

Prefatory Notes

The wonder to me is that they were able to keep their minds on their work sufficiently to make a correct record because of the glory of the Lord and the display of His power that prevailed throughout the whole from beginning to end.

Introductory

On the evening of November 2, the great and beautiful Auditorium was formally dedicated to God for His holy services.

At 6:20 P. M. the congregation, planists and orchestra were all in their places, and as the sweet soft strains of the plano began to steal out upon the air, the General Overseer, A. J. Tomlinson, and wife, and their attendants entered the Auditorium at the north front entrance and marched slowly up the aisle, led by an usher, across in front of the platform and up on the platform and took their places on the front.

Perfect silence in all parts of the building.

Then as the piano played the elders and their wives marched in at the north front entrance. These all stopped in front of platform, facing platform while the General Overseer read the following:

Yes, we are here. It has taken years of travel and toil to reach this sacred place. God in His wisdom has provided for progression and has put within man a disposition to build. When the people began to multiply on the face of the earth after the great flood that destroyed the race they decided to build a city and a tower. They were bent on doing something and they/went at it. At that time the Creator made a startling statement that has ever been the means of encouraging union and concerted action.

"Behold, the people is one," He said, "and they all have one language; and this they begin to do: and now nothing will be restrained from them,

which they have imagined to do."

God did not want them to build the city and the tower, and the way He stopped them was to "confound their language," and get them confused so they could not continue their activities, because they could not understand one another, and thus they became disorganized. "And they left off to build the city."

When Jesus prayed the prayer for His people to become united in a oneness, He must have intended for them to build—progress. And it is by this means that great things are accomplished. This great structure would not have been standing here had it not been for the agreement, unity and oneness that existed in the great Church of God. Multitudes have worked together and made it possible for this magnificent building to rise piece by plece from what was once a barren spot of ground.

God has ordained that man shall not be alone in building and thus He niade woman for a helpmeet for the man. Here in our midst are twelve pillars of the Church with their wives by their side for support and added strength. Man leads the way but the woman is either at his side or close up

in the rear.

This object lesson is to demonstrate the additions in building. In this structure—the Auditorium—was first laid the foundation, then followed the additional material day after day until all the work was done, and last of all comes the beautiful decorations, and now it is ready for formal dedication to God for His holy use.

In this object lesson is shown the General Overseer and his faithful helpmeet and their attendants. Then follow the twelve elders with their companions, and after these the twenty-four bishops, representatives of the sattre rank of bishops, and when these are all in place, then come the

decorations, singers to put on the finishing touch, with their music and song

Following the day of Pentecost it is plainly stated that they were added to the church daily such as were being saved. That was building—constructing. Away in the depths is laid the apostles and prophets for the foundation, Jesus Christ being the chief corner stone. Then followed the other material added daily. And material is still being added, and who knows but we will soon be ready for the decorations! And what could be more appropriate than an army with banners, and how could this be better described than in the words of the Psalmist when he sang, "The king's daughter within the palace is all glorious. Her clothing is inwrought with gold. She shall be led unto the king in raiment of needle work. The virgins her companions that follow her shall be brought unto thee. With gladiness and rejoicing shall they be led. They shall enter into the king's palace."

At close of reading, one minute silence with holy reverence to God, then while piano played, half the elders and wives marched single file, liusband in front of wife, up on one end of platform, following usher: at the same time the other half marched up on the other end of the platform; following usher:

As music ceased all stood in perfect silence before God. When plano sounded loud all were seated

While the piano continued to play twelve bishops came in at each front entrance and marched down the airles, single file, ushers leading the way up on the platform:

When these twenty-four were at their places music ceased and all remained standing in perfect silence before God.

While piano continued to play the singers marched in, half at one entrance and half at the other, following ushers. They formed in front of platform, facing platform, and sang the song, Church of God:

As the echo from this song died away, there was silence before God,

then prayer by J. S. Llewellyn and perfect silence again.

The singers turned their faces to the congregation and sang, I'm Going That Way, then there was silence again. After silence the singers were seated on the front seats:

Music by orchestra, from Alabama, followed by perfect silence.

We have read about heaven but we have never been there yet, unless this is heaven tonight. If heaven is better than this, it is certainly a place desirable to go to. I have read about how they sing up there; I have read about how they fall down and worship the Lord; I have read about how they say, Holy! Holy! Lord God Almighty! Then such rejoicing and praising God such as this world has never heard! We are getting ready for this happy place. We are in a training school and we are getting a good lesson tonight.

As we come from the North, East, South and West, it reminds me of what the Bible says, that there are three gates on the North, three gates on the East, three gates on the South and three gates on the West. Sometimes, there is going to be a great gathering and somebody is going to be amazed as they see a crowd of people filled with the Holy Ghost rise and take their flight and come on all sides and evidently there will be room enough for them to come in at once just like the people come to the Assembly. It seems to me this year that the people tried to see who could get here first and some have been staying here three or four weeks waiting for this thing and others have been on the road three or four weeks and are yet, and I trust they will get here. We are training for the Great Assembly and this is the greatest we have seen, but we are getting ready for a greater.

A story is told of a race for life on the plains of far away Russia. A gentleman was riding leisurely along on his wheel on a journey from one city to another. Presently he heard the bark of a wolf in the distance. He thought nothing of it at first as he had been accustomed to hearing these barks all his life. But the sound came closer and others joined in until the noise grew fierce and loud. He suddenly awakened to the fact that a drove of wolves was pursuing him. He straightened himself up in his saddle and began to speed up his wheel. The road was level and good and he was an expert wheelman and he thought he would make it through by a little extra perseverance. He was now fairly splitting the air when suddenly he heard a bark close behind him. One main big wolf was leading the way and the drove was quite a distance behind. But he still increased his speed and felt but little alarm provided his trusted wheel did not fail him.

On, on he flew with the wolves only a few hundred yards behind. They were not gaining on him, and all he had to do was to keep a level head and ply his muscle and fly down the road: At length he neared a certain stream, but this gave him no alarm, as he had passed over the bridge many times in the past. There had been a storm and he heard the rolling of the water as it dashed and foamed. against the rocks as it rushed on down the channel. The place where the bridge should have been was now watched one after another

be possessed with the greatest in sight, but the bridge where was it? He could not slow up and take time to investigate, or the wolves would overtake him in a moment. The evening shades were gathering and somewhat hindered his vision. But on, on he sped, trusting himself in the hands of fate. He preferred risking his chances of life, battling with the roaring, rushing waters, than to stop and give himself up to be torn and mangled and devoured by that pack of hungry, blood-thirsty wolves. Hetightened the tension of every nerve and did his very best as his wheel carried him up to the bank of the river where the bridge had been before the storm. As he was almost to: the edge ready for a leap into the surging, foaming waters he discovered one straight girder that spanned the river, so he guided his wheel care fully and suddeny shot out on that narrow girder. He felt himself comparatively safe for he was sure the wolves would not follow him then: and his efficiency in handling his wheel gave him hope of a final escape, when suddenly he discovered; that he was being followed by those fierce wolves that were so bent on a good square meal of human flesh that they took no notice of any danger in falling from that narrow bridge. No: sooner did he discover that the wolves were following him till he made another startling discoverythe girder upon which he was fairly flying did not reach the other bank by some ten or twelve feet. But he could not stop now, he must speed on at the risk of his life. It was life or death anyway and he would increase his perseverance. Much quicker than I am telling it he reached the end of his narrow bridge and was going at almost lightning rapidity. The bicycle plunged against the bank and he pitched on over the handle bar and landed on the bank, and although somewhat bruised and frightened he was safe. He picked himself up just in time to see the first wolf make a leap for the bank but fell into water below. And he stood there and pack of blood-thirsty man eaters plunge off of the end of that gang plank and were buried in the mad rushing waters below.

This was a race for life, but no more than is the Christian race if we were only awakened to it as that man was. How many are riding leisurely along on the providences and happenings incident to quiet \mathbf{a} happy-go-lucky life? No energy expended. Perseverance unthought of. and danger never dreamed of. Read the Scriptures occasionally and pass over the verse about the devil going about as a roaring lion seeking whom he may devour as a tale that is told; and with a yawn exclaim, I'm not afraid. But we have been awakened to a sense of danger. We know we must run for our lives. We know it will take perseverance to make the run successful. We do not know all the pitfalls and dangers and narrow. passages ahead, but we quicken our speed and rush on toward the goal. A million demons are after us and we. are-ontour road to the CITY, but unlike the man on the plains of Russia who only had himself to save, we are called upon to "Rescue the perishing: and care for the dying" that are lying along the way. And it will take perseverance to do this. And it takes an extreme amount of perseverance to meet the Scriptural requirements in this respect.

I wish I could make somebody feel something of what I feel to-day after having traveled quickly over the past sixteen years again and watched the battles and growth of the greatest in stitution on earth. At that time there were only five churches and about a hundred and twenty members. now there are about six hundred churches and probably twenty thousand members. Behold what hath God wrought? Surely, surely; we have learned not to despise the day of small things.

Orphanage and Childrens Home.

Although there had been much talk for a year, of a home where children could be taken and trained for God and His Church, there was but little materialized when the Assembly was on a year ago. Many were enthused about it, and many prayers prayed for directions in the matter, but it was not just easy to start, and really take upon ourselves the grave responsibilities incident to a home of this kind. It was not until the seventeenth day of December, 1920, that the home became a reality. much prayer and waiting on God and His providences our courage became such that the home was formally opened with a matron and only four children on the above named date.

It was only a short time after it was announced in the Evangel that the home was opened, that applications began to come in. One after another was admitted until the number ran up to fifteen-which was the full capacity of the small house used for a nursery during the Assembly last; year: But the applications have never ceased coming. Plaintive appeals have poured in to our sanctum that have been hard to resist, and

than three now. Thus we have been compelled to hold off every applicant until another building was erected and ready to occupy. (During the reading concerning orphans there was much weeping throughout the congregation.)

On account of the awful financial pressure that has prevailed over the country the past year it was no easy matter to decide to start another house. We wanted to start it in the our courage was: early spring, but not sufficient under the circumstances. But finally after much prayer, consideration and consultation we ventured a campaign and made the announcement in the Evangel. The interest was good everywhere, and: some of the states informed us that they were going to do something toward erecting houses in honor of their states, and sent in some money for the purpose, but none were successful in raising a sufficient amount for a start. But by a series of drives made in the city of Cleveland for a City of Cleveland House, sufficient funds were raised and pledges made to give us a start, and the result of our efforts is a nice bungalow not far from the Auditorium enclosed and ready for the inside work to be commenced. We hope to have this house. finished and ready for a home for some more children soon. The citizens and business men of our city have been very liberal in their donations to this home and we expect the full amount for its completion.

When the business of our country becomes more prosperous we expect for several states to continue their drives for funds so it will not be long until new houses will spring up on the beautiful land purchased for the purpose. The great state of Illinois project, but is in the lead in this Florida is not much behind, and Virginia has quite an interest already awakened, while Tennessee is almost ready to come along with her part of. the interesting project. And doubtless other states will soon become aroused and commence work in earonly because it was impossible were nest. Surely there will be at least we able to say, We cannot take them a half dozen beautiful structures completed by the next Assembly. I have been informed that one good brother in the far away state of California is on the verge of laying down the cash for one house at a cost of five thousand dollars. This may happen almost any day.

