Air Patrol. Robert Hyden has been endorsed for Army Chaplaincy and Jerry Moates has been endorsed for National Guard Chaplaincy.

CAPT. Raymond Brown, Air Force, will leave active duty August 31, 1978 and return to reserve status and replacing him will be James Garner who will report for active duty in October, 1978.

Retreats were conducted at Berchtesgaden, Germany; Camp Olomana, Hawaii, Anchorage, Alaska; Divide, Colorado; High Point, N.C. Classes were conducted during the day covering a variety of subjects, also some good recreational activities were included. The evening services were evangelistic oriented and included a special time of consecration with retreaters taking part in communion and feet-washing.

The Servicemen's Center in Langen, Germany (near Frankfurt) is still in operation under the supervision of National Overseer, Larry Turner. Those assisting in the operation of this center are to be commended.

Two banquets were conducted for servicemen in Tacoma, Washington and Seoul, Korea. Those responsible for planning these special activities are to be commended along with all others involved in ministering to the Military.

There have been 12 issues of the Servicemen's News published and approximately 258 packets with 3,096 tracts mailed to military families. A regular flow of mail is received and answered through this department. At present we still have approximately 630 addresses on our mailing list.

The Church and its Representative and Ecclesiastical Endorsing Agent is listed with the Department of Defense, the Army, the Navy, the Air Force, the Civil Air Patrol and the Air Force Reserve Chaplaincy program and corresponds with the Chief of Chaplains for each of these branches of service.

Questions and Subjects Committee Report

We, your Questions and Subjects Committee, after much prayer and careful consideration to each matter brought before us, submit the following report.

SECTION 1

Whereas Bishop Billy Murray has served the General Assembly faithfully for seven years as a member of the Questions and Subjects Committee, we wish to extend our sincere appreciation for the dedicated contribution he has made to the Church of God by serving this Committee.

SECTION 2

It is gratifying to see the progress which has been made in the completion of our World Headquarters Complex. In the 62nd General Assembly, 1967, a recommendation was made to purchase the 41-acre tract of land on Keith Street by-pass to be used for our World Headquarters buildings. This initial recommendation activated a long range construction program that brought about the formulation of the World Headquarters Construction Committee, chaired by our General Overseer. The World Headquarters Committee has diligently pursued subsequent Assembly recommendations in directing various phases of construction that have resulted in our beautiful ultra-modern, multi-million dollar World Headquarters Complex.

We feel these buildings will not only stand as markers for the Church of God, but they will also stand as a memorial to a great leader who was able to inspire the Church to "rise up and build." For this contribution of leadership provided by our General Overseer, may we offer opportunity for a voluntary expression of love and appreciation by a standing ovation at this time.

SECTION 3

THE WHITE WING MESSENGER: In reference to the General Overseer's Annual Address:

No one who reads *The White Wing Messenger* can truthfully refute its value to the Church. This official publication of the Church reaches into thousands of homes each week with timely messages and reports which keep all readers abreast concerning the Church's progress throughout the world.

It has been five years since the Assembly has given financial consideration concerning the production of our Church paper. These five years have been years of accelerated costs in all phases of the printing and mailing of this publication.

To alleviate the increasing deficit borne by the Church's general fund, we seem to have two options: First, a substantial increase in the subscription rates; Second, making *The White Wing Messenger* a bi-weekly edition publication with a smaller increase in the subscription rate. This bi-weekly edition would contain more pages than the present sixteen-page issue; yet, there would be some postage savings because of postal schedules now in effect.

Several years ago, when we reverted back to a weekly publication from a bi-weekly, a major reason seems to have been that we would be able to include more local news than a bi-weekly issue would allow. With the growth of the Church in the meantime, in order to follow a policy of being impartial to all local churches, it has become necessary to limit the local news mainly to that of an unusual nature or rare happenings such as groundbreakings, dedication of new buildings, etc. Suggestions have been made that most local news be submitted to the state or national papers.

The feeling has been expressed that a little larger bi-weekly *White Wing Messenger* might be more attractive and have wider reader appeal than the present weekly edition. We therefore recommend that *The White Wing Messenger* become a bi-weekly publication.

SECTION 4

BIBLE TRAINING INSTITUTE REPRESENTATIVE: We quote from the General Overseer's Annual Address:

"For many years the states and nations have been appointing state and national Bible Training Institute Boosters, as well as local church boosters. These boosters have proven a tremendous blessing in promoting and boosting Bible Training Institute. Commendation is due to the state, national and local boosters for promoting this important work."

Since the General Assembly has never officially endorsed Bible Training Institute Boosters, we therefore recommend that each state or nation, as well as each local church appoint a Bible Training Institute Representative for the purpose of promoting Bible Training Institute. These appointments are to be made in the same manner of the other appointments.

SECTION 5

We wish to call attention to the following Assembly recommendation, quote: "PASTOR'S PERMISSION TO PERFORM MARRIAGES

"We recommend that the male pastors be granted permits to perform marriage ceremonies, as the necessity arises, providing they follow the instructions set forth by the General Overseer and comply with the laws of the state wherein they reside. Said permit expires at the close of the Assembly year or upon resignation by a minister from his pastorate, and may be

recalled by the General Overseer at any time he deems it necessary." MINUTES, 42nd Assembly, 1947, page 123.

"NOTE: Evangelists who are pastoring churches should request the 'Special Evangelist's Certificate' which grants pastoring evangelists permission to perform marriages. The requests may be made at the time of the annual renewal of the license.

"EVANGELISTS' PERMISSION TO PERFORM MARRIAGES

"We recommend that a permit to perform marriages be issued to an evangelist if he has:

1. Set churches in order in new fields
2. Or if he successfully pastored churches
3. If he has been a faithful licensed evangelist for at least two years
4. If considered eligible by the General Overseer and State Overseer."

MINUTES, 53rd Assembly, 1958, pages 131, 132.

We recommend that the foregoing recommendations be changed to read: PERMIT FOR NON-PERMANENT MALE EVANGELISTS TO PERFORM MARRIAGE CEREMONIES

We recommend that non-permanent male evangelists, 25 years or over, be granted temporary permits to perform marriage ceremonies, as the necessity arises, provided they follow the instructions set forth by the General Overseer and comply with the laws of the state wherein they reside. Said permit may be requested by the non-permanent evangelist through the office of the State Overseer and should expire at the close of that calendar year. We further recommend that the permanent license be requested by the State Overseer to the office of the General Overseer.

The said permanent license and permit to perform marriages be issued only to a male evangelist if he has:

1. Set churches in order in new fields
2. Or, if he has successfully pastored churches
3. If he has been a faithful licensed evangelist for at least two years
4. If considered eligible by the State Overseer and the General Overseer.

Said permit or permanent license may be recalled by the Presbytery when deemed necessary.

SECTION 6

TOMLINSON COLLEGE

The support by our people for Tomlinson College is on the increase. There is a great interest among our youth to make Tomlinson College their choice.

However, due to limited facilities, at present many applications were turned down.

According to the General Overseer's Annual Address, a master plan has been drawn up to expand the college's facilities over the next seven years to accommodate six hundred on-campus students. This master construction plan is designed to advance in essential building areas as growth dictates. The six hundred on-campus students is a realistic goal for Tomlinson College toward which it would progressively work.