Well, this part of the work is going. It is now getting up steam and preparing for a tremendous pull up the hill of victory. The little homeless darlings must be provided with a home and its comforts. If business is prosperous the work can be done with comparative ease, and if business is dull, and the financial pressure still prevails it will make such a home all the more necessary. So there is really no place to stop now since the great project has been launched. The only thing to do now is to pick up courage and pull through. There is provision made on the program for a special service to be devoted to this department of the Church work. At this service the precious darlings of the home will sing the verses that were so wonderfuly blessed of God in the launching of the orphanage enterprise. I fancy I hear the echo now as the darling voices sing,

"For we have no mamma, no home. We can't earn our bread, we're too little," she said,

"Jim's five years, and I only seven, There is no one to love us since papa is dead.

And darling mamma's in heaven."

But these, our darlings, do have some one to love them, they do have plenty of bread, they do have a home, but look at the countless thousands who are without parents. without homes, without bread, without Christian training and without hope in the world. These we have are safe, but close your eyes for a moment as I have done for two years occasionally, and view the tiny little hands and bony fingers reaching up and saying in the sweetest and most pathetic tones: "Take me please." Then let your heart melt as you meditate for a moment. Think how it might be your own precious darlings some day slowly approached the other ships.

Prepare for the Storm

Some one described a storm at sea as witnessed in a dream or by a vision. There was the great blue sea with its great expanse stretching as far as eye could see. Upon its crest and lying placidly upon its bosom were as number of large ships, beautifully decorated and having all their sails set. The thing that so attracted the seer was that every ship had a great banner gently waving in the breeze; and upon the banner were words inbeautifully painted letters. could be read distinctly at a distance. These words were the names of the common churches of our day. I do not repeat this with the least degree of disrespect to any of these churches, for they have all had: their day in doing great things in good ways.

Among the number was one that seemed to attract the seer more than the others because of its freshness. and beautiful luster and hue. The sails seemed to be of extra whiteness? Its maneuverings were strange as it

While watching the scene, suddenly a cloud covered the sun and cast its shadows over the bosom of the great ocean as if night were approaching. In a few moments the sky was black with clouds and the lightning flashed and the thunder pealed. The great surface of the ocean was suddenly turned into rollinge, whirlings, dashings; cataracts, and whirlpools. Darkness hovered over the scene so dense that all ships were lost to view. The storm was the most severe of the season. How could anything breast waves and live on such a high sea! Impossible, it seemed!

The seer watched in vain for one glimpses of the stately vessels that her knew were there an hour before. The storm grew worse as it rolled the waves like mountains and then suddenly withdrew only to let them dashwover each other into a mass of seething foam. great organizations and institutions: it may be time for us to look deeper into the Scriptures in search of anything that we can do to reenforce and strengthen its beams and bars, as well as protect it from the onslaughts of oppositions from any source from which they may come. so it will pull through the storms, and never flounder or found-

Who knows but by looking a little deeper into the Word of God we may find something that we can do to add strength, and power as well as prestige? This is our method, of procedure. This is the object of holding: our Assemblies annually. And every year finds new mines opened up producing their glittering gold and glorious truths. We have been loudly criticised because we have made so many changes during the past sixteen years. But this is one of the principles of the great Church of God. Wedid not know it all when we started, so we obligated ourselves to search for truth and walk in the light as it is revealed through the Holy Ghost and the Holy Scriptures. I would have our friends and foes to know that we are not staked out by a tether. A tether is a rope for confining an animal within certain limits. But God has not said to us as He said to the great ocean waves. Thus far and no further. He has rather said to us. Let us go on unto perfection-there are greater things ahead and thou shalt have all the land that thy foot. shall tread upon, launch out into the deep and let down your nets.

is set, "apostles, prophets, eyangelists, pastors and teachers; for the perfecting of the saints, for the work of the ministry, for the edifying of the body of Christ: till we all come in the unity of the faith, and of the knowledge of the Son of God, unto a perfect man, unto the measure of the stature of the fullness of Christ: that we henceforth be no more children, tossed to and fro, and carried about with every wind of docfrine, by the sleight of men, and cunning craftiness, whereby they lie in wait to deceive; but speaking the truth in love, may grow up into him in all things, which is the head, even Christ."

Where is the limit to God? Where is the limit to His Son? Where, then, can be the limit to His Church? This does not imply that there is no danger of heresy or fanaticism; but the land ahead is in searching for depths and heights, lengths and breadths of truth and when found put it in practice for the advancement of the great work of God. People can get into error, but which is the most: dangerous error, to enthusiastically and zealously run into it, or sit still and not try to find the hidden wealth that is lying dormant and unused in the folds of His great treasure house? I have seen people who were so fearful of running into error that they sat still and would not do the things that were right.

Courts of Justice

Another step forward has recommended by some. It is believed that it would be in perfect harmony with Scriptural teaching and strengthening to the Church in many ways to add two persons to the court of appeals, as we might express it, to hear cases that may properly come before them. At the present time the Assembly has provided that any member who has been tried before the local church, and he feels that he has not been given; justice; can appeal his case to the overseer of the state for rehearing. It is not advised to change just to add one of the twelve elders and a bishop in the state who may be appointed to act with the overseer of state in hearing such cases.

It is believed also that before this Council should be brought all applicants for the ministry for special examination besides the common practice of each applicant answering the ninety-nine questions on the examination certificate. The final accept ance to be made by the General and State overseers as has been our practice for years. This is meant to be set as a safeguard for the ministry in these last days when christendom: is swarming with fakes and would be leaders and spies. This way of doing the business will not hurt any of the good and wise, and at the same time will serve as a safeguard to the ministry. Appeals from the decision of this court may be taken to a still higher court just as provided by the Assembly in the past, although the higher court may consist of three or five judges to assist the General Overseer. Frankly things at the

This subject will be discussed vat length by one or more of the speakers at a later session. The Scriptural method is what we want and here is a great body of people that are always ready to bow to thus saith the Lord. This is what makes the Church of God a theocratic form of government. The Bible settles, everything; and we consider the Bible God's word to us.

There has been some slight dissat: isfaction in the past by some who have felt they were not given justice in the settlement of cases. This system recommended is meant to make a way for perfect satisfaction in everything. The Church of Godwise the greatest institution in the world. and the Bible is the greatest and best law book of all books, and it behooves us as the "peculiar people" of earth to put in practice the highest and best methods described on its sacred pages. The principles of government laid down in that Book are of this order, but as a matter of strength the very highest type, and when we far above principality, and power, and might, and dominion, and every name that is named, not only in this come. "For by him were all things. created; that are in heaven, and that are in earth, visible and invisible. whether they be thrones, or dominions, or principalities, or powers: all things were created by him and for him." I think it is great to have Him, the greatest personage of the universe and vested with authority above all, to be our Head, Lawgiver and King. The Church of God is honored above all institutions of earth. And we are not able to comprehend the honor bestowed upon us as members. It is not so much wonder then that we are exhorted by the noble Apostle to walk worthy of the vocation wherein we are called. I tell you, it is surely time for us to take a review of our exalted position. We may not know the depths and heights of the sacred institution known as the Church of God, as well as we may have thought. We are there to learn more of it this year. The meager light we have had may seem, like dim glimmers before we get through the Sixteenth General Assembly.

The Seventy

It was in the twelfth General Assembly that convened at Harriman, Tennessee, November 1-7, 1916, that it was decided to select twelve mento constitute a cabinet to assist the General Overseer in whatever business he might need their counsel and help. Not only was it decided to select twelve, but also to add others to the number from time to time as needed until the number seventy was reached. This was believed to be in harmony with the Scriptures, both in the Old and New Testaments. As far as could be seen then, this would correspond with the practices of the early Church. It was understood that it possession of us.

Whether this reasoning was pendable or not many of us who are here to-day remember how we were all subdued in our spirits as we felt the presence of the Lord so forcibly when the final conclusion was reached and it was said. It seems good to the Holy Ghost and us. We felt that we were on the right road whether we had reached the end of it or not. And we surely were, for the Church has been more prosperous and made greater advancement since that time. The General Overseer has felt great relief and much added strength in special counsel with these brethren, besides it seemed to give him a standard of strength and confidence in the performance of his duties that had never before enveloped him so forciblv:

The twelve were selected in the manner decided upon by the Assembly and installed in their respectivepositions: They have been serving: faithfully, with one exception, for about four years, but there has been no time yet when it was considered advisable to select the other; fiftyeight or any part of them. I believe God has had His hand on the wholeaffair, and is still watching every. move and guiding the ship in its voyage across the sea of the last days. In the Council we have tried to look deeper into the Scriptures, and held ourselves in readiness to have the additional elders selected, but there always seemed to be something about it that left us feeling rather disinterested and doubtful. We could not get as good understanding of what their duties should be after they were chosen. And it was not until quite recently that any degree of interest took

I think: it was in August of this Church was pleased with the deciyear when meditating upon a plan to give the Church new life, and makey it seem more secure for the last day's voyage, that, like a flash, these words, "Other Seventy" rolled through my mind. They came with such force that I was startled at first. I went on with my business, however, and did not take time to stop and open the Scriptures or even gather any thing from memory. But the words never left me. I knew that the "Lord appointed other seventy also." and raised them to a rank almost equal with that of the twelve, and separate and apart from the common everyday disciples. I remembered about the seventy that were chosen by Moses in the Church in the Wilderness, and how Joshua, who seemed to be one of Moses' special aids, became jealous for Moses; his immediate superior, when Eldad and Medad began to prophesy in the camp.

Finally, on looking deeper into the Scriptures, I came to the conclusion that instead of merely increasing the number of elders to seventy that it was nearer Scriptural to appoint other seventy also. The twelve to be the immediate counselors to the General Overseer, and the twelve and seventy jointly, with the General overto compose. the official part of the General Assembly, I conclude this is in harmony with the General Assembly that held forth, and was the highest tribunal in the days of the early Church while the Apostles still remained. In support of this view we have only to turn to the decision of the brethren at Antioch. When they were confronted with some questions that they were unable to settle they decided to go up to Jerusalem and lay the question before the apostles and elders for definite settlement. And in due time, after the subject was. carefully discussed: James. the General Overseer. nounced the decision. And this forever settled the question.

In connection with please note that while the

sion, and apparently the discussion. was not limited to the apostles and elders, yet it is said that it was the apostles and elders that came together to consider the matter, and it was the apostles and elders and brethren that sent the greetings and decrees to the churches in "Antioch and Syria and Cilicia." The above analogy and reasoning seems to make it clear: that the official Assembly is composed of both the twelve and seven ty, presided over by the General Ov! erseer, making a total of eighty-three, vested with official authority, but not excluding the brethren and the whole Church.

But this subject will be presented more extensively and elaborately by one of the speakers in a future session.

The subject of the twelve and seventy was presented to the twelve in Council a few weeks ago and after looking at it from every angle it was unanimously agreed that it was worthy of presentation to the Assembly for their consideration. And if this view is accepted it does not conflict. with the action of the twelfth General Assembly, but only adds to it in a way to prove that we were then being guided by the unseen hand of God into the pathway that leads to the final consummation.

The more I give my attention to this subject, the more I feel its importance. I, therefore, feel constrained to urge that this Assembly give it careful. prayerful. and deliberate. consideration. I do not want this to pass through simply because the General Overseer recommends it, and yet the twelve endorse it. their recommendation and endorsement should have some weight. But I earnestly appeal to your knowledge of the Bible and the wisdom and common sense God has given you for a just and sound consideration and de cision. Earnest prayer for God's Holy Spirit to guide in the matter this subject should not be neglected. He must whole have the pre-eminence in all of our

deliberations and decisions. We honor Him as our chief executive who makes our decisions for us and leads us to them in His own good time and way.