The suggested timetable for building according to the plan which has been drawn up is as follows: a dormitory, a library building, a chapel, music and drama building in 1979; a classroom building in 1980; a dormitory in 1981; a student center and cafeteria expansion in 1982; library expansion in 1983; married students' apartments expansion in 1984; a dormitory and classroom building in 1985. This plan would greatly assist the college in meeting the spiritual and educational needs of many of our young people.

While the revenue from the dormitories and apartments would be applied on the mortgage payments on these buildings, it should be understood that the major part of this expansion program would have to be supported by the general Church.

We recommend that the master plan mentioned above be adopted by this Assembly and that permission be granted to the College Board of Trustees and the General Properties Committee to examine the requirements and make the decisions as to if, and when buildings would actually be constructed as indicated on the master plan and suggested timetable for building.

We refer this section to the Ways and Means Committee.

SECTION 7

This committee is in harmony with the section of the General Overseer's Annual Address on TOMLINSON HOME FOR CHILDREN.

"Tomlinson Home for Children, formerly known as the Sunday School orphanage, has been operating in Bradley County for more than thirty-two years. During this time, according to our Church records, we have provided a home for 296 children.

"In recent years, because of generous governmental welfare assistance to those who will care for children in their homes, there has been a decline in the applications received in Cleveland. For the past few years a small number of children have been accommodated each year, and at present only six children remain in the Cleveland Home.

"At the same time, the Tennessee Department of Human Services has been increasingly restrictive in their regulations. There is a growing trend in this country to place children in foster homes rather than in institutions such as we have maintained. Of course, this is not true in many countries, and the Homes we are now operating in Mexico, South Korea, India and Indonesia are faced with growing demands for their services.

"It is the feeling of the Tomlinson Home for Children Board of Directors that it would be wise to discontinue operating our Home in Cleveland, but that we should maintain this work in other nations where the needs are great. At the present time there are about three hundred children in the four Homes now operating in those nations.

"Since the remaining Homes for Children are being operated in mission nations, it might be helpful to discontinue our reference to them as Tomlinson Homes for Children and refer to them as Mission Homes for Children instead."

This committee makes the following recommendations:

- A. We recommend that this section of the General Overseer's Annual Address be adopted by the Assembly and that Tomlinson Homes for Children be dissolved and that its Board of Directors be permitted to make necessary arrangements for the welfare of the remaining children in the Cleveland Homes.
- B. The Tomlinson Home for Children property which already joins the Tomlinson College campus (property) be utilized by the College in their expansion program.
- C. That the remaining Homes in other countries be referred to as Mission Homes for Children.

We recommend the following resolution be adopted.

RESOLUTION

RESOLVED, that the Tomlinson Home for Children, Inc., a Tennessee corporation, be dissolved and that the assets of the corporation be transferred to the Church of God of Prophecy, which will assume all the liabilities of the Home.

Further RESOLVED, dissolution shall be carried out in an orderly manner so that new homes can be found for the children now residing in the Cleveland Home.

Further RESOLVED, that this Resolution serve as a Plan of Dissolution.

SECTION 8

The current Assembly rulings with regards to the APPOINTMENT OF CHURCH CLERK, TREASURER AND CHURCH LEADERS reads as follows:

"Since the General Treasurer is appointed by the General Overseer and the state treasurer is appointed by the State Overseer, we recommend that the clerk and treasurer of the local church be appointed by the pastor and that this appointment be made in the October quarterly conference.

We further recommend that the pastor appoint his church leaders and officers any time, at the pastor's discretion, from the first Sunday of August to the October conference." MINUTES, 65th Assembly, 1970, page 123.

In order to make uniform the appointments of all local leaders, we recommend that the above mentioned sections be changed to read as follows:

The local church clerk and treasurer is to be appointed by the pastor at the same time as the other local leaders and officers any time at the pastor's discretion during the first month of his new pastoral year. Said appointments to be ratified in the following quarterly conference.

SECTION 9

TOMLINSON COLLEGE

In the last Assembly it was brought to our attention that due to recent developments, it is now possible for the college to become fully accredited by a recognized national or regional agency wherein the college could operate without any direct outside interference and that the Church would have full control of its operation without compromising theocratic government.

With the understanding that Tomlinson College is a Church of God of Prophecy Institution, we therefore recommend that the original charter of the Tomlinson College Corporation be retained and that the Board remain as the Board of Trustees.

All subjects presented to this committee have been prayerfully considered, some of which we felt deserved further consideration before being presented to the Assembly. Several letters have been written to individuals giving answers we did not deem necessary to bring to the attention of the entire body. The committee expresses appreciation to all our people who have prayed for our deliberations.

Report of Tomlinson College President and Church Pilot

August 1, 1977 through July 31, 1978

It has been a pleasure to serve as the president of our college and as Church pilot. This has been a great year, a time which will be a plus mark in the history of the college. God has generously blessed. Zeal and interest are high, and we are excited about what has happened and is happening at Tomlinson College.

We are experiencing growth, which has completely exhausted our facilities. All available student housing was full sixty days before the start of this school year. We have developed a plan whereby we may be able to construct new buildings to meet our needs.

The initial enrollment for this fall term was 275. Many applicants were notified that we were unable to accept them because the facilities were presently inadequate. Also, we received many letters from potential applicants which we were unable to completely process. It was suggested that they resubmit for the next term.

Contact was made with the Commission on Colleges of the Southern

Association of Colleges and Schools with a request to be considered as a candidate for accreditation. They responded with a visit to the campus, at which time we were informed that we would be recommended to the Candidate Committee for further consideration. This is favorable progress.

The M. A. Tomlinson Scholarship banquet was very successful. We thank each participant and appreciate all donations.

This year the college changed from the accrual and commercial accounting procedures to fund accounting, which is in accordance with the principles and practices prescribed in college and university business administration and American Institute of Certified Public Accountants. For the year ending May 31, 1978, the college had a true certified audit performed by the firm of Marlin and Edmondson, Certified Public Accountants.

Through various fund-raising drives we raised \$32,961.11 toward the building of the new college library. This is approximately one-third of the amount required to break ground. Continued efforts will be made to completely fund this much-needed building. We sincerely appreciate all contributions received to date.

As Church pilot I was privileged to fly the General Overseer on various trips at his request. I also made business flights in assisting other General Appointees in the work of their office. I visited one national convention and two state conventions, all of which were inspiring and enjoyable.

I wish to express my sincerest appreciation to my entire staff and faculty for their dedication, faithfulness and cooperation throughout the entire year.

Ways and Means Committee Report

SECTION 1

Accolade

"O give thanks unto the Lord; call upon his name: make known his deeds among the people.

"Sing unto him, sing psalms unto him: talk ye of all his wondrous works."
(Psalm 105:1, 2)

We are thankful that we have the opportunity to sing unto the Lord and can talk about His wondrous works. Especially we thank the Lord for His wonderful providence in the operation of the government of the Church of God, for our anointed General Overseer and all of our faithful ministers and members in the Church throughout the world.

And we commend you for faithfully contributing to the General Properties Fund, enabling the World Headquarters Construction Committee to proceed with the building plan and dedication of our new building.

We wish to encourage all to contribute to the General Properties Fund.

SECTION 2

Section 10, Paragraph 1 of Ways and Means Committee Report reads: "Surplus Tithes:

"Surplus tithes accruing in any local church is to be left in the tithe fund account of the local church treasury until after the last Sunday in June, at which time it is to be properly divided: 25% to be sent to the General Treasurer to be used at the discretion of the Executive Committee; 25% to be sent to the State or National Finance and Appropriations Committee; the 50% that is left in the local church to be used at the discretion of the

pastor and local church committee, appointed by the pastor."