If it should finally be decided that: this is the Scriptural standard for the Church of God and its General Assembly, then it will become your duty to determine the Scriptural manner of appointment of the other seventy. When the seven were chosen to take charge of the distribution of food, when there were many thousands to be fed for a short period of time from a common fund, the twelve instructed the multitude of the disciples to look out seven men well qualifled for the work, "whom we (the twelve) may appoint over this business." While the multitudes were to to look out the men yet the appointment was reserved for the twelve. In the case of the other seventy it is stated clearly that Jesus appointed them. And when God told Moses to select seventy men to assist him in bearing the burden of the government of the Church in the wilderness He depended upon Moses to make the selection, only He instructed him in regard to their qualifications.

If it should be decided that the official appointment be made by the General Overseer, then I would recommend that the twelve or others present the names of men whom in their judgment are qualified for the position and from these the final appointment be made. But this will be altogether for this great body of lovers of God and lovers of Scriptural methods to determine, after they give the subject due consideration.

Before leaving this important subject there is another phase to which I wish to call attention. We are a body of people that are bent on finding the very best methods of doing things and we believe that Scriptural methods are always the best, but in many things we are left at sea by the Bible, because it does not give everything in minute detail. But in such places, we do no violence to adopt

methods best suited to the time, place and circumstances. In the selection of the other seventy and the length of their term of office we may not find a definite rule laid down in our law-book to follow, and if not, it behoves us to act wisely and institute a rule that will be the means of increasing prestige and power and not be in the least sense contrary to the principles of the Bible as a whole. The Church of God is a theocratic form of government, and this principle must be adhered to in all our deliberations and decisions.

In my judgment the term of office for the other seventy could be twoyears, five years, seven years, ten years, or for life and not violate any laws or rules laid down in the Scriptures. And in any case provisions should be made for expulsion if one should violate his obligation, become disloyal, or enter into sinful practices. outright. If the term of office should betwo years then I would suggest that: the first thirty-five be selected for the two years and the second thirty-five for only one year at the start so that. the term of only half of them would expire at the same time. Likewise if the term should be five years then I would suggest that the first fourteen. be selected for the full term of five years, the second fourteen for only four years, the third fourteen for only three years and so on down so that last fourteen selected would ,. serve only one year. This plan would make it necessary to appoint fourteen every year, and after the first appointments are made the next appointments would all be for a term of: five years. After this System runs: for five years there will always be fourteen vacancies every year and fourteen appointments to make. This system provides for the assurance of always having fifty-six men of experience and yet leaves an opportunity for the insertion of fourteen new men every year if desired, or the old ones may be reappointed. The same principle will serve for seven years, or ten years, only for seven

years there would be only ten to appoint each year, and if ten years is a term there would be only seven to appoint each year. Provisions should also be made for filling vacancies in case of death.

But these are merely suggestions in order to get the subject before the Assembly, I know that God wil help us in reaching conclusions. We are steadily moving forward, scaling new heights and exploring deeper depths. We are constantly penetrating deeper into the veins of rich deposits of the precious Word of God. We want to know everything about it that should be known in our dispensation. And no sooner do we learn it than we want to put it in practice. The very day I was convinced or feet washing I called a meeting in the evening and we washed feet. And the very day I was convinced I should be baptized in water I pulled off down to the river and was buried beneath the waves, although the water was chilled by a cold northwestern gale in the state of Maine not far from the Canada line. The Church of God stands for a speedy practice of everything in that sacred Book as fast as it is learned.

Anchored

Since we are living in the last days when every weapon available to the enemy will be aimed at the Church of God, it is necessary for us to see that every Scriptural protection is thrown around it for protection. We have been carefully and prayerfully wending our way along through the shades of the early dawn. and it is marvelous to some of us as the day breaks to find we have not missed the mark so far after all. But every year we take special pains to go over every department and see if there is any way to strengthen any part of the great ship—the Church-of God.

A basket may be a basket, but stays with the voice together shall they can be added to make the basket sing; for they shall see eye to eye, stronger. A house may be a house when the Lord shall bring again Zion but braces and stays may be added to Break forth into joy, sing together.

make it more secure against storms. In some places there are no severe storms and a house does not need so much bracing. But where these terrible cyclones sweep the country one; does not feel secure in a little plank house with no braces in it. The time has been when the plank house experience was alright, but, now it isnecessary to have the very best timbers in place and be anchored in a. manner that all the winds from the depths of hell turned loose on the building will never cause it to shake or rock about. The anchorage mustbe of the very best and strongest material, and the anchors themselves. made both sure and steadfast.

This subject will be given more extensive consideration by one of the speakers who will probably disclose somes of the fastenings needed to make the great ship so secure that hell's fiercest storms beating against it will be nothing more than the gentle breezes of mid-summer time. Instead of shattering and breaking with their furious blasts, they will only berefreshing and buoyant in their effect. And, such is the Church of God against which the gates of hell shall not prevail. With its full constitution or system of fundamental laws properly displayed it will consider the fiercest onslaughts of the enemy nothing more than play things and will playfully laugh at the hottest, hardest, flercest belchings from the depths. of hell with the millions of demonssending forth their flery darts and most furious explosives. I fancy I hear her say, as a strong charge is: made against her, "Ha, ha, ha, come again if you want to, it is only play for me. No weapon that is formed against. me shall prosper, and these thrusts by your satanic hosts only brighten me up so I will shine more brilliantly." Then I can imagine the fulfill. ment of Isaiah's prophecy as he sang. "Thy watchman shall lift up the voice, with the voice together shall they sing; for they shall see eye to eye, when the Lord shall bring again Zion.

ye waste places of Jerusalem: for the Lord has comforted his people, he hath redeemed Jerusalem. The Lord has made bare his holy arm in the eyes of all the nations; and all the ends of the earth shall see the salvation of our God."

The Financial System

It would hardly seem like an Assembly not to have something to say about the financial system. This subject has been before us for years which shows it is one of great importance. From the very earliest history of the Church this subject has been one among those of paramount importance. It occupied an important place while the people were under the law, and before the law as well, and during the short period when Jesus was with His disciples, and it was carried on over into the first days of the outpouring of the Holy Ghost, and ran on down through Paul's day, and has never had an end yet. And I do not know of e time that there will not need to be some medium for the exchange of values.

One year ago something occurred right here on this floor that was such a surprise to me that I was almost dazed as the object sped by so. swiftly. The sentiment for the change of the system was much stronger than I believed it to be, and when the time came for the decision it was snapped off like photographer's а camera... Some unseen power seemed to pressathe bulb and it was all over in a few moments. I do not think I was responsible for it because I did not expect it to go as it did. But when it was gone I could do nothing but stand and look at it. But with all this I would not dare say it did not take the right turn. I'd be afraid to say anything against it. And I would feel like walking very softly and carefully to even offer any amendment to what was done in those hours when the whole Assembly was under the open and God's presence was over us in such a measure that nothing

ye waste places of Jerusalem: for the more could have been done than was Lord has comforted his people, he done.

Reflecting back to what led to the decision brings a peculiar sacredness over the subject. And I feel I must touch very softly lest I be found treading that might on something displease the Lord. What I say on this subject must be carefully guarded. I am going to be very careful what I say about anything that has God's approval upon it as was demonstrated in making the change in the financial system in the Assembly a year ago. After I saw how it went I almost regretted that I did not boldly recommend it as it was finally accepted. Some may have thought I recommended it, but I did not I only referred to it as being favored by: many. Here are my words in introducing the subject:

"It is not my purpose to speak from a personal point of view at this time. I am only to speak now of a sentiment among our people, and it may be stronger than some of us realize. That sentiment is in favor of a general headquarters treasury into which all the tithes are to be placed, with seven men to regulate and make, or order, the distribution among the ministers according to their needs and the efficiency of their work, and the responsibility of the position in which they serve."

I had added only a few more words. when there were some messages given in tongues and the interpretations followed which were convincing tothose present that we were on the right road. When the system was. adopted unanimously it was also "decided that the General Overseer and the elders work out the plan," or in: other words, the Assembly selected the General Overseer and elders totake hold of the business and organize the system and put it into practice. And this seemed to please the Holy Ghost and the whole Assembly.

In council afterwards the elders: did not feel like taking the responsibility of selecting seven men to do the business since the Assembly:

authorized the General Overseer and twelve elders to take it in hand. And it could hardly be said that the seven in the early church who had charge of feeding the multitude could be taken as an example for handling the tithes. In speaking of the seven it may be well to say they never occupled a permanent position. Their service in that capacity lasted while the multitudes who were present from all over the world remained at Jerusalem. As soon as that great camp meeting was over and the multitudes went back home there was no more need of the seven. Stephen went to heaven to see Jesus. Philip went to preaching and was known as an evangelist, and none were appointed to fill the vacancies. The fact is, that office was discontinued. And they never handled any tithes at all.

Without going over the business in detail suffice it to say that the present system has been practiced for only ten months. During these months there has been some slight dissatisfaction. But where is the government that has launched a new and untried system that did not have in it some who were dissatisfied? And how can any one expect as great a system as this one to break right in and run smoothly every month for the first ten months? It may be that some of the dissatisfied ones could have managed the business better, and may be they could not. Those who have it in charge were inexperienced, and it being the first, there was no one who had had experience to whom they could apply for help, so who knows if any others could have done better?

It seems that at first both the ministers and churches got into their minds that the tithes would be sufficient to support the ministry and they were all looking to headquarters, but they all took it good naturedly while they were learning their lesson. And while they were learning their lesson those who had the business in charge at headquarters were learning some things too. Take it altogether the experience of the past ten months has

been worth much to alf of us. If the system has not geen a success it is certainly no fault of the system—the fault is in the operators. And if the operators have failed it is due to inexperience or lack of ability. If it is due to inexperience the past ten months have brought in boat loads of this kind of merchandise. If the fault is due to inability then some body that is able should be selected to take charge of this important business.

But we have passed through another year and I suppose we are none the worse off spiritually and probably in no other way, for the battles we have had with the wolf at the door. If you and your children have not had the proper food, and if the little ones have cried for bread and been put to bed hungry your General Overseer and his family know how to sympathize with you, having had similar exalong in battling periences while his early ministry when there were no tithes, and but a very scant supply of offerings and gifts. Yes, we have been along the road, and possibly none the worse off for it today.

As far as I can learn the dissatisfaction about the tithing system disappeared gradually when it was remembered that the Bible reads "tithes and offerings," and that to depend upon tithes alone would not do, beinsufficient, and were cause they tithes were all that headquarters had for distribution. Indeed we have all been in a good high grade school for ten months, and probably the education we have obtained during that period of time will be worth more to us in the future than we realize now. And we are all here now, loving one another better, and happy over winning the hard fought battles of the past. Doubtless you have done your? best under the circumstances. I have done my best, although my best has not/ been up to the standard I have had marked out. I have never been able to do as much as I wanted to I have always fallen short of my expectations and hopes. But I don't give

standard I have set up. I try, try again.