We recommend that this be changed to 10% to be sent to the General Treasurer to be used at the discretion of the Executive Committee; 30% to be sent to the state or national treasurer to be used at the discretion of the State or National Finance and Appropriations Committee and 60% be left in the local church to be used at the discretion of the Pastor and local church committee, and approved by the local church conference.

SECTION 3

Section 3, Items 1-3 of Ways and Means Report of the 72nd Annual Assembly Minutes read: "What is surplus tithes in the local church? Surplus tithes in the local church is that amount of tithes left after 10% has been paid to General Treasurer, 10% to State or National Treasurer and the monthly allotment to the Pastor.

"This accrument of surplus tithes each month in the tithing fund of the local church is not to be used but left in the treasury until the last Sunday of June.

"In other words, only the 10% of the tithes that goes to the General Treasurer and the same amount that goes to the State or National Treasurer and the Pastor's allotment is to be disbursed monthly from the tithe fund of the local church. After the last Sunday in June, the accrued surplus tithes are to be disbursed as already defined in the Church Business Guide."

We recommend that 60% of the surplus tithes remain in the local church; 30% to State or National Headquarters and 10% to General Headquarters.

Paragraph 1 of Section 3 should be changed to read: What is surplus tithes in the local church? Surplus tithes in the local church is that amount of tithes, left after 10% has been sent to General Treasurer, 10% to State or National Treasurer and the monthly allotment to the Pastor.

Paragraph 2 continues to read: "This accrument of surplus tithes each month in the tithing fund of the local church is not to be used but left in the treasury until the last Sunday in June."

Paragraph 3 should read: In other words, only the 10% of the tithes that goes to the General Treasurer and the 10% that goes to the State or National Treasurer and the Pastor's allotment is to be disbursed monthly from the tithe fund of the local church. After the last Sunday in June, the accrued surplus tithes are to be disbursed as follows:

10% to General Headquarters; 30% to State or National Headquarters; 60% to local church. The Church Business Guide is to be changed accordingly.

SECTION 4

We recommend that since the General Assembly has made the decision to phase out the Tomlinson Home for Children in Cleveland, Tennessee, U.S.A., as recommended by the Questions and Subjects Committee, 73rd Assembly and name changed to Mission Homes for Children. That 10% of State and National Convention Offerings and Assembly Offerings of the Mission Homes for Children Fund be sent to General Headquarters Fund and that 10% of the Assembly Mission Homes for Children Offerings from each state or country be sent to the respective State or National Treasurer for the general state or national fund.

We further recommend that 40% of state and national convention offerings and Assembly offerings of the Mission Homes for Children Fund be sent to Tomlinson College.

Section 16, Item 17, of Ways and Means Report of 72nd Annual Assembly reads: "The Assembly has recommended that 10% of State and National Convention Offerings and Assembly Offerings of the Tomlinson Home for Children Fund be sent to General Headquarters for the General Property Fund, and the same amount to Tomlinson College."

We recommend that this be changed to read: The Assembly has recommended that 10% of State and National Convention Offerings and Assembly Offerings of the Mission Homes for Children Fund be sent to General Headquarters for the General Property Fund and 40% to Tomlinson College.

SECTION 5

We recommend that the General Properties Fund be continued and that each local church raise or collect one dollar (\$1.00) per member, (where the dollar is not the monetary system, the amount is to be set by the World Mission Committee according to the economic and monetary condition) and that these funds be collected at the beginning of the Assembly year with the last Sunday of December being a Rally Day to finalize the collecting of these funds. This General Properties Fund money should be mailed to the General Overseer or General Field Office, immediately after the last Sunday of December.

We recommend that after the mortgage of the General Headquarters Building is paid that the General Properties Dollar Fund be applied to the construction of Tomlinson College Buildings and that the item, General Properties Funds, under present Financial System recorded in the Minutes, be changed to read accordingly.

SECTION 6

Due to the ever increasing cost of material and postage being experienced

or realized by the Publishing House in printing and mailing *The White Wing Messenger* to its subscribers, we recommend that the subscription rate be increased to \$5.00 cash, or \$5.50 charge, per year.

We also recommend that the multi-year subscription rate be left to the discretion of the Church Publishing Committee and that Section 13 of 72nd Assembly subscription rate be changed to conform to the new rate increase.

SECTION 7

Section 16, Item 10, Paragraph 2 reads: "Since the Church is world-wide, there should be no difference shown between an Overseer outside the United States who is a member of the Presbytery and one in the United States; therefore, this Committee recommends that where our international banking system is adopted, the Overseer come under the tithe system reporting the amount of tithes received from his churches to the General Overseer on the special report form, and when necessary the allotment be supplemented from the general tithes of each respective country or territory."

We recommend that this be amended to read: Since the Church is world-wide, there should be no difference shown between an Overseer outside the United States who is a member of the presbytery and one in the United States and that all Overseers come under the tithe system reporting the amount of tithes received from his churches to the General Overseer on the special report form and when necessary, the allotment be supplemented from the general tithes of each respective country.

Paragraph 4 of the same section reads: "When there is not sufficient tithes to cover the allotments, we then recommend that the remaining portion be supplied by the Mission Department, if funds are available. It is the feeling of this Committee that each Overseer should receive an allotment in the currency of the country or the territory he represents in keeping with the economic conditions of that country."

We recommend that this be amended to read: Where there is not sufficient tithes to cover the allotments, we then recommend that the remaining portion be supplied by making transfers of Tithe Funds between countries where this is legally permissible and from the U.S. Tithe Funds, in other cases, if funds are available and that each Overseer should receive an allotment in the currency of the country or the territory he represents according to the average prevailing wage rates of each country.

Paragraph 3 remains the same and it reads: "We further recommend that the World Mission Department prepare a notice of this amount in the native currency of each country and forward same to the National Overseer for the information of the pastors."

SECTION 8

Paragraph 3 of Section 10, 72nd Annual Assembly Minutes reads: "Does the pastor alone have the authority to disburse the local church's portion of the surplus tithes? ANSWER: No. 'This part is left in the local church to be used at the discretion of the pastor and local church committee appointed by the pastor'."

We recommend that this be changed to read: Does the pastor alone have the authority to disburse the local church's portion of the surplus tithes? ANSWER: No. This part is left in the local church to be used at the discretion of the pastor and local church committee appointed by the pastor and approved by the local church conference and that portion of Paragraph 1 of Section 10, which reads:

"The 50% that is left in the local church to be used at the discretion of the pastor and local church committee, appointed by the pastor", be changed to read:

Disbursements of the 60% that is left in the local church to be used at the discretion of the pastor and local church committee, and approved by the local church conference.

SECTION 9

We recommend that since there is a special employee benefit under section 101 (b) of the I.R.S. (Internal Revenue Service) code which provides, up to \$5,000.00 may be paid to an employee's beneficiary as a death benefit and is free from income tax.

We recommend that when a State Overseer, pastor, General Appointee, or other appointed workers has any allotment due his beneficiary, at his death, that an amount up to the allowable exclusion be considered to be a death benefit. This is not to be additional compensation, but is intended only to take advantage of an income tax break for the beneficiary.

SECTION 10

With reference to all other sections of the Ways and Means Committee Report printed in the Minutes of the 72nd General Assembly, we recommend that these be carried over this year and be included in this report.

We feel more prayer and consideration should be given to all other matters brought to the attention of this Committee and we beg and ask you for your patience and prayers while we search God's will for an answer.

SECTION 2 (1977)

Section 11, Items 8 of Ways and Means Report of 71st Annual Assembly Minutes reads: We recommend that \$100.00 be contributed from the general funds for each \$100.00 contributed from the state funds for the purpose of opening up new fields, and that the amount for any one state be limited to \$1,000.00, with special consideration given to not self-supporting states for additional help. In case a state has no funds for this purpose and desires help from the General Headquarters to open a new field, the General Overseer and the General Treasurer may use their discretion in assisting in such cases.

We recommend that there be a second paragraph to Item 8, reading: That the larger states not request the fund unless it is especially needed and that special consideration be given to the states with less than 500 members by increasing the contribution to \$1,500.00 and \$2,000.00 to states with 300 members or less if funds are available.

SECTION 3 (1977)

(Amended in Section 3 of this year's report. See page 152.)

SECTION 4 (1977)

Section 11, Paragraph 3 of Item 12 of Ways and Means Report of the 71st Annual Assembly Minutes reads: Since the allotments of Overseers in other countries come under the jurisdiction of the World Mission Committee, and these are set according to the economic standard of each country:

We recommend that the words "and these are set according to the economic standard of each country," be changed to read: "allotments be set according to the average prevailing wage rates of each country and the financial resources of the World Mission Committee".

That the maximum allotment for pastors in said countries, from tithes received in their local churches, be the same as the allotment set by the World Mission Committee for the Overseer of that country, if funds are available. Tithes received in excess of this amount by the local churches be reported as surplus tithes, and treated as provided in the Church's financial system outlined by the General Assembly.

SECTION 5 (1977)

Since the Communications Department has been receiving an annual allotment from Free Literature funds and since the General Assembly Free Literature offering is now being used for translation and printing, we recommend that this annual Communications Department allotment be paid from the General Funds, and the allotment be \$16,000.00 for this next Assembly year.

SECTION 6 (1977)

We wish to commend the Ministerial Aid Committee on its Retirement Plan. Its limitations are due primarily to insufficient income to provide incentive to those entering the plan. Therefore, we recommend that a percentage of tithes paid by the ministers entering the plan be applied to the individual Minister's Retirement Plan and paid to the Ministerial Aid Fund, and that this percentage be determined at the discretion of the Executive Committee and the Ministerial Aid Committee.

SECTION 7 (1977)

Section 11, Item 11 of Ways and Means Report of the 71st Annual Assembly Minutes reads: The Assembly recommends that sufficient amount of the general funds be used to pay for the first reprinting of tracts from the translations which were salvaged from the White Wing Publishing House fire of February, 1967 and new translations and the first printing of each in order for the demands to be met more quickly. Those that are most urgent can be printed first.

We, therefore, recommend that the amount to be used for this work be left to the discretion of the Executive Committee.

We recommend that this be changed to read: "That sufficient amounts of the General funds be used to pay for new translations and the first printing of each in order for the demands to be met more quickly. Those that are most urgent can be printed first. The amount due determined at the discretion of the Executive Committee and the Church Publishing Committee."

SECTION 8 (1977)

With reference to Section 11 of the Questions and Subjects Report concerning the service of emissaries selected by the General Overseer for special service when the need arises, we recommend that their expenses plus remuneration for their services be left to the discretion of the Executive Committee.

SECTION 10 (1977)
(Section 1, 1974)

SURPLUS TITHES: (This paragraph is ammended in Section 2 of this year's report. See page 151.)

The Assembly recommends that the following words be added to this paragraph. "That first consideration be given to the pastor's expense in the ministry; said expense being already defined in the Church Business Guide."

SECTION 9 (1976)

Since the mission of the Church is world-wide, we recommend that the words "Field Office, National Overseer or Treasurer" be included where necessary or applicable and also, where the dollar is not the monetary system that it be left to the discretion of the World Mission Committee to set that amount according to the economic and monetary system of that particular country.

SECTION 10 (1976)

(Section 15, 1977)

(Paragraphs 1 and 2 are ammended in Section 5 of this year's report. See page 153.)

Furthermore, we would both invite and encourage any or all individuals to make voluntary personal contributions to the Church of God of Prophecy General Properties Fund. Any amount contributed by individuals should be sent direct to M. A. Tomlinson, Bible Place, Cleveland, Tennessee 37311, or the General Field Office.

2. The Assembly recommends that, if there should be any deficit occurring in the General Properties Fund in making the monthly payments, such deficit be paid from the General Fund.

SECTION 16 (1977)

1. The Assembly recommends that the Executive Committee be authorized to adjust the allotments for pastors, State Overseers, and General Workers from year to year, based on the previous year's cost of living index.

2. The Assembly recommends that the allotment of the General Overseer and that the question of pay for incidental expenses plus any and all personal necessities be left to the discretion of the Executive Committee.

3. The Assembly recommends that 10 per cent of the tithes received each month by the local church treasurer be sent with his report to the General Treasurer, and that the same amount be sent to the state or national treasurer along with the fourth Sunday offering. In view of the fact that the pastors are paid by the local church treasurer and the General Workers are paid by the General Treasurer, it seems logical and consistent to have the State or National Overseer paid by the state or national treasurer.

The Assembly recommends that all local church treasurers mail their reports to the state or national treasurer no later than the 5th of each month, and from these funds received, the State or National Overseer would receive his allotment and expenses (if funds are available) according to the rulings of

the General Assembly. Where this is not feasible for countries outside the U.S.A., that this matter be left to the discretion of the World Mission Committee.

4. Since the Assembly has left the decision to the Executive Committee to determine the incidental expense incurred by the General Workers, and inasmuch as there is a set amount by the government for an executive worker to receive, we recommend that this matter be left to the Executive Committee to act as circumstances may necessitate.

5. The Assembly recommends that the sum of \$200 received each month by the General Headquarters Workers and the State Overseers appointed by the General Overseer be designated for rent and utilities. Should the rent and utilities be under the above amount, the remaining amount would be included as income. Where this ruling is feasible, this is also applicable to pastors and full-time evangelists. (Note: This recommendation is for income tax purposes only, and involves no extra allotment.)

6. Whereas, by an act of the Assembly, the Radio Department has been changed and now is referred to as the Communications Department, we recommend that, when it is feasible to produce television programs, the matter of finance be left to the discretion of the Executive Committee.

7. The Assembly recommends the continuance of the Overseer's convention love offering, and we encourage everyone to stand by your Overseer with your offering. It has been brought to our attention that in a few cases there was exercised some extremity in raising the convention offering for the Overseer by making it to become competitive and compulsory giving. We feel that this effort should be a genuine love offering rather than it becoming competitive or compulsory. We do not intend to discourage the Assembly Band Movement Secretary's planning which would help to boost the Overseer's love offering; however, any such planning should be executed by voluntary response. Also, that emphasis be given by the pastor to the Overseer's fourth Sunday offering when receiving it. Should there not be sufficient fourth Sunday offering funds to cover his expense as Overseer, it is recommended that the surplus tithes, if there be any, be used to supplement the expenses of the Overseer. The expenses of the Overseer of not self-supporting states be left to the discretion of the Executive Committee.