Progression

In spite of the financial depression of the country which has been the means of cutting down the support of the ministers and worked a hardship on almost all the members, the progress of the Church has far surpassed any previous year. The revival waves have been rolling high. How we all rejoiced when the monthly reports showed such large numbers saved, sanctified and filled with the Holy Ghost: The spiritual blessings began to fall last winter and the waves grew larger" and more powerful as the months sped by. The highest reported for a given month was that reached in August when the number that was baptized with the Holy Ghost reached the sum of 1316 and there were 1162; added to the Church. This was great. All this wonderful outpouring, and the gracious revivals that God has given, give rise to the belief of many that God has been setting His approval on the financial system that was adopted last year. Whether this is true or not the results have been great. The reports will show the increase of churches and membership. And I am sure there will be some rejoicing because our names are written in heaven when the reports are read.

The Macedonian calls have far surpassed any time of the past. There have been calls each year for Church of God ministers, but this year they have multiplied many times. The preachers have not had to go and drum up meetings and get places to preach. The doors have been wide open. The great trouble has been that we have not had a sufficient number of workers to walk in at the doors when thev flew open: Quite number of: our preachers have had to work hard to earn support for their families, for which I honor them, but they preached at night and on Sundays. They never gave up the fight. I think we have the best set of ministers that the world Gentiles, and

up because I can't measure up to the can produce. Of course they would be the best for they are all baptized. with the Holy Ghost and fire. And they will preach whether the people: nay them anything or not. They feel compelled like Paul, who said, "Woe is unto me, if I preach not the gospel." and yet they do it willingly and gladly. But the grand old Church of God still thrives and prospers, and its members are happy and full of spiritual life, and most of them have strong heathy bodies. Who ever saw: so many people together, all filled with the Holy Ghost, as are here before me. this day? Everything indicates prosperity. Every body feels that holy fire of progression burning within. A thousand neople here now can hardly hold themselves. It seems they would: burst if they were compelled to stop telling the lovely story of the cross. with all it means to humanity. We are determined to fill the world with our doctrine. If the people do not want to come in touch with it they will have to move over to Mars or Jupiter. This world has to be filled with God's glory, and the Church of God. is the instrument through which it will come. A happy expression more than two thousand six hundred years old tells the story of the progression of the Church of God in the last days: "Enlarge the place of thy tent, and let them stretch forth the curtains of thine habitations; not, lengthen thy cords, and strengthen thy stakes; for thou shalt break forth on the right hand and on the left; and thy seed shall inherit the make the desolate

The Ministers

As few moments ago I said, "I think we have the best set of ministers that this world can produce." I have not changed my mind, but it may be well for me to add that although

ful there may be some room for improvenient. I hope the time will soon come when all the ministers will become so engrossed and absorbed with: their work as ministers that they will put all their energies into this special work and let others attend to other business not pertaining directly to the Church and her special ln terests. I am afraid too many of our ministers have their minds too much divided to render the very best service to God and His Church. I offer no criticism for what has been done the past year in the way of engaging in business and seeking employment to earn a livelihood, but this has been a hard year—an off year and I hope this condition will not continue. We are in need of a larger number of ministers who have no business occupation whatever—those who have nothing else to do but preach, pray, and attend to their ministerial duties. May we have them the coming year? Surely the next year will bring about more prosperous conditions in the country so the ministers will be better provided for and will not be compelled to seek other employment for a livelihood.

Special effort should be made by all the ministers to improve in their knowledge of the Bible and preaching. This can be done by acting upon Paul's advice where he says. "Stady to shew thyself approved unto God, a workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth." There is no time for vacant staring or idle moments. Every moment is of too much value to allow it to pass without being used. If you have to wait a few minutes for some reason, snatch up the Bible, or a book, or a paper, and get a few thoughts to store away for future use. Improve your mind. Make it work: Don't let it scatter about and catch on to a lot of things that are degrad: instead of elevating. strive to make gains. Don't just depend on preaching a few sermons that you have been over so many times that you almost have them

memorized: Enlarge your field. Get up new subjects or learn to present the same subject in a new way. Aspire to higher things and better methods. Don't give up and lay down because you feel bad. Spur yourself up, study over your lessons so hard that it will make your head hurt. Then you are improving. Don't let your mind drift about like a child. Put away childish things and be a man.

In your preaching never let a spirit get hold of you that will make you preach rough and harsh. Always be mellow and present the truth in a way to edify instead of stupify. This rough, harsh, scolding, gouging, bemeaning, accusing, beating and banging kind of preaching is out of date. The minister that hangs to that kind will soon be out of a job. Tell, the truth, preach the gospel, do not shun; to declare the whole counsel of God; but learn to do it in a way that will be effective for good, and have a drawing: effect instead of a driving effect. This singling out some one to preach at and accuse him in public. and claim God has revealed his "black heart and hideous crimes," when nine times out of ten or more the sermon has been inspired some tale teller who has told the preacher some reports on the man instead of God being in it at all, will have to stop. There is a strong sentil ment against such, and the preacher that does this will not be wanted the next year. I have heard of a few good pastors, who have lovingly and deliberately stopped a few of these rough; bemeaning, accusing and abusing kind of evangelists, and would not allow them to preach in their pulpits. I hope we will never have any of this kind to give us trouble in the Church of God, or if there may have been some surely they will not do that way again. I know of some who have been on that line who are as placid as a little lamb today.

Never allow yourself to be discouraged or take a spell of the blues. Always look on the bright side of things: If some one tells you a dole-

Get ful tale about a brother or sister or a church, try to think it may not be as serious as represented. Remember that some people have a tendency toward looking on the dark side of things, and you must not be influenced by them. I very frequently receive a report from two persons about. the condition of the same church. One describes it as being in a prosperous condition and everything moving on nicely, while the other describes it as being almost gone some of the members moved away some backslidden, others do not attend, the pastor neglecting his duty, etc. etc. Both are sincere, both are honest, and each gives the information as he sees it, but one is looking on the dark side with a pair of discouraged eyes, while the other has the victory and feels like everybody else has it too. A minister is supposed to have the victory all the time and if he is about to get faint hearted he should brace up and sing,

We'll never be discouraged,

2:45 P. M. Courts of Justice—Judges, M. S. Lemons, Chattanooga, Tenn.

Scripture, 1 Cor. 6:1-5.

There is to be a court of judges in the Church of God just like there is in the state of Tennessee. The saints shall judge the world. I can see here a court of justice. God wants judges to decide every case. They can decide it from a point of truth and judgment. We will have a government that can rule the world. We don't need to go before the judges except to pay our taxes. We can settle everything ourselves. If all Scripture is good for our learning, why can't we see how the judges did in the old Scriptures? Ex. 18:13-27. Some people among us have trivial cases to be settled, these could be settled before this court of judges. Paul says to bring it before the saints and not before the unbelievers. Deut. 1:15,16; Deut. 16:18; Deut. 19:18; 2 Sam. 15:1-5; 2 Chron. 19:1-11.

A sister in the congregation was under the power of God for some time during the discourse. It seemed that her mind was not on her surroundings. At the reading of the seventh verse the spirit of prophecy came on this sister and she gave a message of prophecy in English, which was the substance of the Scripture which the speaker had not yet read. After the message the sister fell to the floor.

Make Wise Decisions, A. J. Tomlinson, General Overseer. Some notes: There is such a thing as getting so perfect before God that when He puts us in a position, the spirit of that position will come upon us. We may not be absolutely perfect but we are so near perfect that when we touch the right key we hear from heaven. Surely a key must have been touched somewhere. There are different kinds of conventions but we are unlike any other people. We will stop right in the middle of a discourse to hear from heaven. This is the most wonderful thing you ever did see. We don't think we have gone to the end for we get something more every year. Last year the Lord helped us so wonderfully to settle things. It looked like we had gone to the end; I couldn't think of a thing but just a short time ago the Lord stirred us up on different Bible subjects. Now the Assembly is stirred up about them, too.

Make wise decisions. It takes the Spirit of the Lord to help us make wise decisions. When these judges are put in place and it seems good to the Holy Ghost and us a dove-like spirit will come over us. The Spirit of the Lord came upon the seventy, Num. 11:16,17, because they were placed in their proper position by God. The very same spirit of leadership came over Joshua as was over Moses. Joshua went over, he rendered wise decisions. As long as the elders that were with Joshua lived, things went on in the right direction. It is the same way in the Church of God; as long as the apostles lived the church went on in the right way. When they were gone, divisions, heresies etc. came in and that is known as the dark ages. Isalah said in his day that the judges were to be restored. Isa. 1:26. They are to render wise decisions. Sometimes the Spirit works and sometimes the Bible works but they agree.

At this instant the Holy Glost gave a message in tongues which was interpreted, a part of which is as follows:

My sheep hear my voice, and a stranger will they not follow. The wolves shall not devour them. I gave my life for them. They are mine: Yea, I will put my Spirit upon them in the last days. Remarks by General Overseer:

We have had two great days. We wonder what today will bring. We know that God is here and we want Him to remain with us.

All knelt in concert prayer for greater blessings than the day before. Report of Committee No. 1, Questions and Answers.

Questions answered.

Ques. When a member is transferred from one church to another and that church refuses to accept him, should they immediately notify the former church?

Ans. It is possible that a man might be transferred and not be in good standing. If the church to which he is transferred knows he is not and they refuse to accept the transfer, they should notify the other church immediately.

Ques. If a man transgress the laws of God and backslide, then be reclaimed, shall his transgressions show on the record or be blotted out?

Ans. If a man has backslidden to that extent that he has been excluded from the church, the record of course will be made and the reason for his being excluded written down. If he is reclaimed and taken back, the record should be made that he is taken back, but the former record should remain.

Ques. What shall come from the grave at the resurrection? Some say

an immortal body, some say the spirit, some say nothing.

Ans. The body will raise incorruptible and the man will come out of the grave. Paul compared the body to a grain of wheat or other grain. See 1 Cor. 15:35-38.

Ques. Can a man whose wife has not received the Holy Ghost be a deacon?

Ans. There was a time when we ordained bishops and deacons before their wives were filled with the Holy Ghost and before they were, too, but since we got the light, it is the custom to be more careful and not recommend people until their wives have the Holy Ghost. When people are set forth as deacons they must be set forth with the qualifications and be recommended by the church, and if they have not the qualifications, they should not be set forth for deacons.

Ques. Is it legal to turn a member out of the Church of God when there is sufficient outside evidence but no Church of God members know about the case, when the ones who know are friends to the cause?

Ans. The matter should be investigated so members will be satisfied

and if it becomes necessary to get any information from outside parties it is alright but you must be sure that the members or those who are looking after the matter actually know the thing. Be sure and do not exclude any one without knowing what you are doing. This does not mean to discountenance the word of good honest men of God. To exclude people is a very particular job. Much praying should be done. Try to save him first instead of getting lots of evidence and just throwing him out without trying to restore him first.

Ques. What steps should be taken to dismiss a minister from the Church or have his name dropped from the church record when he proves disloyal?

Ans. The facts concerning the matter should be gotten together and stated to General Overseer and state overseer of that particular state. They should look into the matter and if the evidence is sufficient they should recall his ministry and he is then just a lay member. The church should then deal with him as any other lay member.

Ques. Does the Church of God stand for other ministers who are not in the Church to fill their pulpits when they will not preach the Church or come in with them?

Ans. That depends on who it is, how the matter is and many different things. As a rule, however, this should not be done, but there are always exceptions to rules. If the person seems to be satisfactory and is permitted to preach, the pastor should always be there. He should not turn a man over to his flock and not be there. It is possible for a man to have a good experience and not come into the church, but don't let him preach in the pastor's absence.