8. The Assembly recommends that the Emergency Fund be continued and that each member pay \$1 or the amount set by the World Mission Committee where applicable into the Fund annually and that the present system of collecting emergency funds be continued. We further recommend that since these funds are urgently needed, each local church collect funds in full as soon as possible and send them as collected with the local church treasurer's monthly report.

9. The Assembly recommends that when an evangelist is engaged by the pastor to conduct a revival in his local church, that each member be encouraged to give a good offering each night of the revival and that the total amount of the offering received go to the evangelist.

If a church is too small to sufficiently support an evangelist, we recommend that special fund raising projects be instituted prior to a scheduled revival, to supplement the nightly offerings.

10. The Assembly recommends that the allotments of the Overseers outside the United States continue to be set by the World Mission Committee according to the economic and monetary system of the different countries involved and that it be left to the discretion of the World Mission Committee whether to print these amounts in the minutes as supplement to the Ways and Means Committee Report. We also recommend that the financial system of the Church be compiled according to the economic conditions of the various countries by the World Mission Committee listing all fees and the amounts of dues, etc., involving the different auxiliaries and the various departments of the Church and be sent to the Overseers and pastors of the churches in the territories involved. It is felt by this Committee that the churches outside the United States must be as well informed concerning the financial system of the Church as those in the United States since we are only one Church.

(Paragraph 2 of Number 10 is amended in Section 7 of this year's report. See page 154.)

When there is not sufficient tithes to cover the allotments, we then recommend that the remaining portion be supplied by the Mission Department, if funds are available. It is the feeling of this Committee that each Overseer should receive an allotment in the currency of the country or the territory he represents in keeping with the economic conditions of that country.

11. The Assembly recommends that all Victory Leaders Bands, Sunday Schools, Mission, Church of Prophecy Marker Association, White Wing Publishing House, Tomlinson Home for Children, and Bible Training Institute tithes be placed in the General Tithe Fund.

12. The Assembly recommends that the tithes of non-members that are paid into the local treasury should be executed through the regular channel the same as tithes of members.

13. The Assembly recommends that 20 per cent of the state or national convention offerings of the Womens Missionary Band, Victory Leaders Band, Sunday School, and Church of Prophecy Marker Association be left in the state or national treasury for the purpose of state or national work.

14. The Assembly recommends that in case of any additional general

workers being appointed by the General Overseer, their allotments be determined by the Executive Committee.

15. The Assembly recommends that if there should be a deficit incurred in printing and mailing the White Wing Messenger, such deficit be paid from the General Fund.

16. SUNDAY SCHOOL TITHES: It has been called to our attention that several churches with the approval of their Sunday Schools, in receiving the Sunday School offering, receive only one offering; with portions of the offering to be used for different projects.

For example: A portion for the operation of the Sunday School; a portion for the flower fund; a portion for the building fund; etc.

The Assembly recommends only the money that is used for the operation of the Sunday School is the portion that is to be tithed. This Committee calls to your attention that Tomlinson Home for Children money should not be tithed by the local church.

(Paragraph 17 is ammended in Section 4 of this year's report. See page 153.)

18. The General Treasurer send 10 per cent of the Assembly Mission and Tomlinson Homes for Children offerings from each state or country to the respective state or national treasurer for the general state or national fund. The Ministerial Aid Fund receives 10 per cent of the mission money sent to the General Treasurer.

The White Wing Publishing House send 10 per cent of the Assembly Free Literature offering from each state or country to the respective state or national treasurer for the general state or national fund.

19. The Assembly recommends that a love offering be received for the district overseer in his district convention. If the district overseer is requested by the State Overseer to perform a duty involving considerable expense, the State Overseer will be responsible for such expense.

20. We recommend that all Tomlinson College funds be received and disbursed by the General Treasurer, with the Executive Committee handling the matters of expense in the same way as for other departments.

21. This committee wishes to commend each one who has been faithful in working in and raising funds through the auxiliaries, as it is by these efforts that the message of the Church has spread throughout the world.

We urge each local church to operate each auxiliary as recommended by the

General Assembly, keeping the spiritual benefits and financial needs before our members.

We want to urge each leader to continue to make known the purpose of each auxiliary and to make known the blessings and helps the auxiliaries are to each local church and the Church world-wide in carrying out the commission of the Church. (Section 3, Minutes of 69th Assembly.)

22. We recommend that on Outreach Sunday (White Wing Messenger Day), when a special offering is boosted, that the people be encouraged to give even more generously in support of the White Wing Publishing House and its ministry. (Section 4, Minutes of 69th Assembly.)

23. The Assembly recommends that each pastor, state and national overseer see that all monies received in his or her church, state or nation be handled exactly as stated in the present financial system of the church with which they should be fully familiar and also be responsible to see that all monies are used only for the purpose for which it was given or raised. (Section 6, Minutes of 69th Assembly.)

TITHES: Members should pay their tithes into the treasury of the local church where they are members. Ministers send the tithes of income from the ministry with their monthly reports to the General Treasurer, and tithes on income outside the ministry are paid into the treasury of the local church where they are members.

The treasurer of the church is to send 10 per cent of tithes received each month with the treasurer's report to the appropriate address.

The Assembly recommends that the Executive Committee be authorized to adjust the allotments for pastors, State Overseers, and General Workers from year to year, based on the previous year's cost of living index.

The Assembly recommends that the allotment of the General Overseer and that pay for incidental expenses plus any and all personal necessities be left to the discretion of the Executive Committee.

The treasurer of the local church sends 10% of the tithes received each month to the treasurer of his state or nation. The balance of the tithes, after General Headquarters and the State or National Overseer have received their portions, remains in the local church treasury to pay the pastor.

We recommend that the sum of \$200 received each month by the General Appointees and the State Overseers be designated for rent and utilities. Should the rent and utilities be under the above amount, the remaining amount would be included as income. Where feasible, this is also applicable to pastors and full-time evangelists. (Note: This recommendation is for income tax purposes only, and involves no extra allotment.)

Surplus tithes accruing in any local church are to be left in the tithe fund account of the local church treasury until after the last Sunday in June, at which time it is properly divided: 10% to be sent to the General Treasurer to be used at the discretion of the Executive Committee; 30% to be sent to the state or national treasurer to be used at the discretion of the State or National

Finance and Appropriations Committee and 60% be left in the local church to be used at the discretion of the pastor and local church committee, and approved by the local church conference.

The Assembly recommends that the following words be added to this paragraph. "That first consideration be given to the pastor's expense in the ministry; said expenses being already defined in the Church Business Guide."

The Assembly recommends that all local church treasurers mail their reports to the state or national treasurer no later than the 5th of each month. From the funds received, the State or National Overseer would receive his allotment and expense (if funds are available) according to the rulings of the General Assembly.

The Executive Committee agrees that all General Appointees receive an allotment of \$1,150.50 a month, if funds are available; and that incidental expense incurred by these General Appointees be left to the discretion of the Executive Committee.

Overseers in the United States are to receive no more than \$1,150.50 a month, plus an amount not to exceed \$200 a month for office expenses from the tithes received from the churches, if funds are available. Any funds in excess of this amount received by the treasurer are to be kept in the state treasury to be placed in the general state fund for the state work, especially to assist pastors of weaker churches.

The Executive Committee agrees that the pastor receive an amount not to exceed \$1,150.50 a month from the tithes of the local church after General Headquarters and the State Overseer have received their portions, if funds are available. This does not include offerings and poundings received by the pastor.