Ques. In case there is a deacon appointed where there is already a treasurer in the church and he is giving perfect satisfaction should the treasurer be forced to give up his office, to the deacon by virtue of his office?

Ans. Wait till he is ordained, then he may be the treasurer. If he is satisfied and the church is too, then the treasurer doesn't have to give up his office.

Ques. Is it right to work on Sunday when we do not have to do it—work just because there is big money in it, when we do not have to work to hold the job?

Ans. I think he ought to go to church and Sunday school on Sunday. If the ox gets in the ditch it might be alright, but our place on Sunday is in church and Sunday school. As far as I am concerned I would lose my job before I would work on Sunday, but there is no compulsion to this.

Ques. What is the difference in the carnal mind, the carnal nature, and the carnal flesh? Do we get rid of the carnal nature in this life?

Ans. There is a real difference of understanding about the carnal nature. That which we talk about is taking out the Adamic nature and getting rid of sin. It does not take out the human nature.

Ques. Should a member of the Church of God come into a town where a minister is pastoring a work and run a tent meeting without consulting the pastor? He says he has no license from the Church and can go and do as he pleases.

Ans. If he can do any good let him go but it is better for him and the pastor to work together.

Ques. Who is Melchisedec?

Ans. Probably those who were here last year remember Brother Lee's explanation. He showed that Melchisedec is the Lord.

Ques. James says to call for the elders of the church to pray for the

sick but we have only twelve and they are usually too far away. What are we to do?

Ans. Get anybody to pray for you, that can pray. Many people have just as much power to pray for the sick, as the twelve. This means any body that is established and has faith in God.

Ques. After a member of the Church of God has been disloyal, rebelled, and has been excluded, but comes back to church and testifies to having a real experience, also works at the altar, but never makes a confession to the church should anything be done? If so, what?

Ans. It is very probable that when folks get exactly right they will make confession and ask to come back. Some don't believe they are disloyal, don't think they have any confession to make. Do the best you can with them. If fruits are good in altar, let them alone; if not, give admonition and pray for them.

Ques. If a deacon's wife were to backslide when he is a good man and a good deacon would it deprive him of his office as a deacon in the Church?

Ans. It is very serious for any minister's wife to backslide. Deacons are required to have wives filled with the Holy Ghost to be ordained. If they backslide it renders deacons unqualified to hold position. Pray and cry and mourn and weep. In most cases they will come back to God.

Ques. If divorced people who have been saved can not come into the Church of God, what shall we advise them to do?

Ans. Say like Jesus said, Go and sin no more. Jesus will open some plan to help them along. It is difficult to give advice on things like this.

Ques. Should members pay tithes direct to a minister?

Ans. All tithes that are paid anywhere should go through headquarters—one channel. Only sinners or outsiders should pay tithes direct to a minister

Ques. If the state overseer gives a man that is not licensed the privilege to preach, has the district overseer any right to interfere with him?

Ans. If the man is straight and alright, which he is expected to be if the state overseer gives him permission, the district overseer should not interfere with his work but encourage him.

Some one asked for the decision concerning labor unions to be explained.

Explanation or statements concerning the labor unions:

It is the intention of the Assembly for members of the Church of God not to be members of anything else. Members have been allowed to have their dues taken but they are not to take the oath and attend the union meetings. Church of God people cannot compromise.

GOING THE BIBLE WAY

F. J. LEE

My subject this afternoon is Puissant Organization. In meditating upon this subject my mind is directed to Titus 1:5. For a foundation for what we might say today I will read, "For this cause left I thee in Crete, that thou shouldest set in order the things that are wanting, and ordain elders in every city, as I had appointed thee." I want to analyze this verse, every phase of it.

First, we will notice Crete. Crete was a little island of perhaps 158 miles long; this was the island that Paul passed on his voyage to Rome. He landed on the east side and finding no commodious place to harbor at Fairhavens, they went over to the west side and landed at Phoenix.

This island was a mountainous just wonderful. While we were up in country, yet a very fertile country; town, we heard a great noise not far and another thing we will mention, it was a very wicked place and one of were congregated; we saw the people

the writers gave this place a very bad name. We find at Acts 2, that among the visitors at Jerusalem on that memorable occasion—the outpouring of the Holy Ghost, there were Cretians represented in that multitude that heard the gospel preached in their own language by those Galileans under the power of the Holy Spirit.

I have wondered if the Cretians didn't have a great message to tell the folks at home when they returned to Crete. I have thought that they related something like this: You should have been at Jerusalem last Sunday morning. We witnessed one of the most wonderful events that we have heard of in all of our lives, it was just wonderful. While we were up in town, we heard a great noise not far from where a great crowd of people were congregated; we saw the people

running one direction, so we went; other men or, in other words, through with the crowd and when we arrived at a certain place, we saw some people coming down from an upper room, they were shouting, speaking with other tongues, in fact, were acting like drunk men. And one of their preachers preached. I never heard such words before. Oh, I wish you could have been there!

Now I know that human nature is the same at all ages and I feel that this is about what I would have related had I been there and returned to my home. Doubtless. after the Cretians hearing of this wonderful happening at Jerusalem and perhaps hearing it was spreading, they longed for some one to come who had this experience and preach it to them. Paul, between his first and second imprisonment, made them a visit, no doubt, had a great revival, and left Titus over there as an overseer of the work on the island.

He says. "For this cause left I thee." We will stress the pronoun I a few minutes. I shows something of his authority. At one time he said he had the care of all the churches. We also find by the many letters written by him that he had all the churches on his heart. He says to Titus, I left thee in Crete. Now we will look at the next pronoun THEE, left I THEE. I at end and THEE at the other. THEE had reference to Titus. Titus was a trustworthy man, the general overseer could trust him. It is held by commentators that Titus was one of the number sent to the Assembly at Jerusalem to settle certhings. He nad business tai**n** qualifications about him. He had been sent by the General Overseer to take the lead in a financial campaign for collections for the poor saints. He seemed to be able for most anything.

We will now notice the next thought. Paul says, "As I had appointed thee." APPOINTED is the thought we will notice. I was impressed with Brother Hadsock's article, God's Appointments I believe God orders and places men in their positions, yet I also believe that many times, He does it through and by the aid of good government.

I want to refer to Isaiah 6:8. The Lord says, "Whom shall I send, and who will go for us? GO FOR US, US, doubtless, having reference to Father, Son and Holy Ghost, They are sending men forth today just as really and truly as they did in Isaiah's time, but we should not forget that He recognizes government.

At one time Joseph went to see how his brethren were getting along. When they saw him coming they began to plan how to get rid of him. At first they placed him in an old pit, later they took him out and sold him the Ishmeelites who took Doubtless. Joseph Egypt. cried. thought he was having a harder time than anybody, but in later years when a great famine arose in the land and his brethren came to Egypt to buy corn and the fact was revealed that the one they were applying to for corn was really Joseph, their brother, they began to weep. Joseph said, "Be not grieved nor angry with yourselves that ye sold me hither; for God did send me before you to preserve life."

Joseph was a great ruler, had been appointed to the position through human agency, but hear him say, "God sent me."

We find in Jer. 10:23, "O Lord, I know the way of man is not in himself: it is not in man that walketh to direct his steps." Now, as the prophet said, it is not in man to direct his steps. I am persuaded it is just that way.

Solomon says, "There are many devices in a man's heart; nevertheless the counsel of the Lord, that shall stand."

"A man's heart deviseth his way; but the Lord directeth his steps."

Some of us will say, I am going to such and such a place next year. This is what we ought to say, If God wills. "Man's heart deviseth his way: but the Lord directeth his steps."

Hear the wise man, "Man's goings are of the Lord; how can a man then understand his own way?" Some will say, I am going to Florida next year,

others will plan to go north to Ohio, had he persisted in going to Asia. He etc., but it is God that directeth our steps. How does he do it? I say that while God sends out ministers, and sends them to their respective places. He has designed to do it through the church. It is true He sent out the early disciples but later, through a parable, He intimated that the church should occupy till He comes back.

Psalm 85:12,13 says, "Yea, the Lord shall give that which is good; and our land shall yield her increase. Righteousness shall go before him, and shall set us in the way of his steps."

According to this Scripture, if we expect God to set us in the way of His steps, we must let righteousness in and through our lives go before Him, and He will give that which is good. I want to ask the question,"How can we expect that which is good if we do not, by our lives cause righteousness to go before Him?"Righteousness means right doing. I say again, If we do not do right in obeying His rules and orders, good will not come our way. "Obey them that have the rule over you."

I now want to look at a few examples. The Spirit said to Philip, "Go near, and join thyself to this chariot." Philip had an appointment by man, even hands laid on him in behalf of and for the cause of the Church of God.

Here is another example. We find that the Spirit had forbidden Paul to preach in Asia on a certain occasion. Why? Because he was about to go on the suggestions of his own mind. The fact of the case is, Paul had been to the Assembly at Jerusalem and some decrees had been passed Assembly that seemed good to the Holy Ghost and to those in charge, as Paul was one of the men appointed to carry the decrees. Now as the Holy Ghost had put His seal upon the actions of that Assembly, even appointing men to carry the decrees to all the churches, when Paul began to let his mind lead him instead of staying in line with his appointment at the Assembly, the Spirit began to object and doubtless, would have been grieved | thought in the verse we have read for

had visited Syria, Cilicia, Derbe, Antioch, Pamphylia, Cyprus, Phrygia, Galatia and the Spirit did not object because he was working in line with his appointment.

Another example, God told Moses to appoint Levites to all manner service to the house of God. 1 Chron. 6:48. And in Num. 4:19, the Lord said. "Aaron and his sons shall go in, and appoint them every one to his service; and to his burden." The thought is, God designs and orders it, but the appointment must be done through human agencies.

David said as concerning Solomon, "I have appointed him to be ruler over Israel." Yet, God had appeared to David years before and had given him to understand that it should be. God ordains a thing and uses men to do the appointing. We find in Dan. 4:17, and understand, that God even appoints kings and removes kings at will.

The next division of the subject is CAUSE. Paul says, "For this CAUSE. left I thee in Crete." The word cause is divided into four kinds, material, formal, efficient and final. Material cause means that of which anything is made. For example, this building was first conceived within the mind of some one, that was formal; later the brethren collected some money and with the money bought the material. then the carpenters framed the building; this procedure was the cause of this building. Paul had a cause for leaving Titus over at Crete. He had looked over there through menual vision and conceived of a great work for the Lord on that island, not only a work in good order, but he had conceived the thought of a puissant organization which means powerful. mighty etc.

Formal cause means the elements of a conception which make the conception or thing conceived to be what it is-associated with matter. Paul was very anxious for this CAUSE that he had conceived to mature.

We will now look at the next a text, that is, "For this cause left I; thine enemies shall thee**set in order." ORDER is the thought. Order means regular methodical arrangement, regular government

Here these books are scattered but if I should bring them together in methodical arrangement, I have organized them. So it is with Church. Paul writes, "set in order," or, in other words, organize by methodical arrangement. God is the author of order and system. Paul believed in it and taught it. In the church at Corinth they had gotten out of order on the line of taking the sacrament, he wrote to them that when he came he would set in order, he believed in everything being in order. One time while at Rome he wrote to the church at Colosse, I was, "joying and beholding your order." Col. 2:5. Perhaps Paul's vision was of this puissant organization, not stopping alone at Colosse but viewing this day.

(The Holy Ghost carried a sister from the congregation to Brother Tomlinson with uplifted hands and she gave the following prophecy in the power of the Spirit, "Hear, O man of God. Hearken unto the voice of His Son. Speak unto the elders that they speak unto the armour bearers and trumpeters to tell my children who have been redeemed by my blood that this is the government and peace which I said I would establish upon the throne of his father David and of its peace and increase there shall be no end. And fear not, ye elders and armour bearers and trumpeters, to obey the orders of the man of God for I have given him my laws and commandments that he should give them unto you and if ye will hearken to obey the voice of the Lord then shall all nations come to the Church of God. Hear, O man of God, and hearken unto the voice of His Son. Choose you out seven men who are filled with the wisdom of my will and set them to judge in the inner courts of the house of God.

Hear O man of God, if ye will hearken unto the voice of the Son to obey that which I have said unto you.

not triumph over thee and the world will know that I have chosen thee.

Hear, O ye elders, armour bearers and trumpeters. Fear not to obey the orders for I am in this place.)

It is marvelous how the Spirit has taken the lead in my discourse and has told it before I got to it. I was just ready to read this very thing the sister has uttered in prophecy. I will read in Isa. 22:20-22, "And it shall come to pass in that day, that I will call my servant Eliakim the son of Hilkiah: And I will clothe him with thy robe, and strengthen him with thy girdle, and I will commit government into his hand; and he shall be a father to the inhabitants of Jerusalem, and to the house of Judah. And the key of the house of David will I lay upon his shoulder; so he shall open, and none shall shut; and he shall shut, and none shall open."

that the We learn from history priest carried a large key tied to something like a handkerchief and it thrown across his shoulder. I fancy it was something like this, I now place on my shoulder. We find in Rev. 3:8, where the Lord is speaking to the Philadelphian period, "I have set before thee an open door." Also that He openeth and no man shutteth. Eliakim referred to in Isaiah is a type of the Lord Jesus. Jesus truly has the key and He is opening every door that needs to be unlocked. First, He is opening the door for the real gospel to get to the nations, and He is opening new truths and new light. Some may try to apply the Scriptures just read about Eliakim to the millennium. We admit that in a broad sense it does, but also refers back to the beginning of this gospel age.

Notice the 20th verse begins by saying, "And it shall come to pass in that day, that I will call my servant Eliakim." The key to this verse is that day. While usually that day in Isaiah represents the day of the Lord, but in this instance it represents the time of Israel's captivity. Notice the 19th verse, "And I will drive thee from thy station, and from thy state shall he pull thee down. In the next verse follows, in that day, this showing that the Eliakim (Jesus) was to be called during the time of Israel's captivity or the time that they were moved from their state.

The key upon His shoulder corresponds to the government being on His shoulder in chap. 9:6,7. It reads, "For unto us a child is born, unto us a son is given: and the government shall be upon his shoulder: and his name shall be called Wonderful, Counsellor, The mighty God, The everlasting Father, The Prince of Peace. Of the increase of his government and peace, there shall be no end."

Some will insist that this applies to the millenium alone. No, it does not any more than Isaiah 22:20, did. You say, How do you know? Read the eighth chapter, you will see that it is having reference to Jacob's trouble (the tribulation day). Isa. 8:22 says, "And they shall look unto the earth; trouble andand behold darkness. dimness of anguish: and they shall be driven to darkness." Now to the 9th chapter. "Nevertheless the dimness shall not be such as was in her vexation, when at the first he lightly afflicted the land of Zebulun." means that this terrible thing coming. known as the tribulation, is not like any thing in the past.

In verse 5, He says, "For every battle of the warrior is with confused noise, and garments rolled in blood; but this shall be with burning and fuel of fire." This doubtless, having reference to the fire of Tophet, a scope of country below Jerusalem where the antichrist's armies shall be gathered and burned spoken of in Malachi as the saints walking over the ashes of the destroyed.

This brings us to the verse quoted a few minutes ago in Isa. 9:6, "For unto us a child is born." The thought is, this great destruction known as Jacob's trouble comes, because unto us (Jews) a child was born, * * * a' son given. And we rejected Him. Not will be given so much in the millennium, but already given in Bethlehem

and because of rejecting Him brings anguish, dimness and darkness.

Now of this child, the government was to be on His shoulder. You say. Yes, at the millennium? No, not there alone. Notice it says, "Of the increase of his government and peace shall be no end." What! the peace increase? Yes, when we get saved we have peace, but when we become sanctified we have greater peace and when the Comforter comes, which is Holy Ghost, we have still peace and we seem to have still greater peace when we find the Church of God and become identified with her. Peace! peace! peace! just increasing all the time. People have been receiving peace ever since the Prince Peace came to this world. Why should it not be just as reasonable that His government increase? I say. Yes, it is just as reasonable, we do not believe in staying in one old rut, but increasing not only in peace, but good government.

When Israel left Egypt, the Word tells us they went out harnessed up. Did that mean that they had collar, hames and holding back straps? No, it only means that they went out in good order, the margin says. ranks of five. So this shows that they started in organization, but it wasn't puissant, mighty, powerful, so God gave Moses the law on Mt. Sinai and gave him orders how to make a tabernacle, also gave instructions about the order around the tabernacle. Why? He wasn't satisfied with the organization to remain as it started, but He wanted a puissant organization, that could accomplish great things. After the tabernacle was placed, orders were given for Dan with his tribe to be placed on the north side. Ephraim on the west, Judah on the east and Reuben on the south. Dan having on his banner a flying eagle: Ephraim, an ox: Reuben, a man and Judah, a lion. Now after some special instructions about the business, there were some silver trumpets made without a seam in them. These were to be blown for marching orders, for calling the assembly and for war. The people every bugle call. What is this? Perfect order or in keeping with the subsubject, Puissant Organization.

We will notice another thought in the text, WANTING, "set in order the things that are wanting." Warmeans lacking, deficient etc., Wanting this showing that there was a deficiency in the organization over there at Crete. Paul had a conception ภ puissant organization at Crete, I believe Crete is a minute picture of the whole work in this world,

We might ask why Paul was anxious for a puissant organization in Crete. I believe the remaining verses following the text will answer this. He said, "Ordain elders in every city," then he gave the qualifications of an elder. In this he said they must hold "fast the faithful word * * * that he may be ABLE by sound doctrine to * * convince the gainsayers. For there are many unruly and vain talkers and deceivers * * *. Whose mouths must be stopped, who subvert whole houses, * * *. One of themselves, even: a prophet of their own, The Cretians are always liars."

Scripture thoughts just mentioned, we notice that there were prophets over at Crete who sometimes subvert whole houses. Subvert means to overturn from the foundations, also pervert from the truth. Does this mean just an ordinary family overturned from the foundation? I say, No. It is a rare thing that every one in a family is fully saved or, in other words, have the full truth within them. That being the case how could a whole family be perverted from the truth or overthrown from the foundation? Let us remember that this is a prophet doing this by his vain words. The Syriac says, "whose discourses are vain." They preach but their sermons are vain. Paul says further they are unruly, that is, will not come under rule. He also says that they are gainsayers, but their mouths for as long as they are fellowshipped must be stopped. How is he going to in the church, they have a right to do it? By getting elders in every city eat with the church. Ezek. 43 says to of which there were about one hun-show them the comings in and the dred on the island. Those elders with goings out of the house.

were well trained and understood the qualifications that Paul gave would be able by sound doctrine to stop the mouths of those false prophets. The statement then "are subverting whole houses" does not mean ordinary houses or families but churches. The question would arise, How did he intend to stop the mouths of the gainsayers? By setting in order the things that are wanting, that is, bringing up to a puissant organization.

> Have we organization an today called the Church? Yes, I am sure she exists. Jesus said, "Upon this rock I will build my church." You say, "This in the Greek is ec-clesia." That is so, but ec-clesia means called out John went before Jesus calling people out, they had to repent believe on Him (Jesus) that should come, then he baptized them if they could prove they were living a clean life. We have never required more of the people than that. Jesus took those called out ones and built them. This building made from the material named the called out ones is translated church in the American version.

> Jesus gave the teaching to the disciples what to do when a brother offended another. The offended brother should go to the offending party and if he wouldn't hear him, take two or more with him and if he would not hear them tell it to the church. This is the organization the Lord Himself set up for discipline.

> Paul, speaking of the man that did so wrong spoken of in 1 Cor. 5:4,5, says, "In the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, when ye are gathered together and my spirit, with the power of our Lord Jesus Christ, To deliver such an one unto Satan for the destruction of the flesh." He also says that they should not eat with such characters, this having reference to taking the sacrament. The only way to keep from eating with them is to turn them out,

Going the Bible Way

This part of the subject was very appropriately arranged on the program. GOING-this, I am sure, fits the Church of God; she is going at high speed. You have never seen anything make such rapid advances as the Church of God has made in this past year, and we can thank God because she is going the Bible way. The definition of GOING is the act of moving in any manner, so I do not hesitate to say that I believe the Church of God is moving in the right manner—the Bible way.

Paul says, "And he gave some. apostles; and some, prophets; and some, evangelists; and some, pastors and teachers." Eph. 4:11. What for? Answer, "For the perfecting of saints, * * * for the edifying of the body of Christ. Till we all come in the unity of the faith, and of knowledge of the Son of God, unto a perfect man, unto the measure of the stature of the fullness of Chrlst." Eph. 4:12, 13.

This Scripture shows that there is a standard to come to, and that we are coming to it, not already there. but day by day, year by year, making progress by the aid of the ministers mentioned. Titus was in Crete for the same purpose as this spoken to the Ephesian brethren, teaching, preaching till they came to the standard. This is the work of every true called minister today, to bring the church to the measure of the stature of the fulness of Christ.

Titus means honorable, also means protected. Every name in the Bible has a meaning as John means gift of God, Jacob means supplanter, Jesus means Savior. Titus was an honorable man as his very name signifies, not only was he an honorable man; but he was a protected man, God had His eve on him.

I believe that every one that goes forth in God's service, living an honorable life, God will surely protect him. Titus was amidst a people referred to as liars, slowbellies, evil beasts. Now evil beasts here doesn't mean ordinary Moses' father-in-law suggested to be

wild beasts, but had reference to very wicked men, that seemingly had no conscience. Yet Titus' very name signified that he was protected. It made no difference how many false things were told on Titus, God protected him. I say if we continue to be honorable nothing false can hurt us.

Hasn't it been demonstrated in the case of our General Overseer? Every false thing imaginable has been told on him, but it has never hurt him. He still presses on, shouting the victory with peace of soul. Why? because he is an honorable man, therefore, God is protecting him.

The next thought we will notice is elders. Paul told Titus to ordain elders in every city, there being about one hundred cities, that would have made one hundred elders. The thought is he just wanted enough elders. It is very necessary to have enough elders in the Church of God as we have already shown that we may be able to meet this gainsaying world.

The Lord told Moses to bring Aaron, Nadab and Abihu up to the mountain and also bring seventy elders with him. This is rather strange that the Lord would designate seventy; why not fifty, sixty etc., but no, seventy was the number chosen, it surely had a meaning. Those seventy men who went with Moses God's voice, saw something of His presence and were able to tell others of the wonderful words of the Lord and help to keep them in line and order. Moses and Joshua went still closer to God and the elders tarried. Now we notice the qualifications of that body were that they were elders and seventy in number, but at another time when the work had become too great for Moses, his father in law saw that he was under a great strain and instructed Moses that he should have help from strong intelligent men. He said able men, such as fear God, men of truth, hating covetousness etc.