Allotments for Overseers outside the United States where there is not sufficient tithes to cover the allotments the remaining portion be supplied by making transfers of Tithe Funds between countries where this is legally permissible and from the United States Tithe Funds, in other cases, if funds are available, and that each Overseer should receive an allotment in the currency of the country or the territory he represents according to the average prevailing wage rates of each country.

The Assembly has ruled that tithes are for the support of the ministry only. Surplus tithes received at General Headquarters are disbursed at the discretion of the Executive Committee to aid Overseers in states not self-supporting. The Ministerial Aid Fund receives 10% of all tithes sent to General Headquarters. We recommend that the tithes of non-members that are paid into the local church treasury be paid through the regular channel the same as the tithes of members.

The Committee calls your attention to the fact that it does not say of ministers only; rather, of the ministry only. Ministry is defined as the office, duties, or functions of a minister; the building in which the business of the ministry is transacted; thus, the ministry includes any and all phases of the Church ministry, such as church property, equipment, maintenance, etc.

SUNDAY SCHOOL: The local church treasurer sends 10% of all Sunday School offerings to the General Treasurer with his monthly report and 10% to the state treasurer for the general state fund.

MISSION HOMES FOR CHILDREN: All Mission Homes for Children offerings remain in the local church treasury and are turned in at the state or national convention and Assembly. For improving, building, and maintaining the state headquarters, 20% of the state convention Mission Homes for Children offering remains in the state treasury. The General Treasurer is sent 10% of the balance and the state treasurer keeps 10%, or an equal amount. Send balance to the General Treasurer for the support of Mission Homes for Children. The General Treasurer sends 10% of the Assembly offering from each state or nation to the respective state or national treasurer for the general state or national fund. The Assembly has recommended that 10% of state and national convention offerings and Assembly offerings of the Mission Homes for Children be sent to General Headquarters for General Properties, and 40% for Tomlinson College.

EMERGENCY FUND: All ministers and members are to pay one dollar a year, or the amount set by the World Mission Committee where applicable, into the treasury of the local churches where their memberships are, and the treasurer sends the emergency dollars as collected with his monthly report. The Ministerial Aid Fund receives 10% of all emergency money sent to General Headquarters.

GENERAL PROPERTIES FUND: The Assembly recommends that the General Properties Fund be continued and that each local church raise or collect one dollar per member, (where the dollar is not the monetary system—the amount is to be set by the World Mission Committee according to the economic and monetary condition) and that these funds be collected at the beginning of the Assembly year with the last Sunday of December being a rally day to finalize the collecting of these funds. This General Properties Fund money should be mailed to the General Overseer or General Field Office, immediately after the last Sunday of December.

The Assembly recommends these portions be designated as General Properties Fund:

1. Not less than 50% of the CPMA membership each year after 10% is deducted for Ministerial Aid;
2. 50% of the CPMA state convention offerings which presently remain in

the state treasury;

3. 10% of the state and national convention offerings and Assembly offerings of the Mission Homes for Children and Bible Training Institute; and 10% of the national and international accounts of Ministerial Aid and Missions.

The Assembly recommends that if there should be any deficit occurring in the General Properties Fund in making the monthly payments, such deficit be paid from the General Fund.

MISSION MONEY: The second Sunday mission offering and mission money raised by other means remain in the local church treasury and are turned in at the state and national convention and Assembly. For improving, building, and maintaining the state headquarters, 20% of the state convention mission offering is to remain in the state treasury. The General Treasurer receives 10% of the balance and the state treasurer keeps 10%, or an equal amount. Half of the remainder (40% of the balance after the state deducts the state headquarters maintenance portion) is left in the state for the general state fund, and half sent to the General Treasurer as world mission money. The General Treasurer is sent 5% of the 40% portion remaining in the state treasury for the state convention mission funds to assist in the support of widows of deceased ministers.

The General Treasurer receives all mission money collected in the March and October drives for world missions. It is to be sent with the local treasurer's monthly report. All mission offerings at the Assembly are turned in to the General Treasurer as world mission money. The General Treasurer sends 10% of the Assembly offering from each state or nation to the respective state or national treasurer for the general state or national fund. The Ministerial Aid Fund receives 10% of the mission money sent to the General Treasurer. The Assembly recommends that 10% of the national and international accounts of the World Mission Fund be sent to General Headquarters for the General Properties Fund.

FIRST SUNDAY OFFERING: Each local church receives an offering for the pastor on the first Sunday of each month.

DISTRICT OVERSEERS SUPPORT: The Assembly recommends that a love offering be received for the district overseer in his district convention. If the district overseer is requested by the State Overseer to perform a duty involving considerable expense, the State Overseer will be responsible for such expense.

FOURTH SUNDAY OFFERING: The fourth Sunday is set by the Assembly for every local church to receive an expense offering for the Overseer of the state or nation. The local church treasurer sends 10% of this offering to the state treasurer for the state treasury; the balance of this offering is sent to

the state treasurer for the expense of the Overseer. If there is not sufficient fourth Sunday offerings to cover his expense as Overseer, the surplus tithes, if there is any in the state treasury may be used to supplement the fourth Sunday offerings. DO NOT send any of the fourth Sunday offerings to the General Treasurer. Each local church should receive poundings for the Overseer once or twice a year.

VICTORY LEADERS OFFERING: All money raised for the Free Literature Fund by the Victory Leaders is given in at the state or national convention and Assembly. Money for the expense of the band should be received in a special offering. For improving, building, and maintaining the state headquarters, 20% of the state or national convention free literature offering is left in the state treasury. The General Treasurer receives 10% of the balance and the state treasurer retains 20% for the general state fund. The balance is sent to the White Wing Publishing House. The Assembly Free Literature Offering is given to the World Language Department. The White Wing Publishing House sends 10% of the Assembly offering from each state or nation to the respective state or national treasurer for the general state or national fund. The Ministerial Aid Fund receives 10% of all free literature money received by the White Wing Publishing House, and the balance is disbursed by the Church Publishing Committee.

ASSEMBLY EXPENSE: To assist in the expense of the annual assemblies, the State Overseers are asked to collect funds each year and send to the General Treasurer.

a. The Assembly recommends that churches having less than 50 in Sunday School contribute annually \$2.00 to Assembly expense; churches with Sunday School attendance between 50 and 100 are to contribute \$3.00 annually; and churches averaging over 100 in Sunday School are to contribute \$5.00 annually.

b. The Assembly recommends that each Victory Leaders Band contribute \$2.00 annually; the Assembly recommends that each Women's Missionary Band contribute \$2.00 annually, and that each minister, including deacons and lay ministers, contribute \$1.00 annually.

c. The Assembly recommends that the pastors be responsible for collecting the Assembly Expense Dollars for the auxiliaries and forward to the State Overseer, and the State Overseer be responsible to collect the dollars from the ministers in his state. These funds are to be mailed to the General Treasurer as collected. The final report of the Assembly expense should be given by the Overseer with the state convention report to the General Treasurer, and the State Secretaries be responsible to the State Overseer to boost and assist in collecting these funds.

CHURCH OF PROPHECY MARKER ASSOCIATION: To be a member of the Church of Prophecy Marker Association, you pay \$5.00 a year, and it may be paid any time during the year. For the local church to receive credit in the Honor Stone Program, it must be paid before the honor sheet is filled in by the

pastor. In other nations, to become a member you pay an amount set by the Overseer and CPMA Committee.