We have a descriptron in Num. 11. Moses was crying out to God and said, "I am not able to bear all this people alone." It seems that the men that and Moses' intimates that he is bearing the people alone. So God tells him to get the men and tells him how many, not fifty or sixty but seventy. Seventy seems to be a special number, a sacred number, we find it many times in the Bible.

This time in selecting the seventy God tells Moses to get men that he knows to be elders, not because they were old men. How would it have sounded to have said. Select men that you know 'to be old men. No. that wasn't the thought, but get men of ability for the work they are to do.

After they were appointed the spirit came upon them, then they were able for the position, but were not before. I was struck with the thought Brother Tomlinson gave, that the spirit of the position comes upon the man after he is appointed to the position.

the things I really believe that that happened in Israel in her travels were types and examples to us upon whom the ends of the world have 1 Cor. 10:11. come.

I believe that Jesus, in launching this great gospel movement, did it in harmony with that which was prefigured in Israel. He first appointed twelve men, then later other seventy. Why not fifty or sixty? Because that would not have been in harmony with the type or examples given in Israel, but seventy elders were pointed, they returned and reported that the spirit of the position was on them.

We notice that after the children of Israel crossed the Red sea and shouted and danced, beat their timbrels, in fact, had a great time of rejoicing because of victory over the enemy, they soon came to Marah (bitter waters), but they could not rejoice there. Oh, how bitter, but soon there was a tree hewn down to sweeten the waters. After they resumed their journey, they soon spied something at a distance; the attention, doubtless, of every one was attracted as sap (Spirit) is in the heart.

appointed had never been appointed they journeyed closer and soon found that it was a beautiful location shaded and beautified with seventy palm trees. Was it just a happen so that there were just seventy? No. the writer by inspiration had to make mention that there were seventy, no more, nor less. Why didn't he say that there were some palm trees there? It is because this specified number in the travels of the children something. They also found on their arrival at the spot where the seventy palm trees were, that there twelve wells. Don't we know that they were glad to get to camp at such a beautiful place by these twelve wells and seventy palm trees?

> The palm trees were living because of the wells. The children of Israel being refreshed because of both. How beautiful an emblem of what we need today in the Church of God.

What do the wells represent? Peter said of some false prophets, "they are wells without water," showing that leaders in the church are referred to as wells. Jesus said to the woman of Samaria, "Whosoever drinketh of the water that I shall give him * * * shall be in him a well of water." We understand by these Scriptures that wells represent men as leaders in the Church of God.

What about the paim trees? Jesus said to the church, "Thy stature is like to a palm tree." Song of Sol. 7:7. "The righteous Also in Psa. 92:12, shall flourish like the palm tree." This showing that the palm tree is taken to represent live, strong, stalwart Christians. Palm trees grow best where there is much water. It is said that the sap is in the heart of a palm tree. Its leaf doesn't fade, some palm trees bear fruit every mouth, also blossom at the same time. It is tall and graceful, we have never seen a better representation of a true Christian.

During the first part of our Assembly we had spiritual food but yesterday and today we have business.

10:00 A. M. The General Overseer presented the subject of the seventy elders which was referred to in his Annual Address and introduced by F. J. Lee in his discourse. A few remarks by General Overseer:

There has been a lame place among us in time past and we want to heal that lame place. We want to get everything in such perfect order that the gainsayers can't gainsay us. As has been explained more than once, a body of elders at Jerusalem were ALL present; indicating that at times only a part was present. It seems in studying the Scriptures that twelve and seventy go together. This was referred to in the Annual Address and Brother Lee's discourse and everybody felt good but this must be carried out in regular business order. The subject is now before you for discussion:

J. W. Culpepper.—For a month or two I have felt that this is Bible. I feel like we ought to accept it.

One brother said, I have been attacked by representatives of other

works, on this line. My only answer has been, "We are striving to get up to all the Bible." I endorse this.

M. S. Lemons.—We decided we needed seventy others years ago. We conclude that the seventy are men of ability. I have decided that we ought to have them.

H. B. Simmons.—I think Brother Lee's talk was plain enough. Everybody looks pleased when some one mentions anything in favor of this. I think we ought to hasten on with the business.

This proposition was unanimously carried before the speaker could get

to his chair.

The General Assembly fixed the sections of the seventy elders and length of term that each should serve. Full term, five years; second section, four years; third section, three years; fourth section, two years; fifth section, one year. Fourteen are to be appointed each year. Prayer of thanks and honor to God for such unity. Many bowed heads to floor.

Remarks by General Overseer:

The way the Lord is opening up His Word to our minds is marvelous. A marvelous spirit has taken hold on us and helps us to settle things. The spirit that surrounds us allows no dissenting voice. We are certainly walking softly before the Lord and I am sure we appreciate His presence.

General Overseer stated that the state overseer was one of the judgesby virtue of his office.

E. L. Simmons suggested that the term of office be one year as that is the extent of time one knows where he will work.

J. S. Llewellyn approved the suggestion and recommended the following.

It should be left with General Overseer to appoint other two judges along with state overseer. General and state overseers may counsel to gether. General Overseer might appoint one for a special judge for special occasions, viz., in case a brother or other relatives of one of the judges be tried. Not confined to one state but may serve in other states as directed by those in authority.

Alonzo Gann suggested that M. S. Lemons' suggestion as to whom the

judges would consist of be accepted:

The General Overseer made a few remarks in which he mentioned a written constitution. Some of them are:

The elders in council with General Overseer have concluded there is need of a constitution for the Church of God. Remember this is not setting forth any laws or creeds that are binding us. We are only setting forth that which we have been practising for years.

The General Overseer then read the constitution which was drawn up

by the General Overseer and elders in council.

CONSTITUTION PREAMBLE

We, the Church of God, the ministry and membership of the General Assembly of the Churches of God in conferenceassembled at Cleveland, Tenn.

In order to form a more perfect union, establish the principles of Theocratic Government, set forth the teaching, principles and practices as heretofore interpreted by the General Assembly as further herein provided and for the general welfare of its membership; do ordain and establish this constitution for the General Assembly of the Churches of God. -

ARTICLE 1... Purpose of Organization

Section 1. This organization is and shall be known as the General Assembly of the Churches of God.

Section 2. The object and purpose of this organization is to propagate the doctrine, principles and practices of the Church of God, as set forth in the New Testament, as interpreted by the legally authorized officials of this organization, which interpretations may be found in the minutes of the annual sessions of the General Assembly, also filed at the business headquarters of the Church of God.

Section 3. To promulgate rules and regulations to govern the local churches of said organization, and otherwise promote the general interest of the General Assembly.

Section 4. To search out the Bible plans of government and dis-

cipline and interpret the same.

Section 5. To provide a general government in which is vested full power and authority to dictate and promulgate rules and regulations from time to time to govern the local churches composing said Assembly.

Section 6: To provide a general convocation for the mutual fellowship, spiritual development and general welfare of its

membership.

ARTICLE 2.

Membership

- Section 1. The Membership of the General Assembly is and shall be composed of all the local churches as recorded in the minutes of said Assemblies.
- Section 2. When a new church is set in order by any legally authorized minister of the Church of God, this new church as a product of his labor becomes a member of the General Assembly and shall be subject to the government, teachings, principles, and practices as promulgated from time to time by said General Assembly.
- Section 3. No local church shall withdraw from the General Assembly as a whole, but such individual members of said local church who may become disloyal or otherwise disorderly, shall be dealt with and excluded from membership in such local church.

ARTICLE 3.

Government

Section 1. The government of this organization is and shall be Theocratic in form, as interpreted by its officials.

ARTICLE 4.

Officers.

Section 1. The officers of the General Assembly of the Churches of God are and shall consist of General Overseer, general

- secretary, council of twelve elders and other seventy elders, presbytery, state overseers and trustees.
- Section 2. The duties of the General Overseer shall be the general supervision of all the work of the general Assembly, and to sit as chairman of said Assembly when in session.
- Section 3. The duties of the general secretary shall be to keep a careful record of the General Assembly, and act in conjunction with the General Overseer in execution of any and all legal documents authorized by the General Assembly.
- Section 4. The duties and powers of the council of the twelve elders shall be to consider all questions that may properly come before them pertaining to the general interest and welfare of the Church of God. It is, and shall so be understood, that the twelve in conjunction with the General Overseer shall be the supreme council.

Section 5. The duties of the seventy elders shall be to faithfully represent the government and teaching of the Church of God in their various fields of labor, and to sit in joint session with the twelve in the Assembly to make final decisions on all questions that shall come before said Assembly.

Section 6. The twelve elders and the seventy elders shall together with the General Overseer be understood and so
construed to be the official Assembly while in joint session,
which shall have full power and authority to designate
rules of government, teachings and principles for the local
churches, those present to constitute a quorum.

Section 7. The duties of the trustees of the General Assembly is and shall be to hold in trust all property belonging to the General Assembly for the full use and benefit of said Assembly, and to see that no property or part of the same shall be converted to any other use than that which is in harmony with the plan and purposes, government and teachings of said General Assembly.

Section 8. The presbytery and their duties:

The General Overseer and the state overseer shall constitute the presbytery in the respective states or provinces, who, after all investigations necessary and other proceedings provided and authorized by the General Assembly shall have full power and authority to license or ordain candidates for the ministry.

It is further understood that it shall be within the power of the presbytery to take final action in revoking the license or ordination of any minister for any reason or cause satisfactory to themselves.

Section 9. The duties of the state overseer is and shall be to

have the oversight of his state or territory and as much as possible conduct or order a general evangelistic campaign over his state during the year. To see that every church is supplied with a pastor as much as lieth in his power. In short, oversee every interest of the work in his territory.

Section 10. The term of all officials shall be fixed by the General Assembly while in session.

Section 11. Any official is subject to impeachment for an offence rendering him unworthy of the position that he occupies.

ARTICLE 5.

Judicial

- Section 1. There shall be a supreme judicial body composed of seven of the twelve elders who shall decide all matters which shall properly come before them, whose decision shall be final.
- Section 2. There shall be a judicial body who shall sit in the various states where churches are established, to consider all matters coming under their jurisdiction, said body shall be composed of the state overseer, one of the seventy elders, and one bishop.
- Section 3. It shall be the duty of the board designated in section 2 of this article to examine all candidates for the ministry, and if found satisfactory they shall refer them to the presbytery for license or ordination.
- Section 4. It shall be the duty of the board designated in section 3 of this article to try all ministers for any offence committed within the state were they shall convene; if, for any reason their decision should be unsatisfactory to either of the litigants, he shall have right to appeal to the body mentioned in section 1 of this article.
- Section 5. It is and shall be within the power of the local church to try its members for any offence contrary to the government, teaching, principles or practices of the Church of God. Their jurisdiction, however, is limited to lay members only.
- Section 6. No business conference or any act shall be legal, unless presided over by a legally authorized moderator.
- Section 7. Any lay member of the local church who has been tried for any offense and convicted and excommunicated who, for any reason, may feel that he has been improperly or illegally dealt with, shall have the right to appeal from such decision to the body set forth in section 2 of this article. And if, for any reason, he may be dissatisfied with

the decision of this body, he shall have right to appeal to

the body set forth in section 1 of this article.