CPMA offerings remain in the local church treasury and are given in at the state convention. These offerings are divided by the state treasurer; 20% of the CPMA state convention offering remains in the state treasury for improving, building, and maintaining the state headquarters; 10% of the balance is sent to the General Treasurer, and an equal amount, or 10%, to the state treasurer for the state work, and an equal amount, or 10%, is sent to the General Treasurer for the Ministerial Aid Fund. Of the amount presently remaining in the state treasury, 50% is to be sent to the General Treasurer for the General Properties Fund. Not less than 50% of CPMA membership fees each year, after 10% is deducted for Ministerial Aid, is to go to the General Properties Fund.

BIBLE TRAINING INSTITUTE: The Assembly recommends that the pastors be responsible for conducting weekly classes in the local churches to acquaint our people with the doctrine and practices of the Church. Offerings received in the classes are turned in at the state convention to assist Bible Training Institute in teaching the Church doctrine in other nations. It is recommended that 10% of state and national convention offerings and Assembly offerings of Bible Training Institute be sent to General Headquarters for the General Properties Fund.

MINISTERIAL AID: The Assembly recommends that 10% of national and international accounts of the Ministerial Aid Fund be sent to General Headquarters for the General Properties Fund.

Deeds for Church Property

The following resolution was adopted by the 58th Annual Assembly of the Church of God of Prophecy, held in Cleveland, Tennessee, September 10-16, 1963:

WHEREAS it has been advised by competent attorneys that specific mention of proper authorities be stated in an effort to ease the complications arising in our endeavors to be recognized by the courts, and to facilitate the handling of deeds to our church properties,

BE IT RESOLVED that trustees to hold title to local church property for the Church of God of Prophecy with international headquarters at Cleveland, Tennessee, be selected by the local church either in a regular or called business meeting, said trustees to be vested with authority to bargain, buy, sell, convey or encumber such property by mortgage or otherwise only when authorized to do so by the local church in regular or called business meeting, and with the consent of the General Trustees.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that said consent of the General Trustees be evidenced by a separate writing or by the signature of the Chief Clerk of the said General Trustees, such documents to be notarized.

BE IT RESOLVED that state church trustees appointed by the State Overseer to hold title to property for the Church of God of Prophecy with international headquarters at Cleveland, Tennessee, be vested with authority to bargain, buy, sell, convey, or encumber such property by mortgage with the consent of the General Trustees. This applies to property being held by state trustees where churches have been disbanded or are too weak to function and to property which has been given to the state. All other property with title being held by state trustees may be disposed of or mortgaged only by the consent of the state convention in session.

Note: The following Warranty Deed form has been prepared by the General Trustees and should be used where it is possible to do so. Blank forms may be secured from the General Trustees.

WE COVENANT that we are lawfully seized and possessed of said real estate; that we have a good and lawful right thus to sell and convey the same; that the title thereto is clear, free and unencumbered, and that we will forever warrant and defend said title against the lawful claims of all persons.

World Must Be Evangelized

It will take good organization and systematic methods to accomplish this task.

God's power is demonstrated in proportion to the unity and oneness of His people.

The members of the early Church were all of one accord, steadfast in the apostles' doctrine and fellowship, and the multitude that believed were of one heart and one soul, and great grace was upon them all and mighty results followed as a consequence of their perfect unity and careful organization.

We must banish from our minds the thoughts of individual or local independence and haphazard spasmodic efforts.

Pull together, pull at once, pull steadily all the time is the road to success.

All members should be ready to center their minds and prayers on the one thing, as a unit, when calls for special prayer are made. Each should feel his or her part of the responsibility, remembering that when one member fails, it cripples or dwarfs the body until the matter pending may fail.

Local Church Officers and Leaders

1. **Pastor:** It is the duty of the State or National Overseer to supply every church under his jurisdiction with a pastor. Pastors are to be appointed at the state or national convention and vacancies will be filled as they occur. The duties of the pastor expire at midnight the last Sunday in July at the church he is leaving and automatically begin at the same time at the church to which he is moving.

2. **Clerk:** The local church clerk is to be appointed by the pastor at the same time as the other leaders and officers any time at the pastor's discretion

during the first month of his new pastoral year; said appointments to be ratified in the following quarterly conference.

3. **Treasurer:** The treasurer is appointed in the same manner as the clerk. It is advised that one person serve as both clerk and treasurer when satisfactory to the local church. The treasurer will receive and disburse all funds of the local church including tithes, auxiliary funds and special funds and will maintain an accurate record of all receipts and disbursements.

4. **Auxiliary Leaders:** Leaders for the five auxiliaries—Sunday School, Womens Missionary Band, Victory Leaders Band, Church of Prophecy Marker Association, Assembly Band Movement—are appointed at the pastors discretion any time from the first Sunday of August to the October conference.

Each pastor, with the assistance of the deacons, should divide his members into bands of ten or twelve and appoint a leader for each band. The leader should keep in touch with each member of the band, and if any should move away, communication should be kept up by correspondence. This is for the mutual, spiritual, temporal, and social benefit of the members. The pastor should keep in close touch with the band leaders.

5. **Local Trustees:** Trustees to hold title to local church property are selected by the local church in a regular or called business meeting and are authorized to bargain, buy, sell, convey or encumber the local property only when authorized to do so by the local church in a regular or called business meeting, and with the written consent of the General Trustees.

6. **Other Officers and Leaders:** The Assembly has authorized the pastor to appoint a Church Literature Representative, Public Relations Director, Bible Training Institute Booster and any other leaders any time from the first Sunday of August to the October conference.

Business Meetings

Each local church should hold a regular business conference quarterly. It has been the practice to observe the first Monday night in January, April, July, and October for the conference. A meeting may be called any time by the pastor or State Overseer. A short business meeting may be held at the beginning or close of a meeting for worship.

The pastor should act as moderator of all business meetings. If there is no pastor, the State Overseer has authority to act or appoint a licensed male minister to preside. Where one pastor has the care of several churches, he may arrange the business meetings for his convenience.

Every member should attend every business session if possible. Women are

to take no open part in discussing or deciding questions, but should always be there and silently pray that God will give wisdom and direct the men.

Matters should be discussed with love, humility and meekness. No votes should be taken to decide questions. Everything should be done with one accord and questions settled by mutual agreement. If there is division on a matter, hold it over until all can agree. If one should seem obstinate and contrary, do not run the matter over him, but take up his case and investigate the cause of his obstinacy; if he shows a good spirit so that he can be heard, then show him courtesy. If he proves to be wrong, deal with him as the Bible directs. Then, take up the original subject and dispose of it in harmony and love.

If a matter cannot be settled satisfactorily by the local church, they should call for the assistance of the State Overseer. If they are still unable to reach a satisfactory conclusion, it should be referred to the General Overseer.

No one should give a message in tongues to the church unless there is an interpreter present, and then only one at a time and not more than three in a whole session.

Suggested Arrangement and Order of Business

Moderator, clerk, treasurer should occupy seats on the platform. Deacons and other ministers seated nearby.

Song service and prayer. Scripture lesson, and prayer by the moderator asking for wisdom and direction. Song.

Clerk read minutes of last regular meeting and any called meetings.

Correction of minutes, if any.

Treasurer give report of finances and always give an itemized statement of receipts and disbursements and balance in treasury.

Leader of the WMB give report of the work of the band, including finances, receipts and disbursements.

Victory Leaders Director give report of the work and progress of the band, including finances, receipts and disbursements.

Pastor give report of the ABM work, amount of money raised monthly, number of strays found and brought back (Luke 15:4-6), and give account of every member of his flock (Hebrews 13:17).

Report of CPMA Leader—number of members and receipts.

The Sunday School Superintendent give report of the work and progress of the school, including finances, receipts and disbursements.

Report of church literature representative.

Acceptance of transfers.

Members to transfer.

Unfinished business.

New business.

Miscellaneous business.

Adjournment by prayer.

Advice to Members

As a member, you count one and should attend every regular service as far as possible. Remember no one can fill your place and the service will be that much dwarfed and crippled without your presence.

Show love and fellowship to everyone without partiality. Don't wait for others to greet you but you greet them.

Show special courtesy to strangers who may attend one of your services.

As a rule, take part in the singing.

Be ready for vocal prayer when called on or prompted by the Spirit.

Be ready for testimony when such is in order.

Stand by your pastor or appointed leader and assist him in every way you can.

Always pray silently for the preacher while he delivers the message. Always live a consecrated life at home and abroad so no one can justly think or speak of you as a hypocrite.

Guard your conversation. Be careful what you say about a brother, sister, or anyone else.

Don't be a critic and try to find something in others to criticize.

Examine yourself occasionally and see if you are in the faith.

Don't yield to discouragement or despondency.

Be cheerful and happy and try to make others the same.

Spend as much time as you can in secret prayer. Give yourself all you can to intercessory prayer. Daily prayers and study of God's Word are necessary and very important for the spiritual welfare of each child of God; therefore, everyone is urged to faithfully maintain as far as is possible family worship at home at least once a day.

Your dress should be with moderation, neat and clean, but not for show. Moderation includes paying moderate prices for clothing, wearing dresses of high-enough necklines, low-enough hemlines, sleeves of reasonable length. The wearing of extremely sheer fabrics is unbecoming to a saint and the wearing of shorts in public should never be practiced. You should never wear gold for ornament or decoration. Finger rings, bracelets, earrings, necklaces, locketts and large showy pins—these are also unbecoming to a saint of God. Rouge, lipstick, nail polish and extremely costly perfumes are used to satisfy the pride of life and therefore they should have no place in the lives of those who love God. Please read and study these Scriptures often: 1 Peter 3:3, 4; 1 Timothy 2:9, 10 and 1 John 2:15-17.

You should not permit yourself to be trapped by worldly attractions. The Bible says, "Neither give place to the devil." Dabbling with worldly amusements like professional ballgames, horseraces, stockcar races, wrestling arenas, skating rinks, motion picture houses or drive-in theaters, bowling alleys and going swimming where men and women both use the same bathing area would give the devil a foothold or place in your life.

Always tithe your income and put it in the church treasury. Make freewill offerings other than your tithes.

Younger members should not keep company or associate too intimately with worldly outsiders.

Because of the ever-increasing number of broken homes, separations, divorces and remarriages, the greatest care should be taken with much prayer and consideration regarding proposed matrimony.

A member who may have a living companion should not marry another under any circumstances even if divorced. Neither should a member marry anyone who has a living companion although such a person may be divorced.

Children are an heritage from the Lord. Those who have children are responsible to teach them at an early age to reverence the house of God. This should be done by setting a good example before them and by instructing them with such a good spirit that they will have a strong desire to serve the

Lord. MINISTERS are to meet all of the requirements in being examples to the members by keeping their children under reasonable control at all times and by restraining them from running about over the house of God, especially while the services are in progress.

The White Wing Messenger is a very important part of the Church of God. It should be read regularly by every member and your interest in advertising the Church should be so great that when you have finished reading your copy, you would pass it along to someone else. Every member who possibly can should subscribe, and each minister is asked to be a "paid-up" subscriber and an earnest worker for our church paper—*The White Wing Messenger*.

These are the last days and perilous times have come and it will require much watchfulness and humble prayer for you to so live and act that you will never bring reproach on the worthy name of Christ and His Church that you so much love.

Never form to close an intimacy with the opposite sex even if they are brothers and sisters in the Lord. Give no place to the adversary. Abstain from the very appearance of evil.

These kindly instructions and advices are given by those who are watching for your soul as they must give an account (Hebrews 13:17), and it is hoped they will be received with the same meek, gentle spirit in which they are given.

Duties of State and National Overseers

Each overseer is to have the oversight of his state, nation or territory, and together with the General Overseer, will form the presbytery in his respective area. In addition to his general responsibility for the work under his jurisdiction, he will be responsible for specific duties:

To conduct or order a general evangelistic campaign during the year. If there are only a few churches in the state or area assigned him, he will serve primarily as an evangelist, evangelizing in new fields and endeavoring to establish new churches. If his area has a large number of churches and ministers, he will be responsible to organize and direct the evangelistic efforts of his workers in new fields.

To see that every church is supplied with a pastor.

To divide his state or territory into districts and place over each district an overseer as previously practiced. This is not a rule, but it is considered best when there are sufficient churches to make it practical. He should conduct district meetings at intervals during the year where special instructions concerning the work can be given.

To hold one general convention each year in the area most convenient for members from all the churches to attend.

To secure the name and address of every bishop, deacon, and evangelist under his jurisdiction and keep a record of these so he can report to the General Overseer, if necessary. He will also issue lay minister's certificates and keep the necessary records concerning them.

Keep an accurate record of the location of every church and the number of members in his territory, keeping a record of the increase so this information can be reported each year. This can be done by keeping in touch with the clerks of the churches. Every minister and clerk should take an interest in imparting this information to the overseer. All new organizations should be reported to the overseer.

To visit every district and church, if possible, and look after the interests in every way, as a pastor over a large circuit.

Duties of District Overseers

The district overseers are to be appointed by the State Overseer:

To moderate business conferences for women preachers who may be acting as pastors and for male pastors who are not licensed.

To do evangelistic work in his district. If he has a district with no churches, it is his duty to evangelize and organize churches.

To conduct district conventions according to the instructions of the State Overseer.

To assist the State Overseer, when called upon, in all things relating to church work and he is subject to the State Overseer.

Obligation for Membership in the Church of God of Prophecy

Will you sincerely promise in the presence of God and these witnesses that you will accept this Bible as the Word of God—believe and practice its teachings rightly divided—the New Testament as your rule of faith and practice, government and discipline, and walk in the light to the best of your knowledge and ability?

The minister who administers this obligation should see that every applicant replies in the affirmative. In taking the obligation, applicants should think of it as being a perpetual covenant that shall not be forgotten.

Teachings of the Church of God of Prophecy

The Church of God of Prophecy stands for the whole Bible rightly divided—the New Testament as the only rule for government and discipline. Twenty-nine of the most prominent teachings:

REPENTANCE—Mark 1:15; Luke 13:3; Acts 3:19.

JUSTIFICATION—Romans 5:19; Titus 3:7.

REGENERATION—Matthew 19:28; Titus 3:5.

BORN AGAIN—John 3:3; 1 Peter 1:23; 1 John 3:9.

SANCTIFICATION subsequent to Justification—Romans 5:2; 1 Corinthians 1:30; 1 Thessalonians 4:3; Hebrews 13:12; 1 John 1:9.