Also if there be a litigation between two or more members of a local church, and if, for any reason, they be dissatisfied with the decision of the local church, they may have a right to appeal to the board set forth in section 2 of this article, and if, for any reason, they should be dissatisfied with the decision of the board set forth in section 2 they may have right to appeal to the board set forth in section 1 of this article.

ARTICLE 6

Finance.

Section 1. It is and shall be recognized as an accepted principle, and a part of God's financial plan that all the membership shall pay tithes of their net earnings or income.

Section 2. It is and shall be ordained that the tithes are for

the support of the ministry only

Section 3. For the love of the gospel and the general welfare of the Church it shall be the duty of the membership to make free-will offerings from time to time as the needs may require.

Section 4: It shall be the duty of all persons intrusted with finance belonging to the Church of God for any purpose, as treasurer of said church, to deposit the same in a reliable bank to the credit of the Church of God.

Section 5. The power to regulate and operate the financial

system shall be vested in the supreme council.

ARTICLE 7 Education

Section 1. A Bible Training School shall be maintained as long as advisable, for the education of our ministers and workers, which shall include the extension department of the Bible Training Correspondence Course and any other educational pursuits that the General Assembly may from time to time deem necessary.

ARTICLE 8 Amendments

Section 1. As the work of this organization progresses, and the number of Churches increase, the General Assembly may create new and other positions and fill them as needs may require.

Section 2. This constitution may be amended by a unanimous agreement of the official Assembly in any regular session:

After General Overseer read the constitution he asked the Assembly if they wanted it reread or if they wanted any explanation.

Following the reading were a few questions, explanations, and deep consideration, after which T. A. Richard suggested that the Assembly accept the constitution as a whole.

It was unanimously agreed to accept it.

General Overseer said, "In order to show our appreciation of His presence and it seeming good to us and the Holy Ghost, let us all kneel before the Lord and reverence Him."

All knelt and thanked the Lord.

After prayer all stood and praised God while the orchestra was playing:
The General Overseer exclaimed, "BEHOLD WHAT GOD HATH.
WROUGHT!"

The members of the early Church were all of one accord; steadfast in the apostic's doctrine and fellowship, and the multitude that believed were of one heart and one soul, and great grace was upon them all, and mighty results followed as a consequence of their perfect unity and care ful organization.

We must banish from our minds the thought of individual or local independence and haphazard spasmodic efforts.

Puil together, pull at once, pull steadily all the time is the road tosuccess.

All members should be ready to center their minds and prayers on the one thing as a unit when calls for special prayer are made. Each one should feel his or her part of the responsibility, remembering that when one member fails it cripples or dwarfs the body until the matter pending may fail.

INSTRUCTIONS-LOCAL CHURCH OFFICERS

- 1. Pastor when possible. It is necessary always to have some onesselected as leader of the flock. It is the duty of the overseer of the state or province to see that every local church in his territory has a pastor or leader.
 - 2 Clerk for every local church. It is the duty of the clerk to keep

a close and careful record of the business and work of the church; make a record and give date of organization, record the name and date of every one that joins, the name and date of every one excluded and for what cause. Keep a record of deaths giving date of same.

Clerk should be selected at the last business meeting before each Annual Assembly to serve one year. Same one may be continued from year to year if desired. A man or woman can serve in this capacity. Care should be taken to select one that can write and compose well.

The selection should be made by mutual agreement. Talk the matter over lovingly and carefully and finally all agree upon one who is able and willing to serve.

3 Treasurer for every local Church. His duties are given on page 12 of Ecnoes of Ninth Annual Assembly. If the church has more than one deacon it is their duty to select one of their number to act as treasurer, and if there is only one deacon he is treasurer by virtue of his office. If there are no deacons, a treasurer can be selected in like manner as the clerk.

Meeting for business should be held regularly every three months, or four each year. In case of special demand for it a meeting may be called any time by the pastor, leader or overseer of the state. If necessary a short business session can be held at the beginning or close of a meeting for worship.

It is suggested that, where practicable in a locality the first Monday night in January, April, July and October, be observed by all local churches for their regular quarterly meetings, so as to conserve uniformity and concerted action.

The pastor should act as moderator of all business meetings. In case there is no pastor the overseer of the state has authority to act or appoint some one to preside. The leader should never act as moderator except authorized specially by the overseer of the state. Where one pastor has the care of several churches he can arrange the time of his business meetings to suit his convenience.

ATTENDANCE

Every member, both men and women, should take an interest in and make it a point to attend every business session if possible.

ARRANGEMENT \

Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer should occupy seats on the platform. Deacons and other ministers near by on either side or close in front of platform.

ORDER OF BUSINESS

(This order is only a suggestion and not meant for an ironclad rule.)
Song service by all. Prayer by some one whom the moderator may call.
Short Scripture lesson, and prayer by moderator, asking for wisdom and direction. Song.

Clerk read minutes of last regular meeting, also of call meetings if; there have been any held.

Correction of minutes if any.

Treasurer give his report of finances. He should always give an itemized statement of receipts and disbursements and remainder in treasury.

Reception of transferred members.

Members to transfer if any.

Unfinished business left over from last meeting.

New business.

Miscellaneous business.

Adjournment by prayer.

In these meetings matters should be discussed with love, humility and meekness. No votes should be taken to decide questions. Everything should be done with one accord and questions settled by mutual agreement. It there is division on a matter hold it over until all can agree. If one should seem obstinate and contrary, don't run the matter over him, but take up his case and investigate the cause for his obstinacy, and if he shows the spirit so that he should be heard, then show him courtesy. But if he proves to be wrong, then deal with him as the Bible directs. After this is all done take up the original subject and dispose of it in harmony and love.

In case of matter that the local church cannot settle satisfactorily they should call the assistance of the overseer; if they are still not able to reach a satisfactory conclusion, it should be referred to the General Overseer.

In these business meetings women are to take no open active part in discussing or deciding questions, but should always be there and silently pray God to give wisdom and direct the men, and show forth God's glory in being the glory of the men.

No one should give a message in tongues to the Church unless there is an interpreter present and then only one at a time and not more than three in the whole session.

ADVICE TO MEMBERS

As a member you count one and should attend every regular service as far as possible. Remember no one can fill your place and the service will be that much dwarfed and crippled without your presence.

Show your love and fellowship to every one without partiality. Don't

wait for others to greet you, but you greet them.

Show special courtesy to strangers who may chance to fall in with you in your meetings.

As a rule take part in the singing.

Be ready for vocal prayer when called on or prompted by the Spirit.

Be ready for testimony when such is in order.

Stand by your pastor or appointed leader and assist him every way you can.

Always pray silently for the preacher while he delivers the message:
Always live a good straight life at home and abroad so no one can
justly think or speak of you as a hypocrite.

Guard your conversation. Be careful what you say about a brother, sister or anyone.

Don't be a critic and try to find something in others to criticise.

Examine yourself occasionally and see if you are in the faith.

Don't yield to discouragement or despondency.

Be cheerful and happy and try to make others the same.

Spend as much time as you can in secret prayer. Give yourself all you can to intercessory prayer.

Your dress should be with moderation, neat and clean, but not for show. You should never wear gold for ornament or decoration. Fingerrings, bracelets, ear-rings, necklaces, lockets and large showy pins are unbecoming for a saint of God.

Always tithe your income and put it in the church treasury. Make free-will offerings besides your tithes.

Younger members should not keep company or associate too intimately with worldly outsiders.

Members should never marry sinners. Great care should be taken, with much prayer and careful consideration, regarding matrimony.

REMEMBER

These are the last days and perilous times have come, so it will require much watchfulness and humble prayer on your part to so live and act that you will never bring reproach on the worthy name of Christ and His Church that you so much love.

Never form too close an intimacy with the opposite sex even if they are your brothers and sisters in the Lord. Give no place to the adversary

Abstain from the very appearance of evil.

These kindly instructions and advice are given by those who are watching for your soul as they that must give an account (Heb. 13:17) and it is hoped they will be received in the same meek gentle spirit in which they are given.

That every member, and especially every minister, should be a "paid" up" subscriber and an earnest worker for our church paper, the CHURCH OF GOD EVANGEL.

Duties of Overseers

Each overseer is to have the oversight of his state or his territory; and as much as possible conduct or order a general evangelistic campaign over his state during the year. To see that every church is supplied with a pastor as much as lies in his power.

To secure the names and addresses of every bishop, deacon and evangelist located in his state, and keep a record of same.

To secure the location of every church in the state and keep a record of same.

To visit every church and look after the interest in every way as a pastor over a large circuit.

When a new organization is effected anywhere in the state information should be sent the overseer of that state, who should make a record of the same, giving date of same, names of officers etc.

Each overseer should be able to know at any time the name and address of every minister located in the state. He should also know the number of members in his state, keeping a record of the increase as well as decrease, so information can be obtained each year as to the total membership. This can be done by keeping in touch with the clerks of the churches.

Every minister and every clerk should take an interest in imparting, this information to the overseer of their state.

In co-operation with the General Overseer they will form the presby-

TITHES—Examples. Tithes are to be paid on net income. The following examples were prepared in 1917 and entered in the minutes of the same year.

INVESTMENTS FOR PROFIT

1. Mercantile Business—An individual company or corporation, going into business for profit, having already tithed the accumulated capital would be entitled to first pay all expenses of the operation of the business such as rents, clerk hire, license, taxes, loss by stock wear or other depreciation common to such business, then tithe the net increase.

B.—Company or corporation where two or more are in business together, Ar invests \$1,000, B. 1,000 and C. \$1,000. A. and B. do not pay tithes. C. gives his time to the business and draws \$50 per month salary for his services. He pays the tithe of this amount, which is \$5.00 and at the end of the year they take stock and find that the business has increased 12 per cent. They declare a 12 per cent dividend which gives to C. \$120. He pays the tithe of this which is \$12.00.

C.—A., who own his own property, goes into business and invests \$10,000. He first charges to his expense account, taxes on his business house, license, taxes on merchandise, repairs, clerk hire, water and light rents, loss by shelf wear or other depreciation; these expenses amount to \$535. He makes a 10 per cent. profit which is \$1,000. After deducting the expenses—\$535—he has an income of \$465. He pays the tithe of this amount which is \$46.50.

2.-Real Estate.

for improvement, \$10 attorney fee for searching of titles, etc. He sells the property for \$1500. The profit—\$250—minus the amount \$65 spent for improvement, and \$10 attorney fee, amounts to \$175, the tithe of which is \$17.50.

B—The real estate man having houses to rent, rents a house for \$20 per month or \$240 per year. He pays per year for taxes, \$21, water-rent \$9:00, upkeep of property \$30; this makes a total of \$60 for expenses, which is deducted from income of \$240 leaving the amount of \$180 to be tithed. Tithe—\$18.00.

EXAMPLE—THE WAGE EARNER

A wage earner makes \$15 per week; the tithe of this amount, which is: \$1.50, he shall pay to the Lord. If, however, his carfare in going to and from his work, costs him \$1.00 per week, this shall be deducted from his wages before tithing, leaving \$14 to be tithed—tithes \$1.40. In no case shall living expenses such as house rent, water rent, lights, grocery bills, etc., be paid before paying his tithes; all these shall be paid out of the remaining nine-tenths.

THE MANUFACTURER

A manufacturer turns out 250 doors in one week. The cost per door for raw material amounts to \$0.50, dressing the lumber \$0.10, labor \$0.05, insurance, light, power, taxes, water and other expenses \$0.25; making a total expense of \$0.90 per door. The sale price per door amounts to \$1.50.
